### Where is Boundary Line?

A strip of land about a quarter of a mile in width and 18 miles in length lies between Spokane and Stevens counties, says the Spokane Chronicle.

The title to it might be claimed by either county, but neither can prove possession.

The people living in this strip have taken advantage of their peculiar condition, and many of them are not paying taxes in either county, claiming when the assessor of Spokane county comes along that they are residents of Stevens county, and vice versa when the assessor happens to hail from Stevens county.

What makes this possible is that the boundary line between the two counties is so uncertain as to make it impossible for any one to say just where it is.

When Spokane county was cut off from Stevens county the legislative enactment creating this county described the boundary in such a manner that the line dividing Spokane county from Stevens county on the west started from the junction of the Little Spokane river with the Spokane river and thence ran north to the township line between townships 23 and 30, thence east to the Idaho line.

East Portland to Have the First Woman's Apartment House.

Portland can claim distinction on many good things, but to be the first city to build an apartment house for self-supporting women is looked on as an enviable record to have.

The plans for the West side bachelor women's apartment house are already drawn. I have seen them, and they are ideal, even to a usable roof, says a writer in the Telgram. Nothing has been overlooked to make the woman comfortable at her home in her own individual nest. W. M. Morgan, architect, is planning this.

To be sure, there have been hotels built for women in which they were herded and fed and governed by rules, but that is a very different thing from this, which provides an actual home for each woman in which she is sole mistress. Still every woman who has the right spirit and lives in a place of this kind will never lose sight of the fact that in some things she must think of the house as an individual with a character and a reputation to maintain and preserve, and she will therefore never do anything to smirch the fair fame of this aggregation of little homes of which hers is one.

She will be proud of the house as a whole and do her own part towards keeping up the tone of it as a whole, never forgetting that an apartment house for women will need the self-respecting care of its every inmate if it is to remain what she would have it be—an institution of which everybody in the city will be proud.

It is sad to look back and think of all the miseries working women have undergone in their efforts to house themselves in the past, and it is equally inspiring to look forward and feel that this West Side house which Mr. Morgan has so well designed will be but the first of many, as this will undoubtedly be completed before the East Side house on the Madison Villa property, and so will set the pace for other cities.

### FEDERAL COURT ON VACATION.

### DEMOCRATS \$1 PER PLATE.

Washington Followers of Bryan to Assess Themselves for Dinner.

Every democrat in the state of Washington is to be assessed \$1 for campaign expenses, but those who are able to give more will not be limited to that amount, says the Spokane Chronicle.

Among the resolutions passed at the meeting of the democratic state committee held in Tacoma last week were the following:

county, acting together, collect \$1 from each democrat not a member of a club.

That all democrats whose financial condition permits them to contribute more than \$1 be requested to do so.

That it is the purpose of the state central committee to start to work procuring contributions immediately and send as much money to the state headquarters as possible before September 8.
