## BASKET MOUNTAIN

UMATILLA'S RICH MOUNTAIN DISTRICT.

Settlers Who Went to This Section With Nothing a Few Years Ago, Are Now Rich—Land Produces Everything in Abundance—Many Campers in the Mountains.

The Freewater Times tells the following interesting story of Basket Mountain and its thrifty settlers. This is one of the best mountain sections of Umatilla county and has great possibilities. The Times says:

No one who has not driven over the country has any conception of the great amount of territory that is tributary to the towns of eastern Oregon.

On Monday we drove round Basket Mountain, and on reaching the first plateau we gazed around and saw a great stretch of the finest wheat land in the world.

Two combines were at work in one field, every few minutes delivering the sown sacks of golden grain, ready to be sent to the mill. On the higher plateau two headers were busy, and in another, the binding machine was delivering its toll to the stackers.

Still higher on another plateau, the timothy had been cut and was being baled for the sound markets. Everywhere we noted industry and prosperity. We found some old friends on the hills and made new ones.

We called on our old friend Sam Warfield, whom we knew well six years ago, when he furnished us with our year's supply of wood. Sam has done well in the last few years. He sold 520 acres of his holdings recently to a Russian colony for \$15,000. He still has 160 acres of fine land left, 100 acres of it is plow land, 48 of the hundred being in timothy, and 60 acres in pasture, orchard and garden.

Eleven years ago, when Mr. Warfield started, he had only a team of horses, one of which he bought on credit. The orchard contains 330 fine fruit trees.

W. A. Kutch is another Basket Mountain farmer who is doing well. He has 162 acres, of which there are 35 acres of plow land one-half being in timothy and one-half in grain. Mr. Kutch, who came here from Iowa 20 years ago, is making a good success of his farming operations. He has a thriving orchard of choice fruit trees and a strawberry patch which helps to swell the farm income. The farm will easily keep 30 to 35 head of stock.

We made a new friend in T. O. Gould, who is a thriving farmer on the mountain, who makes, as does Mr. Warfield, a specialty of timothy raising. This year the crop is short on the mountain, but Mr. Gould ships out 70 tons of timothy on the average, which brings fine returns. Mr. Gould raises a fine variety of strawberries and ships out from 100 to 200 crates a season.

The mountain school was holding its summer session and such a fine, healthy looking lot of boys and girls would be hard to find anywhere. Fine roads, a beautiful day, cool breezes, exhilarating air and jovial company made Monday's drive a very pleasant one. We met lots of campers going and coming from this Adirondack of the west.

## PROTEST SCHOOL LANDS SALE

THREE MILLION ACRES ARE AT ISSUE.

School Land Lessees Have Measure Framed Up for Submission to People Whereby They Will Be Able to Get Possession of Large Holdings in Oklahoma.

Oklahoma City, Okla., Aug. 15.—To oppose the sale of Oklahoma's 3,000,000,000 acres of school lands a state convention was called here today to organize a movement of protest against the measure endorsed by Governor Haskell and "Alfalfa Bill" Murray, speaker of the Oklahoma house.

At a recent mass meeting of school land lessees called by Governor Haskell a bill was agreed upon which provides for the sale of the public school lands. Under the initiative provision of the state constitution this measure will be voted upon by the people at the general election in November.

It must receive a majority of all the votes cast at that election. For several weeks the recent state legislature tried to pass a bill for the school land lessees, called by Governor Haskell, and therefore Governor Haskell issued his convention call advocating the initiating of a bill to sell the lands.

It is alleged by the delegates to today's convention that the interests of the state and of the school children of the present and future generations will best be protected by the holding of the school lands. Resolutions were adopted that call for a state-wide organization of those in harmony with the view of holding the lands and that pray to the qualified voters of the state to join in the battle for the security of the property on which depends the education of the young.

The convention will map out plans to defeat the "Murray initiative bill," by which title the bill to be voted upon by the people is resigned. William H. Murray, speaker of the Oklahoma house, aided in drawing the bill, and is in charge of the necessary preparations for initiating the measure.

To initiate this or any other measure a petition of 21,000 resident qualified voters of the state is necessary, and the securing of this petition was completed, a total of something over 22,000 names being obtained.

Fearing that the bill to be initiated will not get more than one-half of the votes cast at the November election, the school land lessees are not as jubilant over the prospects of the bill as might be expected, although the bill gave the lessees the preference right to purchase his leased land at the highest bid offered at public auction.

### LOS ANGELES' BIRTHDAY.

California City of Homes Founded 127 Years Ago.

Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 15.—The anniversary of the founding of Los Angeles by Spanish padres 127 years ago was celebrated today in the customary manner by the Society la Reina de Los Angeles.

Los Angeles had its origin on August 15, 1871, when Felipe de Neve, governor of Alta California, arrived on the site of the present city, then marked by a collection of Indian huts, and gave to the redskin village the imposing name of El Pueblo de Nuestra Señora, la Reina de Los Angeles—the Town of Our Lady, the Queen of the Angels. For many years the Spanish padre controlled the destiny of the town, and today's celebration centered about the Church of Our Lady of the Angels, on the Plaza, which was once the heart of the village, in the old days of the vaquero and the guitar.

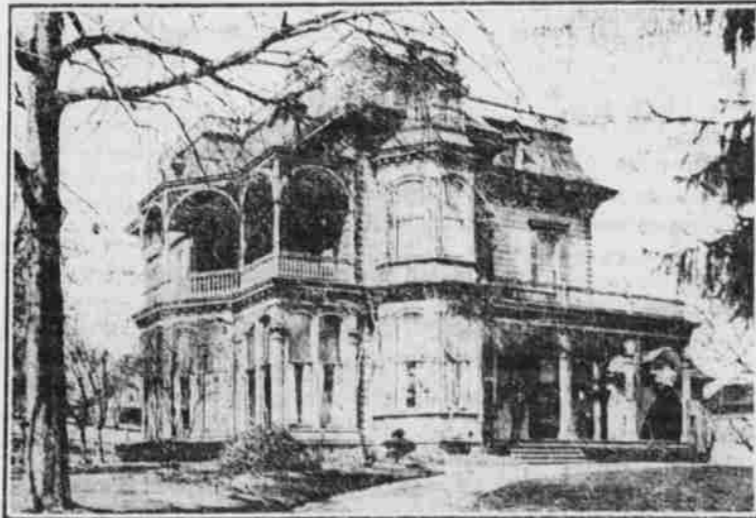
