## HELIX HAPPENINGS NEWS OF WESTON

### HARVEST ABOUT HELIX WILL BEGIN MONDAY.

An Average Yield Is Being Looked for in This Section—Prices Will Be Good—Good Rain Fell Here Wednesday Morning—Well Known Helix Couple Married.

Helix, July 17.—Preparations are being made for harvest which will begin in the Helix country in earnest Monday next. There will be a number of new combines in the field this year, and with plenty of labor at command in the county, the farmers expect to get along first class with the crop. The wheat is looking good, spring grain will be short, but the fall sown wheat will yield on an average of about 20 bushels to the acre, with a great many 35 and 40-bushel yields. With the prices which will be good this fall, the farmers expect good results.

A good rain fell in the Helix country Tuesday night, since which time the air has been considerably cooler. For a time the weather was intensely warm, and some of the workers in the fields were overcome with the heat. The weather had not been so warm here for so long at a stretch in years.

Her majesty has caused it to be known that any woman wearing a pronounced director will not be received at court functions. ### NEGRO TO HANG.

Young Colored Man Pays for Crime With His Life.

Oklahoma City, Okla., July 18.—Will Johnson, a negro youth, who committed a brutal assault upon an aged white woman near Shawnee, causing her death, is under sentence to be hanged tomorrow.

The crime of Johnson was but one of dozens that have been committed by negroes in Oklahoma during the last few months and which have at times threatened to result in a general race war. In some instances pitched battles have taken place between whites and blacks, and over a dozen persons have been killed and many wounded as the result of trouble caused directly or indirectly by the colored "bad men" of the new state. Johnson, who is to be executed tomorrow, strenuously maintained his innocence until his trial, when he created a sensation by suddenly jumping to his feet and loudly declaring that he was guilty. The trial stopped and the jury was instructed to bring in a verdict of guilty, which it did and added the death penalty. The date of the hanging was originally set for May 22, but was later changed to July 17.

While working in a mine at Phoenix, B. C., Tuesday, Edgar Floren was pinned between an ore car and the muck, and his back was broken. His chances for recovery are said to be slight.

### NEW RELIGION LAUNCHED IN WASHINGTON, D. C.

Washington, July 17.—Happiness and joy and personal liberty are the basic creeds of a new religion which has just been launched in Washington by Evangelist Theodore Vallant, son of the late Bishop Vallant.

Already the newest creed has gained many converts and Vallant declares that it will soon spread all over the country. Sunday laws which seek to restrict the innocent sports of the people are denounced by this modern evangelist, who has gained the assistance of leaders in the personal liberty movement. At present, Vallant's church is a local amusement park, where he preaches to enthusiastic thousands.

In regard to his new creed, Evangelist Vallant says:

"The old hell of the old religion, with its flaming fires, its dancing imps in leather hides, its catacombs of dead hopes, and its fumes of sulphur, is a thing of the past. It was adroitly employed to frighten people into the church. Today the modern religion does not prey upon the fears and ignorance of the people. It says God is love, God is light, God is happiness. It bids you come to church with acclamations of joy. It presents a church in which you may smile, and from the portals of which morbidity and fear have been banished.

"My friends, be not deceived. Our Father does not want us to approach Him with long faces and downcast eyes. Go to Him with happiness beaming from your countenance and overflowing from your heart. Take a lesson in happiness from His creatures—the birds, with their songs of praises, the glittering fishes as they flirt about like flashing sunbeams in the silvery waters, or the animals, as they gambol on the green sward. Crime and depravity are unknown to such of God's creatures. It is left for man to be morbid and sorrowful and sinful.

"There is no crime in the entrancing strains of music; no sin in the simple means of enjoyment called games; no secretiveness or wrongdoing in this bright and cheerful glare of God's electricity.

"Blue laws and fanatics will find no place in the religion of the future.

"Those of you who profess to be Christians, I beseech you do not seek to take away the joys of the people by imposing fanatical conditions upon them. Do not waste your energies upon that which does no harm, except you regard happiness as harm. Rather go ye, as God has commanded, out into the gloomy hedges and seek poor, downcast, sinful humanity, and bring them to the light."

### BIG BALLOON RACE

Fitting Climax to Meeting of Shriners in Twin Cities.

St. Paul, Minn., July 17.—With eight of the world's most famous racing balloons as entries, the first international balloon race ever held in the northwest will take place from the state fair grounds tomorrow. The big contest will serve as a fitting climax to Shriners' week and will undoubtedly be one of the most important aerial races ever held in America. Monster air bags from foreign countries will compete against the best in the United States, including balloons representing the St. Paul and Minneapolis clubs.

St. Paul people's entry will be the famous balloon, the "America of St. Paul," the bag that captured second place at St. Louis last year, and which is now the property of L. N. Scott of the Metropolitan opera house, Minneapolis, which, like St. Paul, is fast becoming a hotbed of aerial fanatics, will be represented by Dick Ferris' big ship of the skies, the "United States of Minneapolis." This balloon is the bag that won first prize, the famous Gordon Bennett cup, in Europe, and brought the trophy to America.

The "America of St. Paul" measures 78,000 cubic feet, while the "United States of Minneapolis" measures 75,000 cubic feet. The largest balloon in the world, the "Chicago," owned by C. A. Coey, the taxicab magnate, will be one of the two bags representing the Windy City Aeronautic club at the local meet. The "Chicago" measures 110,000 cubic feet.

The man who will pilot the St. Paul entry in the meet at the fair grounds will be Capt. Percy S. Hudson, a famous aerial navigator, while Col. Shirley of Tennessee will be in charge of the Mill City balloon.

The local meet, the first of its kind ever held in the northwest, will be given by the new aero club of the northwest, and will be under the official sanction of the Federation of Aeronautic clubs.
