ROOSEVELT IS GIVEN WARNING

FEVER IS GREATEST DANGER, NOT WILD BEASTS

Denounced African Hunter in Correspondence With President—Gives Teddy Some Valuable Recommendations—No Man Better Qualified to Give Advice.

"Hunting in Africa today is not what it was in the times of Baker and Speke," said Frederick C. Selous yesterday at his house in Surrey, Selous has been reported as being in correspondence with President Roosevelt on the subject of the latter's projected big game hunting expedition on the completion of his term, says a London cable to the Chicago Tribune.

Probably no man is better qualified to give advice on the subject than this renowned African hunter. Indeed, it is more than likely that had the president made his own plans without seeking the counsel of somebody who already had been over the ground of his future cynegetic exploits, he would have caught, at the beginning of his campaign, African fever, which would have placed his life in much more serious danger than the wild beasts.

Selous, a Modest Huntsman. Selous, it should be mentioned, does not himself attribute such importance to his recommendations, but that does not alter their value. The president proposed to enter the hippopotamus country via Egypt, going, no doubt by rail to Khartum, thence by steamer to the headwaters of the Nile. From this point to the head of the Mombassa railway lies the country where big game most abound.

Selous, replying promptly to the letter from Mr. Roosevelt, pointed out that this plan would plunge the president, who never has been in Africa, into the fever-ridden lowlands of south Egypt without the slightest acclimatization. He pointed out that fever, contracted at such an early stage in the African experience, might put a stop to the whole expedition, if nothing worse, and offered a suggestion that a reversal of the route would give an opportunity of breathing African air first in the plateau country of British East Africa, where the president could work slowly, dropping gradually to the dangerous lowlands.

The journey from the head of the Mombassa line to the headwaters of the Nile takes ordinarily three or four months, and the track need be through British territory only. The country is trackless and the journey will have to be made partly by horses and mules and partly afoot.

Can Be Made in Nineteen Days. "You can go from London to Mombassa in 19 days," said Selous. "There agents find four guides, porters and necessities, and in less than two days more you are at the rail head and when you leave the train your game is at hand. Still these advantages have another side. In the days when I first went to Africa man was sovereign, where he hunted as he liked. Now game laws have come into being in all Africa."

However, according to Selous, Roosevelt will find no lack of big game in Africa, even of giraffes, which he erroneously thought nearly to have been exterminated. They are numerous around the equator, ranging over vast stretches of the continent at the widest part and thriving in a country not treeless, but too dry to support the natives. There are only three animals nearly or quite extinct in all Africa—namely, a species of zebra almost stripeless, the grayish hippopotamus, known as the white hippo, and a certain kind of antelope. Most all others are so numerous and so fearless that they range in gunshot of the railway lines and do not depart at sight of a train. Elephants and lions sometimes are seen from car windows and animals of the less voracious sort come to know that a gun never is fired from a train.

Wasco Harvest Will Be Good. J. D. Riggs who lives on the Moore place on Three Mile is beginning his harvesting says The Dalles Chronicle. He is binding his grain this year. The crops in this district are very fair better than they were last year; although the straws are shorter, the grain yield will be good. From James Taylor, who has a fine field of grain, it is learned that he is pleased with the outlook for a good harvest. He says the cold weather so late this season is responsible for the short straws, but that the grain yield will be good. He was out Sunday looking over some fields of grain, and says there have been some spots burned, but in the main, the conditions are satisfactory.

At a meeting of the Spokane Grocers' association, a few nights ago, the banana market was discussed at length and this plan was favored by a number of those present. At present the grocers declare that there is no money made in the banana trade for the reason that the fruit is sold by the dozen.

It is said the grocery dealers purchase bananas from the wholesale houses here by the bunch, the size of the bunch being the only means of deciding the approximate number of bananas purchased. The new plan is said to have been adopted by eastern merchants who have encountered the same difficulties that are now before the Spokane merchants, and it is claimed the scheme is successful.
