**INLAND EMPIRE  
BANKS ORGANIZE**

**WILL TAKE ADVANTAGE  
OF CURRENCY MEASURE**

Spokane Clearing House Association Takes the Lead—Pendleton Institutions Not Yet Approached—Might Not Go Into Organization if Invited—City Banks Are the Ones Which Need It.

Banks of the inland empire are now planning to take advantage of the emergency currency provision of the Aldrich-Vreeland bill passed by the last congress. Spokane banks seem especially active in the matter and the Spokane Clearing House association is starting a movement to include many of the national banks of the inland empire in an association with headquarters in Spokane.

Thus far the Pendleton banks have not been asked to enter any such association and in the opinion of George Hartman, Jr., of the First National bank, there is no particular need of the local national banks uniting in the movement.

It is held that if the banks in the financial centers combine to take advantage of the emergency currency law the outside banks will be alright as they are. Last fall the difficulty was not with outside banks, such as those in Pendleton, but with the big banks in financial centers.

The following will show something of the workings of the new emergency currency law:

**How They Get the Money.**  
For the purpose of obtaining additional circulation any national currency association or any bank belonging to the National Currency association having circulating notes outstanding secured by the deposit of bonds of the United States to an amount not less than 20 per cent, may deposit with and transfer to the association, in trust for the United States, such of these securities as may be satisfactory to the board of the association. The officers may thereupon make application to W. B.

**CAVALRY BAND  
CONCERT TONIGHT**

**UNDER AUSPICES OF  
BASEBALL ASSOCIATION.**

Famous Musical Organization of 30 Pieces of Fourteenth U. S. Cavalry in the City—Concert at Fair Pavilion Will Last Two Hours—Squadron Encamped at Ball Park.

From 8 o'clock until 10 this evening the 14th Regiment Cavalry Band from Fort Walla Walla, will give a concert at the fair pavilion and those who have been hoping for such an entertainment here will have their wishes gratified.

The concert tonight will be under the auspices of the baseball team and the funds derived from the concert will be used in making up the deficit of \$850 that now confronts the team management.

The 14th Cavalry Band is a splendid organization of 30 pieces and the band is not strange to the people of the city, for it played here for the Fourth of July celebration a year ago. At that time its work was highly appreciated and the band was one of the good features of the celebration.

An admission of 25 cents will be charged for the concert tonight and the management hopes to have the pavilion filled for the occasion.

**Off for American Lake.**  
Shortly after noon today the first squadron of the 14th cavalry reached this city and marching through the city halted at the baseball grounds, where they will bivouac tonight. The squadron is under the command of Captain Hope and comprises four troops.

The soldiers are now en route for American lake to participate in the big encampment to be held there from August 3 to 12 and in which both regulars and national guardsmen will be given valuable campaign experience.

Tomorrow morning the squadron will break camp at an early hour and will march to Echo tomorrow. They are to march to Fort Vancouver and there entrain for Murray station, which is the point at which the troops leave the railroad for American lake.

Nearly all of the regulars, both cavalry and infantry, that are to participate in the American lake maneuvers are now en route or soon will be.

**HAMILTON KNOWN HERE.**

Sensational Portland Robber a Prominent Oregon Athlete.

Fred Hamilton, just arrested in Portland for sensational robbing of jewelry stores, is well-known to many in this city. He was a student at Portland University, the old Methodist school at University Park, at the time when J. R. Raley, Roland Oliver and others attended from this city. Hamilton was a star end on the P. U. team of '95 and was later a member of the Multnomah team.

Aside from his football prowess, Hamilton was also a good baseball player and was here with the Portland Grays this season. Several years ago he was at Heppner, where he coached the football team.

Among those who knew Hamilton there is much regret over his trouble and his case is classed as that of a young man who had splendid prospects, but went wrong through the fact that he never became settled down to the responsibilities of manhood.

Hamilton was of a good family and his sister is a wife of one of the Dollars, a family of California millionaire shipowners.

There is now a large amount of wood on the dumps at Meacham, Kamela and other mountain shipping points and there is no danger of a fuel shortage during the coming winter.

**OKLAHOMA BANK LAW.**

Initiative Petition Being Prepared for Submission to People.

Since the announcement that A. W. Orton of Portland, was preparing to introduce the Oklahoma banking law at the next session of the legislature, it has been learned that George W. Dixon, editor of the Tribune of this place, has been working on the same law with the view of passing it by the initiative and referendum, says a special to the Telegram from Canby. Mr. Dixon is now preparing the initiative petitions and will have them in circulation at the earliest date possible. He said:

"I do not believe the legislature will pass this law at its next session. It seems the majority of the people have had so little time to study the law and the beneficial effect it would bring to depositors and bankers that they are not urging the matter on their representatives in the legislature. The banks will no doubt protest on the ground that it would bring into action a system of paternalism in the banking world, and that it would be unjust to levy a tax on them to protect their depositors. I believe, however, that the people themselves will pass the law by a big majority when they are given an opportunity to vote upon it. The legislator can always offer a plausible excuse to his constituents for his failure to advocate measures in the interests of the people, but the people themselves never allow an opportunity to pass to secure laws designed for their protection against the money leaders of the country."

Mr. Dixon will wait until the legislature closes its next session before filing the initiative petitions with the secretary of state.

**High Water in Jack Canyon.**

A small waterspout occurred at the head of Jack canyon about 3 o'clock last evening and for half an hour water overflowed the banks of the dry creek and threatened to flood a number of gardens and orchards. However, no damage was done and today the creek is dry as usual.
