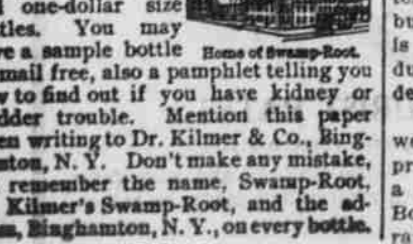

### RAINS DELAY HARVEST UNTIL NEXT WEEK

Many New Combines Will Be Out This Year—Wife of Athena Postmaster Dies After Lingerjng Illness—Dr. Plamondon Will Recover From Severe Illness.

Athena, July 16.—On account of the rains that have fallen in showers since Sunday, harvesting which would have been on in full blast here this week has been postponed until the first of next week. The owners of several machines intended to start work yesterday and today, but the rain has interfered with plans for the present week. The heads are fair-sized and well filled, appearing plump and heavy. Reports from all growers in this section are to the effect that the yield will be heavier than had been expected earlier in the season, and if these conditions are borne out there will be little if any shortage in the sum total of the wheat crop in Umatilla county.

There will be about 15 new combines in this section this season, a carload of new headers, two new threshers, and with plenty of help the growers expect to get along first class.

Willaby Brothers have received a new McRae combine, and they are getting it in working order for harvest.

F. M. Taggart, the grocer, returned Monday from a business trip to Pasco.

Sunday last was the warmest day experienced here for many years. The mercury registered 104 in the shade.

A force of men is employed at the city rock quarry, below town. Rock is being crushed for macadamized street improvement.

Joseph Harper, treasurer of the Preston-Parton Milling company, is in the city from Waitsburg, superintending the removal of the Pacific Coast elevator to the site of the milling plant in the northwest part of town.

C. A. Barrett made a business trip to Adams last evening.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Coolidge are expected to return from Moro, Oregon this week where they have been since the first of July visiting with relatives.

Superintendent Robert Burns of the O. R. & N., was in the city Tuesday from Walla Walla, on business.

Dr. J. D. Plamondon, who has been very seriously ill for some days with an attack of appendicitis, is much improved, and it is thought that he is past all danger.

Camping parties continue to go and come from the mountains to spend a short time during the warm weather.

The Quaker Concert company has been showing here this week to good crowds. They have put up a tent, and will be here the remainder of the week. They appear in vaudeville and specialties.

On Henry Barrett's Pine creek ranch, which is located in the light soil district, wheat averaged 20 bushels to the acre and barley 40 bushels. The yield of wheat was just about double what Mr. Barrett expected it would be in that section this season.

### Well Known Woman Dead.

Mrs. L. A. Githens, wife of the Athena postmaster, died at the home of her daughter at Bandon, Oregon, Tuesday afternoon. Mrs. Githens has long been a sufferer from consumption, and she was taken to Bandon some weeks ago in hopes that the change of climate would be beneficial to her. Besides her husband, she leaves one son and four daughters. The remains will be interred at Bandon.

### Grain Sacks Delivered.

Grain sacks amounting to about 400,000 have already been delivered to the members of the Grain Growers' association in the vicinity of Athena, Adams, Weston and Helix. The farmers are making all preparations to dispose of the usual large amount of wheat here, and with prices which will no doubt be good, the prospects are very good for a prosperous fall season.

### BOISE'S \$500,000 HOTEL.

Bonds Issued for Finest Building in Northwest.

An agreement for the sale of \$500,000 in bonds to eastern capitalists, represented by J. W. Peebles of New York, for the construction of the Boise hotel has been practically agreed upon by the board of directors of the Boise Hotel company, the sale of the bonds to bring money bearing 4 per cent interest enabling construction to be commenced on the magnificent hotel structure at once, says the Boise Capital News.

The details of the agreement have not been worked out as yet, but, as outlined, require the payment of \$75,000 within 60 days after the papers are signed and the payment in monthly installments of the entire amount within six months. W. E. Pierce, president of the Boise Hotel company, has tendered his resignation to the board but it has not been accepted and it is hoped that Mr. Pierce may be induced to retain the position of president.

With the details of the agreement worked out by the board which will probably be done within a few days, a meeting of the stockholders of the Boise Hotel company will be called to ratify the agreement, after which, it
