## SHRINERS TAKE THE TWIN CITIES

ONE OF GREATEST MEETINGS EVER HELD

Members of Order from all Points of United States, Canada and Mexico, Clad in Fex and Turban and Flashing Uniforms of Barbic Splendor Journey to St. Paul.

St. Paul, Minn., July 11.—Clad in fex and turban and flashing uniforms of barbic splendor, with clanking swords and glittering insignia, the hosts of the nation's Shriners have today taken possession of the Twin Cities and will begin their annual convention tomorrow. From nearly all over this country and Canada, and even from Mexico, crossing their imaginary desert wastes in special trains of palatial splendor, the Nobles have come to rear their shrine at the oasis of St. Paul. Reception committees from Osman Temple, accompanied by hands, met all the incoming trains and gave the visitors a royal welcome. Throughout the coming week the lavish program of entertainments arranged by the local Shriners, assisted by the nobles of Minneapolis and Duluth, will continue without intermission. The merchants of the Twin Cities have aided by carrying out a decorative scheme such as has never before been witnessed in this city.

The program will begin tomorrow, when services will be held for the benefit of the visitors in all the churches of St. Paul and Minneapolis. For Monday there have been arranged steambot excursions up the Mississippi river to Fort Snelling where the visitors will be entertained at the officers' club. In the evening there will be a grand ceremonial session of Osman Temple at the St. Paul Auditorium. This great amphitheater seats 10,000 square feet. It is so arranged acoustically that the faintest voice can be heard in every corner of the auditorium. This immense stage will be the scene of three sections, the finest that Osman Temple has ever arranged. Theater parties will be arranged for the ladies on this evening. The opening session of the Imperial Council will be held Tuesday. For this the St. Paul Auditorium will be entirely transformed. Side trips have been arranged for the ladies on this day, including launch trips up and down the Mississippi and Minnesota rivers.

Tuesday evening there will be the Shriners' grand electrical parade in which all Arab patrols, bands and other visiting parade features will participate. The streets of St. Paul will be gorgeously illuminated on the "Way of Light." The night parade is expected to surpass anything that has been yet attempted and there will probably be between 15,000 and 20,000 Shriners in line, each wearing the fex and the full dress uniform of the order. Every division will be directed in charge of imperial officers, representatives and potentates from all parts of North America.

The visiting patrols will give exhibition drills in St. Paul ball park Wednesday. It is expected that there will be over 20,000 contestants and in addition drills by visiting ladies' patrols. On this forenoon there will also be steambot excursions up the Mississippi to the Minnesota Soldiers' Home and the romantic Minnehaha falls, made famous in Longfellow's beautiful poem. On Wednesday there will be international automobile races at the state fair grounds which have an area of 247 acres. The track is one of the fastest in the country and the most noted international drivers will take part. The Arab patrols, bands, etc., will parade on Nicolet avenue, the most beautiful street in Minneapolis. The parade will be followed with a banquet and a reception at the Minnesota state capitol.

Thursday will be Minneapolis day. The officers and members of the Imperial Council will be the guests of Zurah Temple. There will be a ride about the city and a trip to Lake Minnetonka. On the evening of this day Noble Gebhard Bohn will tender a reception to the nobles and the visiting ladies. One hundred of St. Paul's young women, gowned in white will serve refreshments. A grand reception will be served at the state capitol in Minneapolis on Friday. The capitol covers six acres and cost \$4,500,000. The entire building will be thrown open to visitors.

**ELKS ARRIVING AT DALLAS.** Twenty-Five Thousand Visitors Already in the City.

Dallas, Tex., July 11.—Evidence is to be seen at every turn in Dallas today that the great national convention and reunion of Elks is at hand. Although the grand lodge does not begin its sessions until Monday, an estimated attendance of 25,000 visitors is already here. The local stations report that the arrivals today will break the record. The Dallas Elks doing escort duty are having a hot time. While many diversions are furnished the visitors, the delegates are already engaged in a lively contest for the election of officers and the selection of a place for next year's convention. Los Angeles is one of the early bidders for the 1909 reunion, but there is abundant evidence

that she will have several strong rivals.

The grand lodge will be opened in the great auditorium at the fair grounds with a musical program and addresses, and elaborate entertainment in the afternoon and evening. The big parade comes on Friday. While the delegates are engaged in their sessions, many entertainments have been arranged for other visiting Elks and their ladies.

**"DRYS" PREPARE FOR MEET.** Prohibitionists Will Nominate Man to Run for President.

Columbus, O., July 11.—Prohibitionists are beginning to arrive for the national convention to be held Wednesday and Thursday at Memorial hall, and the state convention to be held Monday and Tuesday at the board of trade auditorium. Headquarters for the two gatherings were opened today at the Neil house. It is expected that all of the delegates to the state convention will have arrived before tomorrow morning. At various hotels headquarters have been reserved for good-sized delegations from Minnesota, Dakota, Michigan, Montana, Colorado, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas and Iowa. The delegations from New England and the east are expected to be of large proportions, and the south will be better represented than at any of the previous conventions of the party.

The national convention will be called to order at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning by Charles R. Jones, chairman of the national committee. Conspicuous figures in the gathering will be such old-time prohibition leaders as Dr. Samuel Dickie of Albion college, Rev. S. C. Swallow of Pennsylvania, Oliver W. Stewart of Chicago, A. G. Wolfenbarger of Lincoln, Neb., and Felix T. McWhirter of Indianapolis.

The list of presidential possibilities is being added to daily. Among those whose names are being prominently mentioned for the presidential nomination are Seaborn Wright of Georgia, Frederick Wheeler of California, Joseph P. Tracey of Michigan, Dr. J. B. Cranfill of Texas, Alfred Manierre of New York, and Dr. W. B. Peimore, editor of the St. Louis Christian Advocate.

The selection of a vice presidential nominee will depend largely upon what section of the country the presidential choice comes from. Among the candidates are Judge Samuel A. Artman of Indiana, J. B. Lewis, a member of the Massachusetts legislature, and Professor A. S. Watkins of the Ohio Northern university.

The chief business of the convention, aside from the nomination of a ticket, will be the adoption of a platform. It is said that the platform this year will have little to say on any question other than that of the liquor traffic. In the course of the convention proceedings there will be reports and discussion of the present wave of prohibition spreading over the country by leading members of the party.
