## ATTORNEY GENERAL DECIDES FOREST SERVICE NEW ARTICLES ARE LEGAL

A clause in the agricultural appropriation bill affecting the forest service has been the subject of a recent opinion by the attorney general. The clause provided that no part of the appropriation for the forest service "shall be paid or used for the purpose of paying for in whole or in part the preparation or publication of any newspaper or magazine writers and publishers, of any facts or official information of value to the public."

The question was submitted to the attorney general by the secretary of agriculture, whether this provision of the law prohibited the sending to newspapers, writers, and others of such statements as it has been distributing in the past. To this inquiry the attorney general replied:

### MEN STAY TOO LONG AT CHURCH TO SUIT WOMEN.

Complain that Cigars and Moving Pictures at Service Are as Bad as a Lodge.

Atlantic City, Aug. 11.—Asserting that the men's church, at which husbands and fathers are allowed to smoke and sit in shirt sleeves, is too attractive, a score of women have complained to the Rev. Synley Goodman, pastor of the new idea congregation, that their male relatives would rather go to church than stay home. The protest took the form of a letter read before the male congregation by the pastor last night. He refused to give out the names of the women who made the protest.

"Church is all right for men, but our husbands are staying out as late Sunday night to attend your service as they do on lodge nights," said the letter. "We insist that some of the attractions be cut out or else the services be cut down so that they can get home in decent time."

So pleasant have been the Sunday night meetings at the men's church that the attendants insisted on the services being strung out longer and longer, with its program of music and singing, interspersed with moving pictures, soft drinks and cigars. As a result of this protest the meeting will be opened earlier next Sunday night and closed an hour earlier, which will allow all the men to get home before 10 o'clock.

### TWO GIRLS DROWNED BY ODD ACCIDENT.

Hurled from a Motor Boat by a Quick Turn, Although the Craft Is Not Capsized.

Oswego, N. Y., Aug. 11.—Miss Thera Parker of Oswego and Miss Millie Sutton of Newark, N. J., were drowned in the Oswego river here tonight.

They were of a party of seven, three men and four women, who went out on the river tonight in a motor boat owned by P. G. Campbell. The boat was caught in a swift current. To avoid it the steersman made a quick turn and the strain presumably broke the steering gear, for the boat suddenly veered violently about, at the same time hurling Miss Parker and Miss Sutton into the water. The boat was not capsized and the others were rescued from the disabled craft by persons who witnessed the accident.

### FIRE EATS UP PINE TIMBER.

Blaze Beyond Control of Forest Rangers, Who Are Unable to Secure Help—Rain Needed.

Prineville, Ore., Aug. 11.—Reports from the burning district in Central Oregon indicate that not less than 6000 acres west of Spring river have been totally denuded of timber, and the fire is still burning fiercely.

The timber is owned mostly by the Deschutes Lumber company, which is the heaviest loser, and is within the limit of the Freeman national reserve. The rangers are totally unable to handle the fire or get sufficient help, and they estimate the timber will burn for months unless a heavy rain falls.

A rain is the only thing that will save an enormous amount of silver pine from destruction.

### CHINESE CO-EDS AT CORNELL

Two Girls from the Orient Studying German and Latin. Ithaca, N. Y., Aug. 11.—For the

first time in the history of Cornell two Chinese co-eds have registered at the university summer school. The young women from the Orient are Miss P. H. Hu and Miss E. L. Soon, and they are both taking a special course in German and Latin. Similar in appearance and wearing the latest style of American-cut clothes, the co-eds speak excellent English and are said by the professors to be first-class students. Miss Soon will study advanced German and is planning to teach that language in China as soon as she returns home, which will probably be next year. Miss Hu, whose brother is also a student here, has been attending Walnut Hill school, in Natick, Mass. She is specializing in Latin, which she, too, plans to teach at home.
