AMONG THE EXCHANGES OF THE INLAND EMPIRE

Wells Are Going Dry.

The farmers in the Egyptian country report that, on account of the long continued dry weather, the wells and many of the springs are dry, and that they are compelled to haul water for use of house and stock. They say that nothing like it has been experienced since the settlement of the country, says an item from Davenport. One farmer said yesterday that he had never seen it so dry in any country as this year, and yet he says he has a good crop. He made the statement that he believed there is no other country in the world that could make the same showing under similar circumstances.

Crops Better Than Expected.

Reports from various parts of Gilliam county indicate that the wheat yield will be much greater than was expected a month ago, says the Arlington Record. Some fields, where the ground was properly prepared and the grain put in according to modern methods, have made an average yield, while adjoining farms have hardly paid for harvesting because of the careless and antiquated methods employed in seeding. Science is taking the place of "hit or miss" farming, and he who will not accept and adopt the new order of things will be unable to compete with his more progressive neighbor.

Valuable Horses Killed.

Deputy State-Veterinary Surgeon T. F. Notz has created consternation among owners of horses in this locality by ordering the destruction of

some valuable animals afflicted with glanders, says an item from Sumpter. Richard Addoms yesterday lost by execution two costly horses. Charles Tibbs had to hand over for death his famous riding animal that won several important races in the eastern Oregon circuits. Burnt River people have been compelled to witness the killing of several equines that they highly prized for the same cause. It is expected others will have to go as soon as Deputy Notz has thoroughly examined their cases.

Young Indians as Carpenters.

Young Indian apprentices will aid in constructing the Indian day school and teachers' cottage near Kamiah, as O. H. Lipps, superintendent in charge of the Nez Perce reservation, will arrange to have the young mechanics employed when work begins September 1. The material will be purchased under sealed bids, but the work will be done under the day labor plan. The young apprentices are students in some of the many Indian schools in the industrial department and they have considerable knowledge of construction.

Hybrid Yields 40 Bushels.

Mark Whitlow, one of the most extensive farmers in this vicinity, is threshing 600 acres of grain, which is yielding 40 bushels an acre, says a Moscow item. The wheat is of the forty-fold and hybrid varieties, the latter being a cross produced by the experiment station of the Washington State college and proving one of the best varieties grown here.

MOROCCAN JOURNALISM.

Paris Sends Out Samples of "Wordy Wars" From Africa.

Paris, Aug. 21.—In the gentle art of vituperating, European and American journals do not begin to compare with those of Africa, and especially of Morocco. The two rival papers of Fez are now engaged in a wordy warfare, and the following translations are presented as typical of the milder class of their editorials:

"Curses on you, you traitor and liar! Do you think that Moroccans believe a word you say? What you have written, you little cur of a dog, on the subject of the Cair of Fez is absolutely false. Have you seen, you hog, with what respect and admiration the English newspapers speak of him? Oh, you little carcass of a pig!"

"You say, O, ass of asses, that the Emir should unite in his person four fundamental things, justice, statesmanship, courage and descent from the Gorchelites.

"Which of these things do you find in Abd el Aziz? It is in the name of justice that he has made a gift to the Europeans of two cities in the land of Mohammedans? And as though this were not enough, is he not seeking to impose over us the authority of infidels? O you ass! You insufferable ass!"

Flour Mill for Baker.

Charles B. Stout, the flouring mill man from Paoli, Indiana, will be here in a few days and will be ready for business, according to advices received by the business organizations, says the Baker City Herald.

Construction of the new mill will be delayed only until Mr. Stout decides upon the site most suitable. Assurance will be given wheat growers as to the quantity of grain the mill will handle, which it is thought will cause a larger acreage next season.

Mr. Stout has written people here that he has ordered his milling machinery for early delivery and it will be but a short time until it will be shipped to Baker. It is not expected that much time will be consumed in building the structure necessary to house the machinery, and everything points to a mill in operation before many months.
