**SALOONS DOOMED, SAY DRUMMERS**

**TRAVELING MEN DISCUSS EXTERMINATION METHODS.**

All Sections of Country Represented—Organization Makes Gain in Membership of 500 During Past Year—Will Try to Place Bible in Every Room of Every Hotel in United States.

Louisville, Ky., July 24.—"The Saloon Must Go," is the slogan of the delegates to the ninth annual convention of the Gideons, a national association of Christian commercial traveling men, which was opened in Louisville this morning with a session of the national executive committee. This afternoon the members gathered for a round table conference, at which the principal subject under discussion is methods and plans for bringing about the abolition of the liquor traffic. A demand will also be made that Bibles be placed in every hotel room.

All sections of the country are represented at today's convention, although the organization is especially strong in the northern and western states. This is the first national convention of the body ever held south of the Ohio river.

Tomorrow's sessions will be devoted to the reception of reports from officers, election of officers for the ensuing year and the selection of a place for holding the 1909 convention. The present officers are Charles M. Smith, Detroit, president; J. K. Hemphill, Nashville, vice-president; Neis Rylander, Chicago, treasurer; L. C. Smith, Waukesha, Wis., chaplain, and Frank A. Garlick, Chicago, secretary.

On Sunday many of the traveling men will occupy pulpits in the various churches of Louisville, with a meeting for men in the afternoon and union services in the evening. On Monday a majority of the delegates will go on an excursion to Mammoth cave.

Official reports to be presented will show that the national organization of the Gideons now has a membership of about 8000, a gain of about 500 in the last year.

It is announced that the organization will attempt to raise a large fund for the purpose of putting into effect its plan for having a Bible placed in every room of every hotel in the United States. The public at large will be asked to contribute to this fund for the evangelization of commercial travelers.

The Gideons is a purely evangelistic organization and offers no monetary benefits to its members. Restrictions as to membership require that an applicant be a Christian, a member of some evangelical church; one whose chief business is traveling for commercial purposes, and lastly, that he agree to wear the Gideon button as a distinguishing mark by which he may be known by his fellows.

**MANY OREGONIANS TO IRRIGATION CONGRESS.**

Oregon is likely to have a big delegation to represent the irrigating interests of the state at the next National Irrigation Congress, which is to meet at Albuquerque, N. M., September 29 to October 3, inclusive, says the Telegram. Judge G. T. Baldwin, of Klamath Falls, is to head the delegation, which will be representative of the entire state, although only that portion east of the Cascades is actively engaged in extensive projects at present. The gathering at Albuquerque will be the 16th annual meeting, and steps will be taken to have the 17th at Seattle in 1909. It has been held already in Portland.

The general government has invited foreign countries interested in irrigation to send delegates, and Mexico has already signified its intention to send a large number of men to the congress for the purpose of making suggestions and obtaining information. Mexico has many irrigation systems in operation, and more are projected. F. C. Goudy, congressman from Colorado, is president of the National Irrigation Congress at this time.

**A Curious Ear.**

The catfish uses his lungs as an organ of hearing. The needless lung becomes a closed sac filled with air and commonly known as the swim bladder. In the catfish, as in the suckers, chubs and most brook fish, the air bladder is large and is connected by a slender tube, the remains of the trachea, to the esophagus. At its front it fits closely to the vertebral column. The anterior vertebrae are much enlarged, twisted together, and through them passes a chain of bones, which connects with the hidden cavity of the air. The bladder therefore assists the ear of the catfish as the tympanum, and its bones assist the ear of the higher animals. An ear of this sort can carry little range of variety in sound. It probably gives only the impression of jars or disturbances in the water.
