LAWN FETE ON COLLEGE CAMPUS THURSDAY.

Many Campers Near Toll Gate in Blue Mountains—Central School Building Is Being Repaired—Fire From Spontaneous Combustion—Bank Is a First National.

Milton, July 28.—Elaborate preparations are being made for the lawn fete to be given on the college campus here Thursday evening by the faculty and alumni of the college. Besides an excellent literary and musical program there will be several extra features, including a wizard fortune teller from the jungles of India, a wild man imprisoned in an open cage, and various other amusing stunts. The proceeds of the evening will be used in purchasing new furniture for the reception room in the girls' dormitory.

More Campers.
There are an increased number of campers at the French camp near the Toll Gate from Walla Walla and from Milton. A summer camp has been established and people will remain here until September. There are over a dozen Milton people at this camp, while many Miltonites are camped in different places in the mountains.

NEW STAGE SCHEDULE.

Station Established at Willow Springs. Pilot Rock, July 28.—A new mail schedule has been established for the Pilot Rock stage, and went into effect yesterday. The old contract owned by Carney & Kennedy, though just half out, will be replaced by a contract to Sam Carney of Pendleton, who will now have charge of the line between here and the Camas Prairie point. Under the new schedule the stage will leave here immediately on the arrival of the train from Pendleton and will drive to Ukiah, due to arrive there at 6:30 in the evening, and leaving Ukiah at 5 o'clock in the morning it will arrive here at 1:30 p. m. A station has been established at Willow Springs, where the men will change teams each day.

Last week the weather was very warm in the Pilot Rock country. The thermometer registering as high as 108. It is considerably cooler this week, and it is predicted that the month of August will not be as warm as July.

A number of the Pilot Rock people are spending a short time at Lehman springs and different places in the mountains during the warm weather.

G. T. Blair, district grand master of the Artisan lodge, has been here for several days. Twelve new members were initiated into the order while he was here. Pilot Rock assembly, No. 16, is in a flourishing condition. It has been organized 12 years and has a membership of 74.

"DRYS" GAIN BIG VICTORY.

Texas to Vote on State-Wide Prohibition.

Dallas, Texas, July 8.—Returns from the democratic primaries held in Texas Saturday, indicate that Governor Campbell has been renominated by a majority which will probably reach 100,000, on a vote that is in excess of 300,000. The contest between R. V. Davidson and R. M. Wynne for attorney general is close. The latest returns, however, have been favorable to Davidson, the incumbent.

The only other issue that excited interest was whether the question of a constitutional amendment permitting state wide prohibition should be submitted to popular vote, and the returns at midnight indicate that this proposition will be carried, though not by so large a majority, however, as indicated by the earlier returns.

CITIZENS MAY INVOKE RECALL ON OFFICIALS.

Mayor Heitfeld Opposed Reform Element and Lewiston Is Angry.

Lewiston, Idaho, July 28.—The reform forces of the city are preparing a petition asking for the recall of Mayor Henry Heitfeld and Councilmen Phillips, Booth and Salsberg.

The causes which led up to the action are the result of the recent city election, in which three new members of the city council were chosen, and the reorganization of that body effected.

The new members, at a recent meeting began cutting expenditures and chopping salaries, but they were met by a solid front on the part of the holdovers and the tie vote was settled by the mayor voting with the members of the old council. The question of paying is hanging in the balance and may be defeated in the heat of the controversy.

Timber Burned Over.

Forty acres of small timber near Milton has been burned over, causing considerable damage. The fire is supposed to have been caused from a lighted cigar or cigarette.

A large combine harvester, owned by Henry Watrus, of Dayton, Wash., was destroyed by an explosion of smut Wednesday which set fire to the machine and destroyed it. It was valued at \$1,800.
