STORY OF THE SIBERIAN RAILROAD

The Railroad Age Gazette publishes the following interesting sketch of the Siberian railway:

The Russian government submitted to the duma the project for completing the Siberian railroad according to the original plan, that is, down the north bank of the Amoor river to Chaborovsk, the northern terminus of the Ussuri railroad from Vladivostok, which was the first section of the Siberian railroad built.

This is wholly in Russian territory and separated from Chinese territory (Manchuria) only by the River Amoor. The line will be about 1100 miles long, and it is proposed to construct it in four years. The cost is said to be estimated at \$110,000,000. The line has not yet been located entirely.

This estimate is vastly greater per mile than the cost of the Siberian railroad, though the entire route is in a river valley and the river has been navigated by steamboats for many years. There was a strong opposition in the duma, but the bill passed on the first reading by 212 votes against 191. This will give Russia two lines to Vladivostok, for it continues to control and work the Chinese Eastern railroad through Manchuria to Vladivostok, which is much shorter than the Amoor line and

through a much more fertile country. The negotiations for rails in this country recently reported were probably for this line. Most of the rails for the Siberian railroad were supplied by Russian works, which the government protects so far as possible, but transportation by rail 4000 miles or more from European Russia would probably cost at least \$20 a ton, and very much more than shipments by sea from America or England to Vladivostok.

The building of a railroad in the Amoor valley is likely to give a market for Puget sound lumber. The bridge timbers, etc., for the Chinese The Amoor valley is wooded, but the timber seems unsuitable for most railroad uses. At least American lumber was taken directly up the Amoor and its southern tributary, the Sungari, for the Chinese Eastern.

Ties and some other timber were obtained also in Corea, close to the Manchurian border, and it was in connection with Russian forest operations that the difference with Japan began which resulted in the war. Russia will not be likely to get timber for the Amoor line from that source of supply. There is very little population in the Amoor valley and a railroad in it is not likely to be profitable soon.

LOSES FORTUNE, BUT WINS MATE FOR LIFE.

W. H. Melton, Heavy Sufferer in Fernie Fire, Meets Spokane Girl and Weds.

On the heels of the Fernie disaster, in which he lost property valued at \$40,000, William Henry Melton of the stricken city yesterday took unto himself a wife in this city, says the Spokane Review.

Although he lost a fortune, Mr. Melton says that he feels more than compensated by the turn of the blinded goddess' wheel which tossed a bride his way.

"Well, I won't put it exactly in that fashion," said Mr. Melton. "Maybe I was thrown in her way. Anyway we met quite by chance and it has been the salvation of me at a time of sore distress, when I was greatly in need of help. I felt pretty glum and down in the mouth when the fire swept away in a moment what I had labored years to acquire, but when I met her—well, the sun shone once more. I tell you, she was a saving grace to me, though her name is Rose." Mr. Melton was in the lumber business in Fernie. He was also interested in a leading hotel.

The bride is Miss Rose Bogovich of Spokane. They were married by the Rev. H. I. Rasmus at the Grand hotel, Main avenue and Howard street, yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Melton explained that the fire had not left him entirely destitute.

"We'll have enough to begin house-keeping on, anyway, when we return from our honeymoon," he laughingly explained. "I wasn't like the young man who wasn't wise enough to carry a decent amount of insurance. True, I didn't carry enough, but it will help some now. The trouble is that by loss is now being adjusted when I need ready money."

Meets Bride After Fire.

It was learned that Mr. Melton, who was a widower, met the girl of his choice a few days after the fire. He had come to Spokane to have his loss adjusted. Friends introduced him to the young woman, who shyly gave her age as 22, and it proved to be a case of love at first sight. The bride is a pronounced brunette and decidedly good looking.

Mr. and Mrs. Melton will leave for Chicago and other eastern cities this morning.

"We intend to return to Fernie and grow up with the town," was the way he expressed his faith in the future of his home city.

Called by the Dead.

Fifty days ago while coming to this city from Clinton, Ind., where he had been on a visit to his daughter, Charles J. Whitten, one of the pioneers of Gibson county, said to his son: "Mother (his wife, who died several years ago) came after me last night. I asked her if she wanted me to go with her now, and she said she would come to take me in 50 days, says an Oakland City, Ind., item.

The son tried to dissuade his father from placing any belief in his dream, but he refused to be shaken in the thought that he would die in 50 days. Yesterday, the 50th day after the dream, Mr. Whitten fell dead at his home in this city of heart disease. Mr. Whitten was 77 years old.
