## HERMISTON NOTES NEWS OF MILTON

### GARFIELD'S VISIT PLEASURES HERMISTON PEOPLE.

Chief Engineer Davis Makes Some Very Encouraging Remarks Regarding Umatilla Projects—Says in His Estimation Is Best All Round Irrigation Scheme in America—Soon Be Paradise.

Hermiston, July 15.—The people of Hermiston are very much pleased with the result of Secretary Garfield's recent visit here, and the favorable report made thereon. He has given the settlers every chance to get a good start in this locality, and everything looks most favorable for the irrigated section.

Arthur P. Davis, chief engineer of the United States reclamation service, speaks in the highest terms of the Umatilla project. He says: "The extreme fertility of the soil with consequent wonderful production, and the excellent location from a standpoint of shipping facilities and pleasant climate, make the Umatilla project, in my estimation, the best irrigation scheme in America."

Mr. Davis has just paid a visit to Hermiston to inspect the completed Cold Springs dam and reservoir, and that portion of the government's system which is now furnishing water to the settlers. He further said: "The lower California project, Yuma, has perhaps as rich a soil as this valley, but the climate is not nearly so pleasant. The Yakima project might be compared to the project, but your conditions here are more favorable, altitude and early season being in favor of the Umatilla."

The reclamation service has undertaken a number of irrigation schemes throughout the country. Each system is different, the problems of engineering are different, and the conditions of the land and its products are different.

"I am making a tour of several irrigation districts, and have just visited Grande Ronde valley in Colorado, the Sucompagre project in Utah, the Minidoka and Boise projects and the reclamation service looks upon this as a peach and grape country of the very highest excellence, which is found unusual in most projects."

Because of the unusual climatic conditions this year many of the new projects all over the west have suffered somewhat from winds, as the light soil is easily blown when first broken for cultivation. In many places the settlers are having good success when first opening up their lands by thoroughly wetting them before clearing the sage brush off and then sowing rye, alfalfa, wheat or grass. In this way they are able to secure enough of a stand to hold the soil and then the brush can be grubbed out later. This plan has even been successful in getting a start with alfalfa in the Minidoka project, and it will likely do well here.

Now that the Umatilla project is nearing completion, the big dam having been finished, it will only be a short time when this section will be one vast stretch of green fields and hundreds of new people will be located on these lands.

She was unable to tell the officer where she lived, and efforts are being made to find out where she came from.

Harvest is now going on in all directions. So far there are fairly good yields, going from 25 to 35 bushels to the acre, which is a slight decrease from last year's harvest. The quality of wheat is good, and with the present prices maintained, farmers will lose nothing on the present crop.

New York Physician Carries Off Irish-English Bride.

London, July 15.—The big event of the week in London society will be the marriage of Miss Esther Redmond the beautiful daughter of John E. Redmond the famous Irish leader in the English house of parliament, to Dr. William T. Power of New York. English and Irish social leaders are tremendously interested in the event and several American relatives and friends of the young physician are here today to witness the ceremony.

The romance of Dr. Power and the lovely blue eyed, brown-haired daughter of the Irish leader has interested two continents.

It was love at first sight when Dr. Power met the dainty lass several years ago, when John Redmond went to America to preach the doctrines of "Ireland for the Irish." The parliamentarian was accompanied by his daughter, and Dr. Power was on the reception committee.

His friends still tell of how the gallant young physician seemed to forget the greatness of the honored guest in his attentions to that guest's daughter.
