Gooseberries grow in the rich Idaho soil to the size of large plums. This statement may seem to be greatly exaggerated, but it is true nevertheless as the gooseberries, which were seen by an inquisitive reporter, are on exhibition for themselves and were grown in a garden on Hays street, says the Boise Capital News.

The berries were seen in the office of Attorney General Utter today and the first glance at them made it appear that they were fair sized onions or plums. A closer investigation, however, proved that the fruit was in reality samples of gooseberries probably two inches in circumference.

The berries were raised by Axel Nixon, chief draftsman in the surveyor general's department and picked by him off the bushes at his home on Hays street.
