

WHERE HARRIMAN IS RUSTICATING

DESCRIPTION OF FAMOUS PELICAN BAY LODGE.

World's Greatest Railroad Wizard Has Ideal Retreat in Southern Oregon, Far from the Madding Crowd—Everything that Money Can Buy Has Been Secured for Comfort.

Klamath Falls, Ore., Aug. 12.—Pelican lodge is in readiness for the coming of E. H. Harriman, his two sons, wife and other members composing the Harriman party. The lodge is situated on the western shore of the Upper Klamath lake, at the base of Pelican mountain, and is about two and a half hours' boat ride from Klamath Falls.

The Lodge, as the place has always been called, is perhaps back half a mile from the lake, on Pelican creek, a stream of water so clear that the smallest pebbles can be seen rolling on the bottom. The creek is bordered on either side by willows and other shrubbery, and on account of its many windings is very picturesque. Its source is two large springs that bubble forth the clearest, coldest water imaginable. It has been analyzed and the report is that it contains practically no solids and is of exceptional purity.

The trout fishing in this stream and out in the bay is very fine. Trout of almost incredible size can be seen out in the bay, but it is not often that the largest can be hooked, as they are too wary. The largest ever reported caught in Pelican bay weighed 22 pounds and was caught by J. P. Lippincott of the reclamation service. Short creek, crystal creek and numerous other small streams emptying into Pelican bay are good fishing grounds and picturesque streams.

The buildings at Pelican lodge are not greatly changed from what they were when it was Klamath's most popular resort. A large two-story log house is used for the dining room and kitchen and servants' quarters, and the sleeping apartments, office, etc., are in smaller rustic cabins and tents.

Mrs. Harriman's cabin has a pretty rustic porch, facing a large stone outdoor fireplace among the pine trees. The cabin has three rooms and is furnished with hot and cold water, as are all the other cabins and tents.

Above the cabins is a group of eight or ten tents with raised board floors and boarded half way up, the top half being covered with screen. These are the sleeping apartments of the gentlemen of the party and contain nearly all the comforts of home.

Paths have been made among the pines of a sort of cinder rock found in abundance near the lodge, and along the paths up and down the hillside are rustic seats. The trees are all hung with electric lights for illumination at night.

Every care has been taken for the comfort of the party and the table will be furnished with the best the season affords, as a small cold storage plant makes its quota of ice every day.

The best hunters of this section have been engaged for several months and all arrangements for various hunting trips around the base of Mount Pitt and over the divide to the headwaters of the Rogue. Row boats and launches are in readiness for the fishermen.

One large Royal touring car is at the lodge and another is to come with the party to convey it to Crater lake.

"LONG DISTANCE" WALKER.

Alleged Army Sergeant Walks Across Continent in 63 Days.

A tall athletic looking man, who said his name was Walsh and that he was a sergeant in the United States army, walked into the city hall yesterday and asserted that he had walked all the way from San Francisco, says the New York Sun.

He said that his regiment was stationed at the Presidio in San Francisco and that he got a furlough in order to win a wager he had made that he would walk across the continent in record time.

Walsh declared that he had walked from the Pacific coast in 63 days, 23 hours and that the previous best record was 75 days. He had with him several memorandum books containing about 2000 signatures of the mayors or some other executive official of the cities and towns through which he had passed. Acting Mayor McGowan added his name to the list.

The wager, Walsh said, was made by Colonel John Wand of San Francisco, who put up \$25,000 with some members of the Golden Gate Athletic club that he could find a man who could walk from coast to coast in less than 75 days.

Walsh was selected by Colonel Wand, so Walsh says, to do the trick, and according to his statements yesterday in the city hall he did the journey with about a dozen days to spare. Walsh had a long tale of adventures to tell. One of the stories was a description of how he had killed a man in Wyoming who had tried to hold him up.

STARVING MAN SAYS HE IS A COUSIN OF JAY GOULD.

Aged Speculator in Mines Loses His Fortune and Becomes a Public Charge.

Melvin A. Gould, who says he is a second cousin of Jay Gould, is dangerously ill in the county hospital in Los Angeles. He is 70 years old, and is suffering from lack of proper nourishment. The old man has been living in his own cottage and has been cared for by his foster daughter, whom he had befriended in former years. She is said to be no longer able to care for him, and he must become a county charge.

There is a mortgage on the cottage and, if he dies there, will be hardly enough money to bury him. He once was wealthy. Most of his property was turned into cash in order that he might speculate in mines. He lost thousands of dollars trying to develop a claim that was worthless.

Wheat Goes 45 Bushels.

Threshing was commenced on the John Kennedy place Monday. Mr. Kennedy has one of the finest pieces of grain in this section. George Barber, recently from Illinois, who is working for Mr. Kennedy, brought in a sample of the grain a few days ago taken from an 80-acre field. The grain is of the Canadian club variety and that brought in by Mr. Barber measures a little upward of six feet in height and the heads are unusually large and well filled. Several of the heads shelled out showed 74 grains.

Mr. Barber says he has traveled pretty much over every state in the union, but never saw grain that equals this. Practically the whole field is as good as the samples shown and the yield, he thinks, will be at least 45 bushels to the acre.—Culdesac Register.
