### THINKS SHE SWALLOWED TEETH

New York Woman Removed to Hospital Gasping for Breath—Teeth Under Pillow.

New York, July 13.—"For God's sake, doctor, come in quick. My wife has swallowed her false teeth and is dying."

As Dr. Daniel McGuire jumped from his automobile in front of the home of Henry Wagner of New Brighton, S. I., he received this alarming information from Mr. Wagner himself, says the American. He dashed upstairs. Mrs. Wagner was lying on her bed, blue in the face, gasping for breath.

Two physicians from the Smith infirmary were already working over the unfortunate woman. A hurried examination made, an ambulance called and she was hurried to St. Vincent's hospital. After a short consultation the X-ray was applied, but the teeth were not located. There was but one hope now, an operation. Mrs. Wagner, who was hysterical by this time, was made as comfortable as possible and the operating room was prepared.

Dr. McGuire left the room for a moment and was heard giving directions to an orderly. Preparations for the operation continued and they were placing Mrs. Wagner on the table when the orderly dashed in with a package in his hand. It was opened quickly and the missing teeth, which had been found under the woman's pillow, where they had fallen during her sleep, were disclosed.

The latest bulletin from the hospital had it that Mrs. Wagner's ultimate recovery was certain.

### Nobles in St. Paul.

St. Paul, July 13.—Incoming trains this morning brought hundreds of additions to the great throng of Shriners and the imperial officers are already predicting that the St. Paul meeting will be the greatest in the history of the order. ### LA GRANDE HIRES BOOST MANAGER

P. C. LAVEY CHOSEN AS PUBLICITY AGENT.

Fund of \$6000 Will Be Expended in Advertising Resources of Union County—Regular Publicity Bureau Will Be Conducted—Many Settlers Are Expected.

La Grande, like Eugene, has hired a professional booster, or publicity secretary and is now prepared for an active campaign of advertising. The La Grande Observer says of the matter:

The board of managers of the Commercial club met last night and employed P. C. Lavey, late of Muskogee, Okla., where he was successfully engaged in boosting the town, to take charge of the promotion program planned by the Commercial club.

Mr. Lavey is a very pleasant man to meet, and is widely traveled and well read. He has a fund of valuable information gained through several years of active experience in the work he is now entering upon, and the board of managers of the club is to be congratulated upon securing his services.

### SELLS RARE AUTOGRAPHS.

Large Number of Letters of Old Authors Will Be Auctioned Off. London, July 13.—One of the most notable sales of rare autographs that London has known in years will begin today at Sotheby's. American collectors will be well represented at the auction and are likely to carry off many of the rarities.

Among the eminent authors whose letters or manuscripts will be auctioned off are Sir Walter Scott, Charlotte Bronte, Samuel T. Coleridge, Charles Dickens, Lord Alfred Tennyson, Robert Burns and William M. Thackeray.

There is a very important series of 95 letters written by Sir Walter Scott to the Marchioness of Aberdeen between the years 1806 and 1826. They make a total of 353 pages of writing in Scott's hand. It is said that this will be the finest series of his letters ever offered at public auction. His friendship with the Marchioness is well known, and the letters are, as might be expected, of unusually interesting character.

### Prohibition Convention.

Columbus, O., July 13.—With 862 delegates in attendance the Ohio state prohibition convention was opened here this afternoon. In addition to nominating a state ticket, the delegates from each congressional district will nominate candidates for congress. Delegates are beginning to arrive today for the national convention of the party, which will begin Wednesday. A preliminary oratorical program will be carried out tomorrow evening.

### Kansas Denounces Dogs.

Topeka, Kan., July 13.—"The average canine is a worthless, sycophantic, lawn-defiling, flea-breeding, fly-snapping porch loafer," declares F. D. Coburn, secretary of the Kansas board of agriculture and one of the best known agricultural authorities in the land. Mr. Coburn has commenced a crusade against dogs and advises Kansas farmers to raise fewer canines and more sheep.

### NOTABLE HERESY TRIAL STARTS

PRESBYTERIAN MINISTER DOUBTS BIBLE INSPIRATION.

Promises to Become One of Most Famous Trials Church Has Known in Years—Maddox Holds That Salvation Is an Evolution From Within and Not an Importation From Without.

Texarkana, Ark., July 13.—What will probably become one of the most notable heresy trials that the Presbyterian church has known in years will be commenced today by the Ouachita Presbytery, with the Rev. F. E. Maddox, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Texarkana, as the defendant. Dr. Maddox is alleged to have cast doubts upon the inspiration of the Bible and his views of salvation are declared to be heretical. Presbyterians throughout the country will watch the trial with interest, as it will cover practically the same points as have already been decided by the northern church but which have not yet been brought to a final issue in the southern branch of the denomination.

Dr. Maddox holds that salvation is an evolution from within and not an importation from without, that it is a development of a divinely implanted gift and not a new gift divinely implanted. He holds that men are saved from ignorance by education. As to the Scriptures, he holds that they are inspired, but that they are not inerrant. The authors of them were neither infallible nor inflexible, and there is not proof that they were made so by inspiration. The thought of the Bible came from God, but men expressed it as they understood it and in language most intelligible to them and their contemporaries. Scientific and historical errors and defective conceptions of morality are due to the defective knowledge of the writers and may be accounted by the date when the book was written and the elementary training of the author.

The trial of David Swing of Chicago for heresy 30 years ago was based on almost identically the same points which appear in the indictment against Dr. Maddox. In those days Bushnell, Beecher and Swing were pioneers in a transition that had just begun, but which has since swept almost all over the world. It is urged here by Dr. Maddox's defenders that if he is to be prosecuted for some of the same things for which Swing and Beecher were years ago by the Northern Presbyterian church, which has since revised its creed, it would seem that the Southern church, which has not made any progress in the last 30 years, and that the difficulty is not with Dr. Maddox, but with the Westminster confession of faith.

This trial of Dr. Maddox will make the fourth case in which some of the younger men in his church have had trouble. They have been dealt with either by the local congregation or the higher church courts, and two or three of them had to leave the denomination.

The present defendant is a very able and scholarly man, aged about 40 years, who has built a magnificent church, drawn around him a large following of some of the most cultured people of Texarkana and section, whose congregation are with him heart and soul.

The charges are based on utterances in a series of sermons which Dr. Maddox delivered in his church in Texarkana, and which attracted widespread interest in all southwest Arkansas and northeast Texas. Large audiences have heard the sermons and seemed to approve the sentiments expressed therein. Some members of his congregation complained that their pastor was not orthodox, and when the matter was brought to his attention he asked for an expression from the church, which all but unanimously upheld him in his theology.

Among the numerous members, many of whom are the most wealthy and influential families in the city, only one vote was cast against Dr. Maddox. The charges made by the objectors are in reference to Dr. Maddox's views of salvation and the inspiration of the Scriptures.
