GALL STONES ARE WORTH MONEY

JAPANESE PAY WELL FOR THEM AS MEDICINE.

Consul General Miller Points Out Neglected Source of Wealth Within Their "Midst"—Hints to Producers—Don't Let Your Surgeon Keep Them.

Oregonian News Bureau, Washington, July 24.—If you are suffering from gallstones, cheer up. You may not know it, but you have riches in your midst. The cheering word comes from far-away Japan that gallstones, so shunned by Americans, possess great value in the Mikado's land—when they can be purchased in the market. If you have gallstones, let them fully develop, undergo an operation, and insist that your surgeon turn over to you every stone he extracts, and, when you are able, ship them to Japan. In due course you will get your return in gold.

The discovery that gallstones had a commercial value was made by Consul General Henry B. Miller of Portland, Ore., now stationed at Yokohama. In discussing his new discovery and pointing the way to the formation of a gallstone trust, Consul Miller, in a report to the department of commerce and labor, says:

"Gallstones are much in favor in this country as a medicine, it being commonly believed that they possess efficacious properties when used in the treatment of diseases of children. They are classified on the market, to distinguish their origin, as Oriental and Occidental, the former being supposed to possess the greater virtue, and, in consequence, being of greater value, though the latter also finds a ready sale at a slightly lower figure.

"The value of the article varies according to its quality, size and color. The larger the size and brighter the color, the greater the market value. Broken or cracked stones are only worth half as much as perfect ones. The minimum price for good, marketable stock and the lowest valuation at which the custom house officials here will pass the invoice is 20 yen, or 20 in gold, a pound avoirdupois. From this figure the price runs up, according to quality.

"A small lot, if properly packed, can be sent by parcels post. To insure safe arrival, each stone should be separately wrapped in cotton wool and packed neither loosely nor tightly, but firmly in a substantial wooden or tin box. A convenient sized box, we find, runs about 2 1/2 x 3 1/2 inches. Insurance ought to be effected at the time of shipment, and it might be well to register the package."

ADDRESS CONSULAR OFFICERS. The Names of the Officials Should Not Be Used.

With the many changes now occurring in the consular service, the following from Consul Isaac A. Manning, at Cartagena, is timely:

The habit of American business concerns in addressing correspondence of a commercial character to consular officers in their own names makes it impossible for a new occupant of a post to distinguish between letters of a personal and letters of a public character which may come addressed to his predecessor. If the letters are of a personal nature, his successor does not desire to open them. If they are of a public character and are forwarded to the former consul at his new location, he is put to the unnecessary and sometimes burdensome expense of repaying postage thereon at the rate of 5 to 10 cents per half ounce on letters which interest him not at all in his new station.

This also means delay in the correspondence and oftentimes loss of the letter. Commercial houses should address all mail simply "American Consul General," "American Consul," etc., or in case of using the name of the consul, stamp or write the words "official character" on all mail.

How a Hat is Sized. C. writes that the size of a hat is calculated on a curious principle. It is the length plus the breadth divided by 2. Thus a head 8 1/4 inches long and 5 3/4 inches broad would require a hat size of 14 1/2, divided by 2, which is 7 1/4—Gladstone's size.

Your correspondent C. is perfectly right in his description of the curious way in which the size of a hat is obtained, writes G., but his sample dimensions are slightly misleading. Such an "oval" as 8 1/4 inches by 5 3/4 inches would scarcely be met with twice in a lifetime. The normal difference between the length and width (technically called the "oval") is invariably through the gamut of sizes 1 1/2 inches. Thus an ordinary 6 3/4 hat would measure 7 1/4 inches long and 6 inches wide and a 7 1/4 (four sizes bigger) 8 inches long and 6 1/2 inches wide. The longest head I have measured in many thousands was 8 1/2 by 7 1/4, which is the equivalent of a 2 1/2 inch oval. Needless to say, the inside of the hat was the shape of a canalboat. — Manchester Guardian.
