The Potato Onion.
J. A. Mock, who now owns a well-kept little place of several acres on Preston avenue, has been raising what he calls the potato onion for the past three years, which is quite a novelty in this country at least, says the Watsburg Times. The onion is of excellent quality, selling at an average of 3 cents per pound and is a tremendous producer. Three years ago Andy procured a few sets at quite a high price. Besides raising enough for his own use he planted last year a patch 12x110 feet—less than 1-16 of an acre, from which was produced 1900 pounds of onions. This year he has in about a quarter acre. Figuring the yield the same as last year on an acre, at 3 cents makes a total of \$480 per acre.

A peculiar thing about this variety of the onion is that the sets grow underground with the onion. One onion set planted in the spring producing a cluster of onions and numerous sets.

The sample we have on exhibition in our office has in the cluster five large onions and 16 onion sets, all produced from a single set planted in the spring.

Hurt in Runaway.

J. S. Houtchens' buggy team became frightened while hitched to a 70-pound tying block in front of the postoffice Tuesday afternoon and ran away, carrying the hitch block with them as though it was so much paper, says the Watsburg Times. No damage was done by the buggy but one horse cut a front leg badly in some manner.

A team being driven by Will Harris became somewhat unmanageable as the runaway team dashed up the street, and before they could be quieted, a stranger who has been waiting for harvest here, and was standing watching the runaway, was struck in the side with the tongue of the Harris hack, with the result that three ribs were found to be broken when he was carried to a surgeon. Considerable sympathy is expressed for the unfortunate man as he is a poor man with a family and will be laid up for several weeks at least.

Oregon Sheep Are Clean.

Of the 2,245,055 sheep in the state of Oregon up to the first of the current month but 2.53 per cent were found to be affected with scab, says the Pacific Homestead. The diseased ones were all dipped twice under the supervision of a federal inspector and all exposed sheep were dipped once. This was done between February 1 and July 1, and on the 1st of September another inspection of all the sheep in the state will be started and

130 Convicts Want Freedom.
The state board of pardons convened for its quarterly session at 9 o'clock this morning in its new headquarters in the administration building, just recently completed at the Washington state prison, says the Walla Walla Bulletin. The deed was to secure this sum to the Metropolitan Trust & Savings Bank of Chicago. The property deeded is the right of way for a railroad beginning at Baker City and extending in an easterly direction to the town of Richland, being a distance of 59 miles more or less.

The deed is for the purpose of mortgage bonds and under the mortgage the railroad is to be under construction within 60 days from the time of the execution of the mortgage.

Time to Spray.

Time for spraying for the second brood of codlin moth will commence Monday morning according to a statement of County Fruit Inspector C. L. Whitney, who says the work of exterminating the pests will have to be very thorough this time, says the Walla Walla Bulletin. This will be the third spraying this year, and is one of the most important outside of the first. The compound to be used this time is three pounds of arsenate of lead to 100 gallons of water.

Prof. Trumble, formerly of the Washington State college, is in the city and will do much of the spraying over the county, farmers having engaged him for the work. Mr. Whitney says the fruit over the county is looking fine, and if it is sprayed properly should turn out well.
