



# CONQUEST OF THE AIR NEAR AT HAND

Friedrichshafen, July 3.—Count Zeppelin yesterday outdistanced all world records for steerable balloons. He remained in the air for 12 hours, traversed the greater part of northern Switzerland and visited Zurich, Winterthur and Lucerne, attaining an average speed of 34 miles an hour. His airship displayed splendid qualities of dirigibility and was quite up to the greatest expectations.

In the most desirable weather conditions, almost a dead calm, the airship manned by a crew of four under the leadership of Count Zeppelin left its floating home on Lake Constance at 8:30 in the morning. Less than five minutes later the balloon rose about 1000 feet in the air and turned her bows toward Constance. About 3 o'clock it had disappeared on the western horizon.

Telephone messages from Frauenfeld, Dinderthur and other towns soon reported the appearance of the airship and her passage over the Canton of Zurich. The giant craft remained 10 minutes hovering over the town of Zurich and the lake and then vanished from view at a rapid rate in the direction of Lucerne.

### Cuts Many Figures.

It was about 11 o'clock when the airship came into view at Lucerne and the thousands of astonished tourists from all parts of the world, including hundreds of Americans, greeted her with loud cheers as she sailed

quickly over the waters of the lake. Count Zeppelin guided his airship and proceeded to carry out a long series of evolutions which included complicated figures, circles, the figure eight, sharp turns, descents and ascents. He then undertook a tour of the whole lake, visiting every bay and indent along the shores. Finally he turned the nose of the ship homeward, crossing the Alps range of mountains high in the air and traveling at a good pace. The balloon soon reached Zurich again, encircled the town hall and continued on its way.

### Back to Shed.

By 6:30 o'clock in the evening the airship had reached Lake Constance and turned east to Bregence, a frontier town of Austria-Hungary. From that place it traveled back to Friedrichshafen, executing a most difficult series of maneuvers all the while until it was over the region. It descended to within 100 feet of the roofs of the houses and then slipped easily into the shed from which it had been absent just 12 hours. The greatest altitude reached in the long voyage was 2500 feet and the distance covered was about 220 miles as the crow flies.

Passengers traveling on a train between Zurich and Constance say that the balloon easily overhauled the train which it left behind. Count Zeppelin considers the prospects for the approaching 24-hour flight as favorable.

### BOATS ON OPEN RIVER.

Portland Men Subscribe \$12,000 Toward Operating Steamers.

Crowded to such an extent that even standing room was at a premium was the assembly room in the new Commercial club building last night when the special meeting of the club was called to order for the purpose of discussing improvements in river transportation conditions between Portland and the interior, says the Portland Oregonian.

A subscription to install two boats on the open river was started and \$12,000 subscribed.

So enthusiastic was the meeting that not only was river transportation discussed, but it was suggested and strongly urged that Portland take the initiative and construct a railroad from this city through the interior to Salt Lake. Governor Chamberlain suggested that the state itself build and operate a railroad connecting Portland with the interior.

In order to emphasize the statements of the speakers and to demonstrate the various points that were raised, a huge map was posted on the wall, in plain view of the audience. It was a comprehensive map, new and thoroughly accurate, showing the railroad lines and proposed extensions throughout the states of Oregon and Washington.

**Large Fund in Sight.** Speeches were made by several members of the committee in which the necessity of opening the Columbia river above the portage road was urged. Immediately after the speeches, a subscription was opened and more than \$12,000 was subscribed by those who had attended. Promises for a considerably larger sum were also given at the time. The fund will be used to operate two boats on the upper river.

Mr. Teal was the first speaker and he, by means of the chart and an extensive knowledge of the subject, showed how the state of Oregon had been retarded in its growth and development by want of transportation facilities and how the state of Washington had advanced as a result of adequate transportation lines.

### FIGHT ANARCHIST SHEETS.

Postmaster General Will Exterminate Red Papers.

A crusade which will probably result in the suppressing of all anarchist papers and periodicals, with the exception of those devoted to purely philosophical anarchism, will be commenced by Postmaster General Meyer. A thorough investigation of all papers suspected of violent tendencies will be made by postal officials and it is possible that a few socialist sheets may fall under the ban of official displeasure.

Following his order denying the use of the mails to a Paterson anarchist paper, Mr. Meyer instructed the third assistant postmaster general to formulate an order providing that papers of an anarchistic or socialistic character, printed in a foreign language, would be required to print with it a translation in English of any matter that was incendiary or advocated anarchy. An examination of the law, however, disclosed that such an order could not be based on it, and accordingly Mr. Meyer suggested to the postoffice committees of congress an amendment to section 3893 of the revised statutes, which prohibits the carrying in the mails of indecent matter. The amendment which was inserted and upon which will be based the forthcoming order of the postmaster general is as follows:

"And the term 'indecent' within the intent of this section shall include matter of a character tending to incite arson, murder or assassination."

This amendment will become active tomorrow, and at that time it is the intention of the postmaster general to detail law officers of the department to examine carefully a score or more of papers, some of which are printed in the English language, to see if they are violating the new order.

Section of Klamath County May Be Set Aside.

The Wooley creek district in Salmon and Klamath rivers is being talked of as a fine tract for a national game preserve, says the Southern Oregonian. Steps are being taken to place it before the national preserve bureau at Washington. The district abounds with game and its many streams and lakes are alive with fish.

The Scott Valley Advance says: Were this place to be made into a national preserve or park with suitable trails and bridges and competent wardens to enforce the game regulations and keep down predatory animals it would soon be one of the greatest national attractions of this state; also if the district were plentifully stocked with game the overflow would make good hunting at the proper season in all the adjacent country. The scenic attractions of the whole place are magnificent, embracing the eastern slope of the well known Marble mountain country with miles of beautiful mountain meadows and rugged peaks.

### To Raise Oklahoma Flag.

Philadelphia, July 3.—A 46-star flag will be hoisted above Independence Hall for the first time tomorrow when a party of prominent Oklahoma officials and citizens will join in a great celebration. At 10 o'clock tomorrow morning the new banner will be raised over the historic building and the news will be flashed to every city and town in the new state. The Oklahomans in this city will sing "The Star Spangled Banner," and at virtually the same moment the Oklahomans in their own state will join in the chorus of the national anthem.

### Yankee Flags in London.

London, July 3.—Thousands of American flags will fly over London tomorrow and there will likely be an unprecedented outburst of Yankee patriotism. The customary parade will be held at the Hotel Cecil tomorrow night. Special observation will mark the day at the Franco-British exhibition in Edinburgh. Reports from the continent state that elaborate celebrations will be held in Paris, Berlin, Rome, St. Petersburg, Vienna and other capitals.

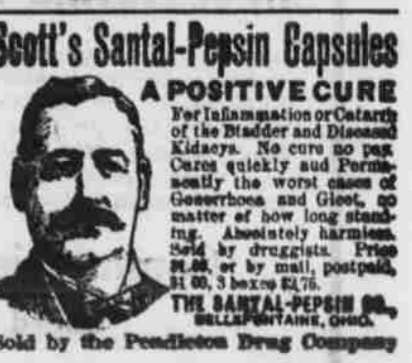
