

"LITTLE PILL" ON BLACK LIST

OREGON SOLON WILL INTRODUCE AN ANTI-BILL.

Washington's Law Will Be Presented to Oregon Legislature in Order to Abolish "Coffin Nails"—Measure a Drastic One But Not Enforced in Neighbor State.

Death to the cigarette, says Oregon and to that end Representative McDonald of Multnomah county, is planning on introducing Washington's pill law in the Oregon legislature, and intends to get it passed.

If Representative McDonald has his way the Oregon small boy will no more lie himself out in the alley or behind the barn to solace himself with a forbidden "pill," nor will the banquet board of the rich be wreathed with the smoke curling from the perfumed and seductive cigarette from the land of czar and the Yiddis Kiosk.

Cigarettes are not included in the list of necessities according to the belief of Mr. McDonald, who considers that they are not good for the public health or morality of the state and should not be sold either to young or old. Therefore, to bar them from the stores of the state, he is planning to bring the Washington anti-cigarette law before the legislature and make it his chief effort during the session to secure its passage.

The Washington state anti-cigarette law is a drastic one, though it isn't working just at the present time, nor it has not been according to the "fiends." However, that makes no difference. It is a right good law and as previously announced, is drastic. It makes it a misdemeanor for any store to have cigarettes on its shelves and a misdemeanor for any person to sell cigarettes within the borders of the state. Farther than that, it prohibits the sale of cigarette papers by any store, so that the man who uses the hand-rolled kind is up against it as well as the man who buys them in a box ready made.

At the present time men who want to smoke cigarettes in Washington are compelled to send out of the state for them, or for papers with which to make them, according to the Oregon idea.

It is the intention of Representative McDonald to introduce the Washington law, or all of its essential features at least, before the legislature. He would bar the men from their smokes as well as the boys, though the chief object of the bill is to prevent the sale of cigarettes to boys.

It is expected that the effort to pass the bill will be one of the interesting features of the coming session, as already different members who have heard of it seem to favor its passage and say they will at least not oppose it. The chief howl will undoubtedly come from the tobacco men, while various organizations will rally to its support.—Walla Walla Bulletin.

POLICE SCARED BY "GHOSTS."

Three Chicago Detectives Fleo From a Haunted House.

Three detectives detailed to discover the identity of a "ghost" which has been disturbing the occupants of a house at 151 West 23d street, Chicago, hurried from the residence when mysterious "rappings" and tables moving were noticed, says a Chicago item.

According to Miss Anna Gitrke, her father died six months ago, leaving the property to Mary Gitrke, his 12-year-old daughter. When the terms of the father's will became known his sons entered a strong objection to its provisions. The police say that before the father's body had been buried, a fight took place in the house and that a lighted candle near the body of the man was overturned.

The girl said that the family remained in the house for four months, but were unable to stand the strain longer. The story of the "ghosts" spread through the neighborhood and hundreds waited outside while the policemen were on watch.

Detectives Krejci, Balt and Jungblump of the Hindman street station, reported at 8 o'clock in the evening to Sergeant Thomas Loftus that they saw three clocks in the dining room stop at 7 o'clock, saw the table move and heard rappings. They investigated, but could find no mechanical contrivances whatever.

SHIPPED 14 CARS CHERRIES.

Grand Ronde Crop Is Unusually Heavy This Season.

Before the present week is ended the cherry harvest will be over, says the La Grande Observer. Already some of the busiest shippers of the season are in a position to view the end of the cherry season.

E. Z. Carbine, one of the most extensive shippers of this end of the valley this year, is today sending out two carloads of cherries from Cove. Two more cars will be shipped and then the cherry season, as far as Mr. Carbine is concerned, will be at an end.

His total shipments for the season will amount to 14 carloads, which is two more than his original plans called for.

Mr. Carbine and the other shippers of the valley have been unable to secure extra express cars and were forced to use refrigerator freight cars for the shipment. Shipments of fruit from a center like the Grand Ronde valley, can never be made with the least possible degree of loss as long as there is no way to procure prompt transportation of commodities.

BIG FLOUR MILL SOLD.

Island City Capitalists Buy Good Property at Imbler.

One of the largest deals in personal property, and one which has a great bearing on the industries of the Grand Ronde valley, especially the flour phase of it, was consummated late Saturday evening at Imbler, when a corporation of financiers living at Island City, purchased the Imbler flouring mill, owned by L. J. McKennon and Jess Hindman, says the La Grande Observer. The deal called for a transfer of \$25,000.

The flouring mill at Imbler has been idle for the past year and a half, but in a very short time now it is to be run 24 hours of the day, the corporation known as the Imbler Flouring Mill company having decided to operate the plant immediately, and keep it running until the close of the season.

The deal was occasioned by the loss of the Pioneer Flouring mill at Island City recently.
