## WILLIAM ALLEN WHITE DESCRIBES THE DEMOCRATS

William Allen White, one of the editors of the American Magazine, and perhaps the most brilliant newspaper writer of the United States today, writes of the opening of the democratic national convention at Denver, in the following entertaining way:

This is a convention crowd wherein the barbaric yelp which Wait Whitman speaks of is the keynote. In the republican convention was the still small voice of Roosevelt in the hearts of a hypnotized delegation. In this convention the only trouble will be in compressing the snort of the untrifled into polite language. If it is charged that in its platform the republican convention didn't mean all it said, it may be pretty sure that this convention will not say all it means. The average conservative citizen to whom squatting in a cold bath tub of water is a startling adventure, will take no comfort in the two platforms of the great parties this year.

For the democratic platform will be dictated by Bryan, he is the convention, "the bo'sum tight, the midship's mite, and the crew of the Nancy Brig." And as between the platform which satisfies Mr. Roosevelt and the platform which pleases Mr. Bryan, the only question which occurs to the conservative citizen is shall law-defying wealth be turned down or blown up. That is the choice between the parties. To him the republican convention was an assemblage of firebrands and this is a gathering of dynamiters. Still it was calm here today until Oklahoma lit. The Oklahomans came with a band and a procession, and when they arrived at their hotel they had speeches and pow-wow-ing and for a few moments there was a sound of revelry by night which made Jim Ham Lewis with his pale pink whiskers and his sky blue hat band, who was the most audible thing in the town, sink into silence sweeter than a summer night.

### Loud Roar of Necktie.

But when Oklahoma disintegrated the loud roar of Mr. Lewis' haberdashery rose above the din and not even the white flannels of the southern delegates, the broad hats of the Texans nor the iridescent breath of Tammany could quell Mr. Lewis. If the republican convention had its steam roller, Mr. Jim Ham Lewis is the sartorial fog horn of this momentous occasion. And he is no "lone peak of Darien" either. There are others. This gathering of the great plain people is certainly a clothes congress.

There are more high hats, silurian and post-tertiary formation, at this uprising of the oppressed than ever assembled west of the Mississippi before. If this thing is going to continue when the battle falls in this country and the guillotine takes up its work, the mob that greets plutocracy will look those panoramas of fashion beginning with the Goths and ending on Fifth avenue that used to adorn the tailor shops of the countries in the eighties.

### Philosophy of Clothes.

But declaration of independence in clothes merely expresses the unfettered uncombed and untrifled soul. Bryan dominates, but he does not control. He has no lieutenants. There is no card index in the situation. There is no boss, no sub-boss to system here. There is not the semblance of a machine. The congressional crowd is glad to be alive with a license to breathe regularly. It does not arrogate to itself any authority as it does conventions wherein there is a congressional majority. In the days when there was a democratic congress, there was a democratic machine, but now in this convention the man who would try to organize anything through the congressional machine would be spitting into a tidal wave.

So three things are settled. Bryan will be the candidate, Bryan's idea of what will bear Taft will be the platform, and Bryan will be the vice-president. The vice-presidential nomination will be a mistake as it always is.

"On election day, God forbid there may pass in Panama something, which, like the explosion of the Maine, may serve as a cause so that all of us remain enmeshed in the common conflagration, for it is not true that the Americans are today in the world the heralds of purity of suffrage, and that solely through love of this purity do they come to break lances in a foreign land, whilst in their own country the recollection that ballot boxes full of ballots were thrown into the muddy waters of the Mississippi still remain fresh?"

"We desire pure elections. We want a president to be he who has obtained the greatest number of votes at the polls, but we do not accept the present intervention, because we consider it unconstitutional, inconvenient and dangerous."

The Obaldia party, on the other hand, welcomes the supervision of the election by the United States authorities. The Press, a supporter of General Obaldia, declares that the discontent of the Arias supporters is due to the fear that the intervention of the "big stick" will prevent the carrying out of their plans for stealing the election.

Fear is expressed in some quarters that present peaceful appearances are deceptive and that the malcontents will yet succeed in arousing the people to a widespread revolt that will give Uncle Sam's marines plenty to do in coping with the situation.

Saloon Methods of "Getting Even." A stranger in La Grande made two addresses on the subject of prohibition on the streets yesterday—in the afternoon and evening. When he left his hotel to go to the train last night an attempt was made to shower him with eggs. The attempt was not much of a success, as none of the eggs reached the mark, although about a dozen were thrown. It is not known who was responsible for the disgraceful act.—La Grande Star.

Broke Local Option Law. Sheriff Harry Brown has returned from Klamath Falls with William L. Ford, who was arrested there several days ago, charged with violating the local option law in Lane county, says the Eugene Guard. Ford went there with James Stewart, of Springfield, and had no intention of trying to escape justice. He was arraigned in the circuit court and will plead tomorrow. In the meantime he is at liberty under a bond of \$1000.
