**STRIKES MAIL ORDER WHISKY.**

Georgia Court of Appeals Puts Ban on Liquor Solicitation.

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 11.—Judge Richard B. Russell today in the Georgia court of appeals, with the concurrence of the entire court, rendered an opinion to the effect that the solicitation of orders by mail in another state for whisky or other intoxicating beverages in the state of Georgia, as well as in the state by any individual or corporation, is a violation of the laws of the state of Georgia, and any person making any such solicitation is guilty of a crime against the state.

**Brother Against Brother.**

Chicago, Aug. 11.—"John involved me in this case through revenge because I refused to send him money. I am not afraid to go back to San Francisco and face the charges. It is a case of revenge and blackmail by my brother," declared Peter Claudianes, the San Francisco Greek, arrested here charged with complicity in the Gallagher dynamiting outrages in Oakland. His brother John confessed to placing the bomb under the Gallagher home, saying Peter knew all about it.

**Laborers Are Robbed.**

Chico, Cal., Aug. 11.—Fifteen men were held up by two highwaymen and robbed of \$700 on a lonely road near Sterling City, near here, according to a report. The victims were lumbermen who had just been paid.

#### MAY SUE JUDGE LANDIS FOR \$50,000 DAMAGES.

Ex-Captain in United States Army Sent to Prison in Face of Writs Issued by Judge Grosscup.

Judge Kenesaw M. Landis of the federal court probably will be sued next week for \$50,000 damages for false imprisonment, says a dispatch from Chicago.

The suit is to be instituted by Daniel P. Keller, formerly a captain in the United States army, who was sent to the federal penitentiary at Fort Leavenworth last Saturday by Judge Landis to serve a two years' sentence for stealing government checks.

The legal proceedings against the judge will come as the aftermath of the long and bitter feud between Judge Landis and Judge Peter S. Grosscup. Attorneys W. A. Adams and W. M. Yeatman, representing Keller, alleging that Judge Landis used a mittimus committing the army captain to the penitentiary at Leavenworth in the face of writs of supercedens and error which had been issued by Judge Grosscup.

For some time Judge Landis and Judge Grosscup have not been on speaking terms, and the breach became wider when Judge Grosscup wrote the decision for the court of appeals reversing the \$23,240,000 fine imposed by Judge Landis on the Standard Oil company. The suit to be filed by Captain Keller against Judge Landis will result in both jurists being called into the state courts to testify.

It was charged that Keller collected more than \$50,000 on forged checks.

#### LIGHTS MATCH; IS SHOT.

Revolver Is Accidentally Jerked from Pocket and Discharged.

Weiser, Idaho, Aug. 11.—Charles Horton, a young man about 21 years of age, was accidentally shot in the leg just above the ankle. Both bones of the leg were broken. He is in a hospital in this city. The wound is serious, and it may be necessary to amputate the leg.

The shooting was done with a 44-caliber revolver. Horton attempted to light a match on his trousers, when his hand caught on a key ring chain in the pocket, jerking the revolver out. As it fell to the floor it was discharged.

#### RED BRAVE SLAYS SQUAW.

Mrs. "Jim" Letts Dies at Hand of Drunken Spouse.

Toppenish, Wash., Aug. 11.—Mrs. "Jim" Letts, an Indian woman, was killed last night by her husband, while drunk. Another Indian and squaw were implicated in the affair, the woman being horribly beaten, evidently with a club. Deputy Sheriff Liggett and Coroner Frank arrived on the scene this morning. Letts can not be found this morning, and it is supposed he has made for the mountains. Many Indians have been drunk of late on the reservation.

#### LAD DIES TWICE IN DAY.

Boy Supposed to Be Drowned Is Brought to Life by Father, only to Expire Suddenly Later.

Noblesville, Ind., Aug. 11.—Nelson Pfaff, aged 15, son of Jacob Pfaff, a well-to-do farmer, died today under remarkable circumstances. He and several companions went to Cool creek to swim. Young Pfaff was the first to enter the water, and soon after leaving the bank he sank. His failure to appear on the surface in a reasonable time frightened his companions, who ran for assistance.

Jacob Pfaff, the father, was the first to reach the scene, and he did not arrive until the boy had been under the water 20 minutes.

The lad was found without much difficulty, and limp and apparently dead he was carried out on the bank by the father, who worked with him 10 minutes before he began to manifest signs of life. The motion of a muscle here and there caused the father to renew his energies to bring the boy back to life, and after an hour's hard work he succeeded, the lad finally recovering sufficiently to walk home. A physician was called, the water pumped out of the boy's stomach and lungs and he was pronounced out of danger.

An hour after the physician left the home the lad suddenly became worse and died in a few minutes.

#### WINS HER CASE BY SHOWING

HER SPLIT GOWN IN COURT.

Actress Arrested for Wearing New Fangled Skirt in Public Is Set at Liberty.

Muncie, Ind., Aug. 11.—"Now, that doesn't look so badly, does it?" asked Miss Isabelle Turner of Justice Pierce. The comely young actress was arraigned for appearing in the streets

in a director's gown, and as she asked the question she exhibited a shapely calf and ankle through the slit in the garment.

Justice Pierce was hearing the case against the actress, and of course was unable to express an opinion, but the fact that he acquitted her of the charge of public indecency was proof that he thought it did not "look bad."

After the trial Justice Pierce said: "The director's gown is modest in comparison to some of the sights you see on any rainy day."

**Needle Point Stabs Heart.**

Warsaw, Ind., Aug. 11.—Within five minutes after she awakened her mother, early today, to tell of a peculiar sensation that had come over her, Miss Violetta Bowen, aged 16, died from leakage of the heart.

It is one of the most peculiar cases that has ever come to the attention of local physicians. A post-mortem examination developed that a minute sharp instrument, resembling the point of a needle, had entered her heart through the arteries.

Frequently during the past few months Miss Bowen complained of piercing sensations, first in her hand, then in her forearm, next in the shoulder and finally in the chest.
