### IDEAL CLUB.

#### Successful Meeting Held Last Night—Reception Planned for Students.

The Ideal club held a very interesting social at the M. E. church last night. A number of young people were present. A committee of six was appointed for the purpose of arranging an elaborate affair for the 11th of September, that being the second Friday night in the month. It will be a reception called "A students' reception," from high school and academy students. There will be a program in the auditorium of the church for the students and the public, composed of music, recitations and interesting features of about a dozen numbers. Then a social time will be arranged for the students and their friends in the basement, with games and refreshments. The Ideal club has demonstrated that the young people can have good social gatherings even during the hottest months of the summer. This organization is growing rapidly and doing good work.

#### Requirements for Yakima Teachers.

Directors of the North Yakima school district have put the "com- either" on the school teachers who are hereafter to instruct the youth of North Yakima. Teachers will not only be required to be up to date, but they will be required to keep themselves so, says the Yakima Republic.

This is an age of progressiveness in educational matters, as in everything else, and there exists, the school directors believe, a necessity that those engaged as school instructors here maintain their qualifications. To this end the board has decided unanimously that all instructors in the service of the North Yakima district must hereafter spend 30 days in study at a university or recognized normal school, at least once in every two years, or else forfeit their positions.

This action of the board is the result of a conviction which has been growing that there exists a great necessity for teachers to keep up to date in educational matters. Nothing is said in the way of criticism or that there has been any failure to keep so posted. Merely a standard is set for the future.

#### Ship Sheep to Montana.

Realizing that the sheep of eastern Oregon are of superior grade Ray Bros., the large sheep dealers of Billings, Mont., have their agent, Mr. Fleming, in this section of the country, making large purchases.

Last evening C. A. Brown, of Condon, arrived here with a band of sheep, but Agent Fleming had not yet arrived, hence the sheep were not received by Ray Bros. until today. Dr. H. E. Pinkerton, federal sheep inspector from Pendleton, is in the city and has inspected the band which is required before shipping. Six double-decked sheep cars were loaded out for Billings and it is stated that the firm buying these will in a few days take out a great many more. The price paid for the sheep purchased is considerable lower than last season's prices, but it is claimed they yet bring sufficient money to make the business profitable.

#### Irrigation Contracts in Mexico.

The first contract made by the Mexican government under the new irrigation law since its enactment, according to the Mexican Herald, has just been signed by Minister Olegario Molina, of the fomento department, and Diego Redo, of Mazatlan, who obligates to build all the necessary works for the use of the waters of Rio San Lorenzo in the state of Sinaloa, sufficient to irrigate an area of 10,000 hectares (hectare equals 2.47 acres) of land within 10 years. Each hectare to be supplied with not less than 10,000 cubic meters of water per year. The government will grant a subsidy of \$25 (\$12.50 gold) per hectare of irrigated and cultivated land.

#### Exports and Imports.

The exports of merchandise from the United States for the 11 months ending with May, 1908, aggregated in value \$1,745,190,911, the largest in value in the history of the nation. The aggregate imports were, for the same time, \$1,102,533,752, a decline from the corresponding period of a year ago of \$219,377,458. The exports increased over those for the corresponding period of a year ago to the amount of \$2,079,463. The excess of exports over imports for the 11 months was \$642,657,159, a larger excess than for any corresponding period.
