NEGROES GATHER IN BALTIMORE

COLORED PROFESSIONAL AND BUSINESS MEN MEET

Representative Gathering of the More Intelligent of the Colored Race—Scores of Speakers Will Enliven the Proceedings of the Meeting.

Baltimore, Aug. 19.—One of the most representative gatherings of colored business and professional men ever held in this country marked the opening this morning of the ninth annual session of the National Negro Business league, of which Dr. Booker T. Washington is president.

A cordial invitation was extended to the visiting negroes by the official representatives of the city, state and colored citizens. Delegates are here from all over the land, although the southern states are most largely represented.

The roll of visitors and their occupations shows that negroes are now engaged in nearly every business, trade and profession.

Scores of speakers will speak briefly before the convention and will tell of their experiences in various lines of business and the methods by which they have won success. The National Negro Bankers' association, the National Negro Undertakers' association and other bodies affiliated with the league will hold sessions.

A novel feature will be the addresses of two colored women who have won success as pharmacists, Mrs. Amanda V. Gray of Washington, and Mrs. J. P. H. Coleman of Newport News, Va. The Right Rev. I. B. Scott of Monrovia, Liberia, will deliver an address tomorrow on "The Business Development of Africa."

The city government of Baltimore has recognized the importance of the convention by installing elaborate illuminations along Druid-Hill avenue, a handsome thoroughfare occupied largely by negroes who own their own homes and business establishments. On Monday, following the close of the Baltimore convention, the delegates will go to Washington, where they will be entertained by the Frederick Douglass Memorial association with a trip down the Potomac. The receipts from this outing will go to the Frederick Douglass memorial home fund.

NO FLIES IN MILITARY CAMP.

Sanitary Triumph Achieved by the American Lake Managers.

Military camps without a single fly is the latest and most scientific achievement of the United States army, says the Walla Walla Bulletin. To men who have done service in the south, in Cuba and in the Philippines this comes as a most startling statement and one that would not be credited, save for the testimony of the officers and enlisted men themselves.

That the first experiment of the war department to eradicate the fly pest is wholly successful is the unqualified statement of Lieutenant-Colonel Matt H. Gormley of the Second Washington regiment, commander of the Blue Army, in the recent joint army and state military maneuvers at American Lake.

"While the camp was a most excellent one, the administration of Brigadier-General Bush was the best I have ever had the honor to serve under and the fraternal spirit of the regulars and the national guardsmen was at its high tide, nothing compared with the work of the sanitary department of the hospital corps and the success in eliminating flies," said Colonel Gormley to the Seattle Times. "Everyone who has seen service knows of the fly pest," he continued, "and the schemes to get rid of the insects were watched with great interest this year. The result is that the army has successfully defeated the fly. We used crude petroleum in connection with the latrines as the first precaution, and found that flies do not take to trade oil."
