NEW TEACHERS ARE ELECTED

DEPARTMENT OF MUSIC AND DRAWING ADDED.

Miss Flora Cairn of Michigan, Will Head New Department—Miss Kahley to Teach English—Miss Sharp for Hawthorne School—Debate and Oratory Will Be Feature of High School Work.

A new department, that of vocal music and drawing, for all the grades, including high school, has been adopted by the Pendleton school board and will be inaugurated at the opening of the school year next month.

In speaking of the new department this morning, Principal Hampton of the high school, said it is one which is being rapidly adopted by all the leading cities of the west as well as the east and which is coming to be recognized as important.

The Pendleton schools will be fortunate in this respect this year, in as much as Frank D. Carruth, the new instructor in the commercial department, is a band and orchestra director of experience. It is therefore very probable that the high school glee club this year will be accompanied by an orchestra.

Two other vacancies in the teaching force have been filled at a recent meeting of the school board: Miss Catherine Kahley of Ohio, was elected to the position of teacher of English and mathematics, while Miss Carrie Sharp of Athens, was employed as teacher of the third grade in the Hawthorne school.

In speaking of the work in the high school for the coming year, Principal Hampton said this morning that he is looking forward to one of the most pleasant and successful years of school work in which he has participated. He recently attending a meeting of the state debating league at Eugene and he says debating is to occupy a prominent part in the Pendleton high school this coming year.

Last year was the first of the existence of the league and he found at the Eugene meeting a great deal of enthusiasm among its promoters. The first year had proved every inch the success that had been hoped for and all were determined to make it a permanent fixture in the school life of the state.

Mr. Hampton says the literary society work which directly promotes debating, is to be carried on from the very opening of school this year, in order that the students may have the benefit of as much training as possible.

The oratorical work is to be made a feature also and it is hoped that Pendleton may again win the eastern Oregon championship, as was done last year when Harold Warner carried off the honors at Baker City.

DRY FARMING SPECIMENS.

Wyoming Colony Makes Success of Desert Farming.

Hon. J. M. Carey returned from Wheatland yesterday with specimens of crops which are growing there this year and which are doubtless the equal if not the superior of anything which has yet been produced in Wheatland, considering that the growing season is not yet anywhere near ended, says the Cheyenne Tribune.

The same conditions of frequent rain and warm sunshine which have produced such wonders on the dry farming tracts in this county have also produced wonderful results on the older and more mellow lands at Wheatland, and the results are really wonderful.

Judge Carey placed several specimens of grain in the exhibit room on Capitol avenue, where they are attracting much attention.

Among the crops of which specimens were brought to Cheyenne is headless barley, which was sowed, ripened and harvested in 65 days and has beautiful, well filled heads.

Some of the prettiest alfalfa ever seen here is among the specimens, and it is a second cutting, the first cutting having been completed on July 5, so that this second cutting, which is nearly three feet high, grew in a little over three weeks.

Oats nearly five feet in height, and not yet mature, and hard Minnesota spring wheat, which is already over five feet, are other specimens, and are beautiful demonstrations of the richness of Wheatland as well as of the fact that the Wheatland colonists know how to farm.

Big Land Deals.

M. E. Downs of New York and Seattle, was in the city today and closed up a deal with J. R. McKeand for a section of land in the lower Yakima valley, paying for it the sum of \$25,000, says the Yakima Republic. Mr. McKeand bought the land a year ago for \$12,800.

Mr. Downs has recently purchased 15,000 acres north of Kennewick from the Northern Pacific and has also bought the Grosseup ditch and water right. The price paid for the land was \$12.50 an acre, so that the entire deal amounted to over \$200,000.
