**GROUSE SEASON  
OPENS TODAY**

**374 HUNTING LICENSES  
HAVE BEEN ISSUED.**  
Birds Said to Be Plentiful in the Hills and Many Guns Will Crack Along "Breaks" of McKay, Meacham and Birch Creeks Tomorrow.

The grouse season opened in eastern Oregon today, August 15, and a large number of sportsmen will spend Sunday in the Blue mountain woods in search of birds. Because of the protection afforded the grouse by the forest rangers and the scarcity of destructive fires this season, the supply of grouse will be exceptionally large this season and hunting promises to be good.

During the present year 374 hunters' licenses have been issued in Umatilla county, a large number having been secured recently as the grouse season has approached.

On all the upper ridges of the Blue mountains in the vicinity of Meacham and Kamela young birds, now nearly full grown, are plentiful and are easily found and the rush to the mountains during the first few weeks of the open season will be well rewarded.

**TRANSFORMING  
FAIR PAVILION**

NUMEROUS CHANCES ARE  
NOW UNDER WAY.

Interior Being Remodeled and En-  
larged—Roof Gutters Replaced—  
Better Acoustic Arrangement for  
Band and Speaker's Stand—Foun-  
tain Moved to Center.

When the fair pavilion in this city is opened for the third district fair on September 28, those who are familiar with the interior of the building will not recognize it on account of the numerous changes which are to be made during the next few weeks.

Workmen are now engaged in remodeling the interior of the pavilion and replacing the 900 feet of gutters under the eaves. The cost of replacing the gutters will be in the neighborhood of \$200, but this improvement will prevent rain from dropping into the pavilion and is absolutely necessary.

When the band stand is rearranged and placed in the center east of the pavilion there will be no posts around it to obscure the view of the musicians, and it is also proposed to erect a shield or canopy over the band stand, in order to throw the music out into the pavilion and to make it easier to speak from the platform of the music stand. Heretofore it has been almost impossible to hear a speaker from the band stand on account of the lack of acoustic protection.

The fountain and palm garden will also be rearranged this season and green things will be seen growing in the vicinity of the fountain if the plans of the committee are carried out.

It is the intention of the committee to transplant a lot of grass, grain, shrubs and flowers and have them actually growing in the soil about the fountain, giving a realistic appearance to the interior of the pavilion.

This with the decorations of sheaf grain will give the pavilion a delightful appearance and will make it pleasanter and more appropriately "dressed up" for fair purposes.

**BIGGER STATE FAIR.**

**Improvements to the Value of \$9000  
Ordered this Year.**  
At a meeting of the state board of agriculture, held at the fair grounds yesterday, improvements to the extent of \$4500 were authorized, says the Salem Journal.

A commodious office, 45x52 feet, for the secretary of the fair will be erected. An addition to the stables, which will house 40 more horses a large addition to the creamery building and new quarters for the collie dog exhibit will also be built at once. It is expected that all the work will be completed before the fair opens.

The remodeled grandstand has been accepted and the board has authorized a high wire fence to be built around it. The cost of the improvement on the grandstand was \$4000. Altogether about \$9000 has been expended for improvements at the state fair grounds this year.

Superintendent D. W. Campbell of the O. R. & N., is in the city today from Portland on a tour of the system in eastern Oregon.
