### YIELDS ABOUT TEN BUSHELS LESS THAN YEAR AGO

Barley is yielding well—Lodge Officers Elected for Ensuing Term—Quarterly Meeting of Methodists Tomorrow—Party Goes to Salmon River.

Weston, July 25.—The wheat yield about here will run about 19 bushels less to the acre than last year. Fields ordinarily good for 40 to 45 bushels are going 20 bushels. However, the high price will bring the farmers' profits up to the usual standard. Barley is yielding much better than wheat. Much of the barley has been going 75 bushels to the acre and wheat 30 bushels. Nearly all the combines are out now, and next week it will be easier to make an estimate.

Messrs. Roberts and Kettel, two enterprising young men of Walla Walla, are arranging to reopen the White House saloon for the sale of near beer. The place has been thoroughly cleaned and overhauled.

### EIGHT HAZERS WERE SENT TO THEIR HOMES.

Cadets Force Plebes to Put Ants in Their Hats.

West Point, N. Y., July 25.—Eight cadets in the United States military academy here have been sent to their homes as a result of hazing members of the fourth class. They were William T. Russell, appointed at large, and Harry G. Weaver Illinois, members of the first class, and Byron O. Jones, New York; George W. Chase, New York; William M. Prude, Alabama; Isaac Spaulding, Oklahoma; William Moltke, Virginia, and James A. Gillespie, of Pennsylvania, members of the third class.

Tonight it was learned that hazing at the academy had been going on during the past three months. Never, it can be said, was evidence of hazing so carefully and skillfully concealed. Even the cadet officers were kept out of the secret, while as for the plebes, as the fourth classmen are called, all took the hazing uncomplainingly.

The form which the hazing took consisted of a requirement that the plebes "fall in" at the first tap of the warning drum instead of waiting the usual five minutes to the final call. The punishment for failure to comply is said to have taken a unique form, embodied in an order to the offender in substance as follows: "Go out into G Company street and pick up 100 nice fat ants, put them in your cap and in half an hour come back, count them, and if any are absent, report accordingly. If all are present or accounted for, put them in your locker until further orders."

The poor plebe thereupon repaired to the company street and for the next half hour or so was the busiest man in his part of the camp. When he had finally corralled the necessary number of ants, he went back and reported. Then the plebe counted them, and, if all the ants were "present or accounted for," he was told to place them in his locker for safe keeping. On the other hand, if an ant was absent, he would probably be ordered out to capture another fifty as an additional punishment.

### Drowned at Lewiston, Idaho.

Clement Wadsworth, an employe of the Evening Teller at Lewiston, Idaho, was drowned in the Clearwater river Wednesday. He went in swimming with several others, and is believed to have been taken with heart failure, as his heart has been troubling him for some time.
