Signor De Caprio, Who Established Reputation for Himself and the Umatilla-Morrow District Fair, Is Coming to Pendleton Again—Will Bring Organization of 25 Pieces.

Signor A. De Caprio, the popular and well known bandmaster of Portland will again furnish music for the third district fair to be held in this city September 28-October 3. Under the terms of the contract which was accepted by Signor De Caprio in Portland yesterday he is to furnish a band of 25 musicians and will supply music every day and night for the fair and for such parades as the fair management may decide upon.

Signor De Caprio furnished the music for the first district fair held here two years ago and gave entire satisfaction and that the fair will be supplied with a high grade of rousing good music again this year is assured.

De Caprio is one of the most popular band leaders on the Pacific coast and his services are sought after everywhere. He is under contract with the city of Portland to furnish band music for the city parks for this month. He now has an excellent aggregation of musicians and will bring the best to Pendleton that it will be possible to secure.

**Y. M. C. A. LEADERS
ARE GETTING BUSY**

**PENDLETON TO BE NEXT
FAVORED NORTHWEST TOWN.**

Work of Association in Northwest Making Big Strides—Doing Much for Young Men of Larger Cities and Colleges—Circular Letters Being Sent Out by I. B. Rhodes.

Renewed activity is taking hold of the Y. M. C. A. in the two state associations of Oregon and Idaho, and circulars appealing to the better sentiments of the citizens of these states are now being sent out by I. B. Rhodes, secretary at Portland.

The association is growing and is doing an immense amount of good and Pendleton is the next big town in the northwest to secure a Y. M. C. A. building.

The following interesting circular letter from Secretary Rhodes has just been received by the East Oregonian and it is gladly given space in the hope that it may stimulate interest in this worthy institution. Mr. Rhodes says:

Assuming that you are interested in the welfare of boys and young men, we are writing to secure your interest and co-operation in the work that is being done by the Young Men's Christian association. The modern association is a well organized force for righteousness and clean, manly living in those cities and communities where it is organized.

Not only is it established in our larger cities, in most of which it has well appointed buildings, but it is also organized among men in our colleges and universities, among railroad men, in the small towns and country communities through the county associations, and in lumber camps, mines, etc.

In addition to what is done by regularly organized associations, much has been accomplished by state executive committees in places where there are no associations, through such means as holding special meetings and classes for young men, introducing young men going to the cities to responsible persons through a system of correspondence, and providing a wholesome place of recreation at military encampments.

In Oregon and Idaho there are nearly 200,000 boys and young men, a large percentage of whom are away from home and subject to the temptations common to young men. The association is already established among them with a four city, one railroad, one county and 15 college associations, with a total membership of over 4000.

There is still a larger unoccupied field, involving 15 cities with 4000 population or over, most of which are asking for associations; five railroad division points, three or four counties where it is feasible to organize, with from 1000 to 2000 boys each; and a score or more industrial centers among lumbermen and miners.

This work of extension and organization is entrusted to the state executive committee which also supervises the associations already established and promotes other activities at unorganized points as suggested in the paragraph above. Experience has proven that the co-operation of the state committee is absolutely essential to the successful establishment and operation of local associations.

This feature of association work is supported entirely by voluntary contributions. A number of men throughout both states are already giving to make it possible. Many more, however, are needed to join with them, if we are to meet the demands indicated above. We want you to have a share in this.

Desolation lake lies about 125 miles southeast from Pendleton, in Grant county, in the heart of the Greenhorn mountains, and is one of the most beautiful spots in Eastern Oregon.
