GOOD FALL FAIRS

BELLINGHAM OPENS THE SEASON AUGUST 24.

Over \$225,000 in Premiums and Purse for the Bellingham Event—Double the Amount Ever Put Up in Premiums Before—Fall Circuit Promises Some Excellent Events.

For the North Pacific two-fold harness race and livestock circuit which opens at Bellingham, Wash., August 24, and continues until about the middle of October, purses, stakes and premiums aggregating more than \$225,000 have been hung up nearly double the amount of money ever awarded in similar exhibitions in one year before.

There are eight cities included in the harness race circuit, with the following dates: Bellingham, Wash., August 24-29; Everett, Wash., August 31-September 5; Seattle, Wash., September 7-12; Salem, Ore., September 21-26; North Yakima, Wash., September 28-October 3; Spokane, Wash., October 5-10; Lewiston, Idaho, October 12-17.

For the racing events, in which there are close to 500 trotters and pacers from all trans-Rocky Mountain and coast states and northwestern Canada entered, the aggregate stakes and purses will be \$125,000, of which amount the County Club and Livestock association will contribute \$20,000.

There are seven cities in the North Pacific fair circuit at which the livestock interests will vie for another \$100,000 or more in cash premiums. These are: Snohomish county fair, Everett, Wash., September 1-5; Western Washington fair, Seattle, September 7-12; Oregon State fair, Salem, September 12-19; Pacific National show, Portland, September 21-26; Washington state fair, North Yakima, September 28-October 3; Spokane Interstate fair, Spokane, October 5-10; Walla Walla County fair, Walla Walla, October 12-17.

The Portland livestock show premiums according to the complete list which has just been announced will total another \$20,000, for the four divisions, horses, cattle, sheep and swine, and feature classes.

There are a total of 48 classes and 697 subdivisions for which cash premiums, cups, ribbons and rosettes are offered, and while the entries for these events do not close until September 7, the offerings so far indicate well-filled lists in all classes. It is estimated that in the four divisions between 2500 and 3000 head of livestock will be exhibited.

INSPECTOR LOOKS AFTER INDIAN ALLOTMENTS

A. M. Tinker, inspector of Indian affairs of the department of the interior, is in the city in an endeavor to locate Indians and ascertain their desires as to whether they wish to retain allotments made them by the government or prefer to relinquish them to the government or exchange them for other portions of government lands, says The Dalles Chronicle.

The allotments in question are in Oregon in township 2 north, range 18, east Willamette meridian, and comprise some 15 to 20 allotments.

Originally the lands in question were granted to the Northern Pacific railroad company on condition that it complete its line between Wallula and Portland under certain conditions as regards time, etc. These lands were portions of the grant which included every odd section adjacent to the line of the company.

The railroad company failed to comply with its portion of the agreement, and the lands reverted to the government. Later the railroad reorganized under the name of the Northern Pacific Railroad company and the grant was renewed.

But in the meantime white men had settled on the lands which by the delinquency of the railroad had reverted to the government, and allotments to non-reservation Indians had been made here by officials of the Indian affairs of the government. That he may ascertain whether the Indians who were given these allotments wish to retain them, relinquish or exchange them for other lands is the mission of Mr. Tinker in this city at this time.
