MANY SPEND FOURTH AT THOMAS' GROVE.

Many Go Away From Town for the Day—Big Public Auction at Dam Next Saturday — Many Hermiston People Invest in Cactus Plants—Crops Are Looking Good About Hermiston.

Hermiston, July 5.—Many of the people of Hermiston enjoyed the Fourth at Thomas' grove a short distance from the city, where a big picnic was held. A big basket dinner was in order, sports, games, etc., and the day proved a most delightful one for all in attendance. Those who were not at the picnic went to some of the neighboring towns, a large number attending the celebration at Echo.

Big Public Auction.

Next Saturday, July 11, a big public auction will be held at the Cold Springs dam of the Umatilla project, when the horses, wagons and other equipment which have been in use in the construction of the dam will be sold, and the scene of much activity for the past year and a half will be abandoned. However, work on other parts of the project is still being done. The pipe lines are only a little more than 40 per cent completed, and the hauling and laying will continue until well into the fall.

Purchase Cactus Plants.

Many of the residents of Hermiston purchased liberally of the new species of cactus which was recently exhibited here by C. H. Fuller, a representative of Luther Burbanks, the celebrated California horticulturist. It is proved to be anything near what is asserted for it in many of the highlands in this section will have been solved.

A number of the people from here went to Wenaha Springs to spend the Fourth.

Charles Skinner and family have gone to the mountains above Walla Walla, where they will spend a few weeks during the hot weather.

Crops are looking good at this time and Hermiston has prospects for a good year, though most of the land under cultivation has been irrigated for the first time this season.
