**MOORHOUSE HAS  
ANCIENT GUN**

**CITY TREASURER SECURES  
SEEMING VALUABLE RELIC**

Purchases Ancient Looking Weapon of Transient Painter Who Claims to Have Found It—Muzzle Loading Pistol—Was Originally Presented to Captain Hiram Platt.

Major Lee Moorhouse is now the owner of an old pistol that doubtless has an interesting history if it could but be learned. The gun is an old Colt's navy revolver and the major bought it this morning of a transient painter who said he found the gun near Nampa, Idaho. It is a weapon of ante-civil war days for it is a muzzle loader and is fired by means of caps. On a metal part of the gun is an inscription that tells something of its history. The wording is as follows:

"Presented to Captain Hiram Platt Co. F. 10th Reg. Vt. Vols. by the Citizens of Swanton, Vt."

Seemingly the gun was given to the volunteer officer either at the beginning or the close of the war. How well the gift is merited is not known but the records of the war department will show.

Since acquiring the ancient weapon Major Moorhouse has become anxious to learn something of its history and is going to write to Swanton in hopes of getting some trace of the New England captain to whom it was presented.

OUT GEORGE CAREY**

New Proprietor Is Portland Restaurant Man of Experience—Will Make Well Known Eating House a Popular Restaurant—Has Been in Pendleton and in Charge of This House Before.

B. N. Lyman has purchased the St. George restaurant of George Carey and is now in charge of that popular eating place. The deal for the restaurant was completed last evening and this morning the new proprietor took possession.

In every way Mr. Lyman is well equipped to run a first class restaurant at the St. George and it is his intention to do so. He is a practical grill man, having been in the service of the Hotel Portland and also of the Oregon Grill in Portland.

While Charles Holdaway was in charge of the St. George Restaurant he left the management to Mr. Lyman for a time.

According to the new manager he will do his utmost to make the St. George a popular place. He will greatly improve the service and will also have a menu each day that will appeal to his patrons.

Hereafter he will serve a 25-cent chicken dinner from 12 o'clock until 5 on Sundays and from 5 o'clock until 8 he will serve a French course dinner for 50 cents. At other times the restaurant will be run on the regular check system as at present.

**Unique Japanese Palm.**  
Proprietor Judd Fish of Hotel Bowman has just been presented with a Japanese palm, a diminutive, freak plant which is attracting much attention in the lobby of the hotel. The plant was given Mr. Fish by a local Japanese and although but a small, hardy, horny growth it is said to be 27 years of age. The fronds of each year's growth in falling off when mature, form a ring about the cones or body of the plant and the age of the plant may be thus reckoned by the rings so formed. It is a unique plant and so far as is known is the only one of the kind in eastern Oregon.
