Youthful Horseman Injured.

Cecil Fleetwood, the 8-year-old son of Engineer and Mrs. A. T. Fleetwood, now of Pleasant Valley, but formerly of La Grande, met with a serious accident last Saturday evening...

While riding about his Pleasant Valley home on an unusually gentle horse, something scared the animal, causing it to bolt and run with the little fellow on its back.

Mrs. Fleetwood took her son to Baker City and placed him in expert care, and the only serious outcome that is liable to happen is blood poisoning.

Will Prosecute Dairyman.

Tests made this morning in the office of City Health Officer C. E. Braden showed conclusively, according to Dr. Braden and Dr. E. E. Shaw, that milk which was taken from the delivery wagons of the Conkling dairy...

The milk was taken from the wagon by Sanitary Inspector Gates, under instructions from the health officer, was sealed in the presence of the delivery man, and the seal was not broken until the bottle was brought to Dr. Braden's office.

The tests were made in the presence of a Statesman representative and showed plainly the distinct violet color which, chemists say, is positive proof of adulteration.

Dr. Braden explained that the reason he would not yesterday give out the name of the dairyman who had been selling adulterated milk was because he wanted to make a positive test, in the presence of another reputable physician, from milk which had been taken from the delivery wagons of the suspected dairy.

County Attorney Otto B. Rupp is today investigating the death of the child referred to in yesterday's States-

man and is known to be contemplating the advisability of filing charges against Conkling for manslaughter. Whether or not the prosecution for the graver charge will be made depends upon whether or not sufficient evidence can, in the opinion of the county attorney, be secured to convict, but it is definitely settled that Conkling will be prosecuted on the charge of selling adulterated milk, which is a penitentiary offense.

Government Wins.

A letter from the commissioner of the land office this morning to Register Coleman states that lands in the Yakima reservation totaling 13,978 acres, have been decided by the secretary of the Interior to belong to the government instead of to the state, and therefore the ground may be thrown open some time in the future, says the Yakima Republic.

Just when that will be is a very problematical matter, for the reason principally that the lands are not considered valuable, but at any rate the question of the ownership of the ground, which has been in abeyance for some time, has now been settled, and if the department sees fit to go ahead and open up the country there will be no further hindrance to doing so.

This land was recently held by the state and was erroneously excluded from the old survey. By an act of congress, which passed on December 21, 1904, the land was declared to be a part of the reservation, but it appears that the state didn't want to let go of the ground unless it had to. The matter was therefore submitted to the secretary of the Interior, who decided in favor of the government, whereupon the commissioner canceled the selections of the state as to the territory referred to.

Hoodooed Engine.

Passenger engine No. 199 is again bound for the hospital, says the La Grande Observer. The hoodoo which has hovered over that locomotive refuses to leave, and any time an engine is broken local trainmen at once surmise it is the unlucky 199. It was 199 that killed Fireman McFadrigue in the disastrous wreck near Cayuse a little more than a year ago, and it was 199 that suffered various injuries after it had been practically rebuilt after the smashup it received in the big wreck. Monday night, near Durkee, it went wrong again to such an extent that it must go to Albina for repairs. There is always one engine in every division point that bears the brunt of hoodooism, and it is certainly 199 in this place.

WANT HIGH TARIFF.

Mexican Manufacturers Would Shut Out American Goods.

City of Mexico, Aug. 14.—A high tariff wall which will shut the manufactures of the United States and Europe out of Mexico will be demanded by the delegates to an industrial congress, to be held here this fall, the call for which has just been issued. Nearly all of the large manufacturing interests of the republic will have representation at the congress and will seek to agree upon a protective tariff schedule, which will be presented to the treasury department with a demand for its adoption.

Under the proposed schedule a prohibitive tariff will be placed upon all goods now extensively manufactured in Mexico, while reductions will be asked upon raw materials used in manufacture. Industrial men of Mexico claim that during the past five years industries have grown to such an enormous extent, including lines not thought of previously, that the protective ideas in the tariff schedule do not longer fit the conditions which they were meant to benefit. It is claimed that in some cases the ends of the protective feature in the national import tariff are defeated by placing a greater burden upon the importer of raw materials than upon manufactured articles, because the laws were made when there was no immediate prospects for such manufactures while the industries producing the raw material for export needed protection.

PRESIDENT MONTES IS RE-ELECTED.

Bolivian Political Affairs in Somewhat of a Tangle.

La Paz, Bolivia Aug. 14.—President Montes of the Bolivian republic, who was to have retired from office today, has been re-elected by congress to

serve one year more, owing to the recent death of Fernando Guachalla, the president-elect. It was decided by congress that the vice-president-elect, who will take office tomorrow, cannot become president because Senator Guachalla died before assuming the presidency. An election will be held within the year to choose a successor to President Montes. Senator Guachalla was elected on May 4 last, and died suddenly on July 24.

Rumors to the effect that a political crisis is imminent, owing to the death of Guachalla, are without any foundation of fact. The Montes government is highly popular with the majority of the people and any attempt to ferment a revolution would certainly end disastrously for the plotters. Congress is now in session and there is fair promise of many reform laws demanded by the people being passed.

The new railroad line between La Paz and the southern part of the republic, completed the first of this month, is now in operation and marks a distinctive advance in Bolivian prosperity.
