Ship Potatoes to Spokane.

Messrs. C. L. Morgan and R. R. Johnson who have a fine lot of potatoes on their place a few miles from here, shipped a carload of them to Spokane yesterday. They have a ready market for all they have and several more shipments will be made at an early date.

Byron Hunter of the government agricultural department, was a recent visitor here from Walla Walla. He took a great deal of interest in looking over this section, and believes there is a great future for the irrigated districts of Umatilla county.

Only a few laborers are at work on different parts of the irrigation project here, the work at the dam being completed. A considerable force is now at work near Echo, where about three miles of cement lining is being put in.

A number of eastern people have been here of late looking over the lands under the project. Many of them are taking a vacation and while in the west are looking up locations. Hermiston real estate men continue to make good sales.

GRASSHOPPERS.

Farmers Are Alarmed Over Much Damage by Pests.

Pilot Rock, July 21.—Some of the farmers in the vicinity of Pilot Rock have become very much alarmed over the damage being done by the grasshoppers this season. They seem to be in spots, and in various places the second and third cuttings of alfalfa have been almost totally destroyed by them. They have not been known to be so bad for many years, and some declare it is on account of the dry season. Many of the gardens in this section have been almost entirely destroyed by the pests, and altogether the damage will be quite heavy. No material damage has yet been done in the immediate vicinity of Pilot Rock, but many complaints are coming in from a few miles out.

She is but 14 years of age. Hall is still being held in Walla Walla and serious charges may be brought against him.

Mrs. Maggie Vollandorff, wife of Fred Vollandorff of Colfax, died in St. Mary's hospital in Walla Walla, yesterday. The deceased had been camping with her husband near Freewater when she was overcome by illness and had to be taken to the hospital.

Henry Hoffman of Springdale, had his collar bone broken and was otherwise seriously injured Saturday by being run over by some boys on horse back, who were riding so fast and kicking up such a dust they were unable to see him.

The grain harvest in this section of the county is nearly over, and the farmers are better pleased than it was expected. There were many 30 and 35-bushel yields, and it will prove to be an average year. The fruit crop is all that could be desired about here also.

POMP AND PAGEANTRY GALORE IN QUEBEC.

More Gorgeous and Elaborate Than Ever Witnessed Here Before.

Quebec, July 21.—Pomp and pageantry such as has never before been witnessed in the new world will mark the first performance this afternoon of the Quebec tercentenary spectacle on the Plains of Abraham. The day's festivities were ushered in by the arrival of the French and American ships of war, which were given a vociferous greeting by the assembled spectators as they swept past the Isle d'Orleans. A preliminary reception of official guests, including some of the most distinguished men of Great Britain, Canada, France and the United States, followed the arrival of the warships. This afternoon's magnificent performance on the plains, the first of the series, will be witnessed by thousands of spectators from the big grand stand and every other point of vantage. This evening will be given the first performance of Felicien David's symphonic ode, "Christophe Colomb."

His royal highness, the Prince of Wales, will arrive tomorrow on board the British cruiser Indomitable and will make his official landing at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. The prince is accompanied by a brilliant staff and the reception will be the most noteworthy event of the kind in the dominion's history.

MANILA USED AS ASIA'S DUMPING GROUND.

Washington, July 21.—As President Roosevelt honored the late President Cleveland by renaming a California forest "Cleveland," so he is seeking to pay tribute to the coming president—maybe—by removing the stigma of the name of "Land of the Undesirables" from Judge Taft's pet country, the Philippines.

Through the secretary of state, orders have gone out to the American consular representatives at Asiatic ports to discontinue their long-established practice of shipping vagrants to Manila. The Philippines have been made the dumping ground for human trash, who claim American citizenship, it is said, on the theory that at Manila, or vicinity, work may be procured by the wanderlust victims, or that they might be sent on to the states. Such a practice was very nice for the Asiatic ports, but Manila did not see any fun in it, and complained at the cost thus placed upon her. The question of taking care of these stranded persons, or sending them home on a government ship was a vexing one and the authorities of the city and of the islands, complained to the president.

Last year there were not less than 223 vagrants who were provided with transportation. In 140 of these cases the cost of subsistence was paid by the insular government. Some of these are sailors who had been discharged and who had deserted from American sailing vessels either at Manila or at such places as Hongkong, or Singapore, whence they were sent to Manila by the local American consular representative, "on their way home," wherever that might be. Manila is tired of being the capital of the Undesirables and Busted, and her kick has been heeded.
