Union County Records Correct.

The warrant indebtedness of Union county on July 1, 1902, was \$269,622.38, and the interest amounted to approximately \$1000 per month, says the La Grande Observer. The warrant indebtedness on July 1, 1906, was \$132,449.93, while on July 1, 1908, it had been reduced to \$68,061.55, showing a reduction of \$65,387.5 in the last two years, which certainly must be a matter of satisfaction to the court and the taxpayers of the county.

Expert Accountant James Mimmough has filed his report with the county court after having made an exhaustive examination of the records. One thing is very gratifying—but was nothing more than was anticipated and expected—and that is, that every county official has performed his duties faithfully, and only in a few minor instances are there any errors whatever.

Jack Rabbits Eat Trees.

Jack rabbits in large numbers are overrunning the Lewiston orchards section, and protection to the young fruit trees has been made necessary, says a Lewiston item. The rabbits are particularly fond of the bark of the young trees, and their depredations have resulted in a number of trees being killed. During the past few days men have been engaged in wrapping the trees with tarred paper and steps have been taken to exterminate the rabbits.

Carrots containing strychnine have been scattered in the sections where the rabbits range, and hunting parties have found great sport in shooting the rabbits by moonlight.

To Select Joint Superintendent.

It was reported yesterday in local railroad circles that the Northern Pacific and the O. R. & N. have been for some time conferring on the matter of the selection of the superintendent who will be in charge of the Lewiston division, which will embrace the two new joint roads, says the Lewiston Tribune. Comment was to the effect that Trainmaster T. H. Lantree and B. W. Walker, chief clerk to Superintendent Beamer, of the Northern Pacific, were being considered for the place. The plan for operating the roads provides for the organization of a holding company and the superintendent of this company will have headquarters in the new joint depot, where accommodations will also be provided for treasurer, train dispatcher, road master and the other officials.

Cargo of Perfect Lumber.

With 2,800,000 feet of lumber valued at \$100,000, the British steamship Hford will clear at the custom house for European ports this afternoon, says a Portland item. By long odds it is the finest cargo and has a greater value than any other that has ever been set afloat at a Pacific coast port. The cargo will be taken to Copenhagen and Hamburg. It consists principally of ship's decking, which was sawed from the very best of material. The shipment was taken on at the Inman-Poulsen and Portland mills. Lumber experts closely inspected every board before it went into the hold of the deck. If it bore the slightest blemish it was rejected.

Catches Big Trout.

Harry Walther of this city, who is spending his vacation at Trout Lake, caught a rainbow trout a few days ago which measures 26 inches from head to tail. Mr. Walther sent the big fish to his parents here in the city, where it attracted much attention today. It weighed about seven pounds.—The Dalles Chronicle.
