SIDELIGHTS OF NEW YORK'S HISTORY

New York, Aug. 22.—The late Robert G. Ingersoll once let fall a few remarks touching on and appertaining to the "fool friends" of reform movements, whose words and actions served to hinder the cause with which they had allied themselves, and who "are so friendly that you cannot kick them."

I am convinced that the disciples of Marxian socialism, and even the "opportunist" socialists who are principally concerned with political methods, entertain much the same tender feeling for the Christian socialists. These exponents of kid-gloved reform, who insist upon opening the social revolution with prayer, will again occupy the limelight next week, when they will hold a general conference at Asbury Park.

Pastor With Socialists.
The Rev. John D. Long, D. D., pastor of the fashionable Parkside Presbyterian church of Brooklyn—all ministers who get into the newspapers are pastors of fashionable churches—is the leader in the Christian socialist fellowship movement.

For some months he has been engaged in organizing the socialist ministers of the country and hundreds of reverends and right reverends are now said to be enrolled on the membership list of the fellowship.

Among the rank and file of the red flag followers of New York, however, the accession of the holy men is not viewed with any noticeable degree of gratulation. Socialism, those unregenerate ones insist, is an economic system, and not a church. They fear that with the growth of the movement, internal dissension will arise, and the party will be divided into warring sects of Baptist socialists, Presbyterian socialists, Mother Eddy socialists and high church and low church socialists.

And the scoffers inquire, more or less pertinently, why there shouldn't be a Christian republican party or a Christian democratic party. The horny-handed sons of toil insist that the ministers come out flat-footed for Karl Marx and Eugene V. Debs and drop their affectation of select superiority, under penalty of being deprived of their red tags.

College Waiters.
Those ambitious young men who work their way through college by the sweat of their brows are often the recipients of effusive commendations and sympathetic encouragement. In these sentiments, however, J. Davis Secor does not share. Mr. Secor owns a summer hotel out on Long Island, and recently tried the experiment of employing 15 worthy young college students as waiters. His opinion of the ability of the youngsters in question may now be expressed in a row of jim-dashes.

Mr. Secor asserts that his student waiters were assiduous in their attentions to the young lady guests, but that the men and the older ladies found it almost impossible to attract the attention of the scholarly grub-slingers.

Moreover, the dinner dishes were left unwashed while the collegians spent the evenings on the rustic bridge in the dim distance, singing love songs to the fair listeners. For all of such grievances, and for the additional reason that the collegians the young men attended hadn't taught them the difference between a golf stick and a soup ladle, Mr. Secor fired his collection of student waiters and made a solemn vow, "Never again."

Easy Marks.
Humorists of the daily press frequently take occasion to pass sarcastic remarks upon the bargaining-proclivities of the fair sex, incidentally implicating that men are superior as shrewd shoppers. I hesitate to blast so fond an illusion, yet the recitation of a single instance, pointed out to me by the buyer of a big New York department store, will

serve to prove that men are the original easy marks when they go shopping.

"Are men more successful shoppers than women?" sniffed the buyer to whom I had addressed the question. "Well, not so you could notice it. Here's an example," he said, pointing out in an advertisement of the store the following cryptic description of a feminine government: "Made of best quality muslin, wide umbrella ruffle, deep hem and three embroidered tucks, specially priced at 29 cents."

The buyer continued: "We have in stock a similar garment for men, containing no more or no better material, and costing not so much in the workmanship. Yet it sells regularly for 75 cents, and is never priced below 59 cents."

Responding to my question as to the reason for this unjust disparity in prices, he said:

"There isn't any reason, except that the manufacturers of men's garments charge more and make bigger profits, because the men are easy marks and will stand for it. If women were regular patrons of saloons, do you think they would pay 15 cents for a little swig of whiskey that costs less than a fourth of that sum? Not for a minute. Everything that is good exclusively to men commands a higher price than it would if women were also its purchasers. Men shrewd shoppers? Oh, fudge."

All of which is illuminating, if not exactly calculated to add to masculine conceit.

A Just Judge.
There is at least one judge in New York and he has rendered a decision which must be hailed with delight throughout the country, as establishing a righteous precedent.

Can a man be legally forced to pay for a cup of coffee which contains a pestiferous fly? Answer: He cannot. So says the law, as interpreted by the just judge aforesaid.

It was a highly indignant restaurant proprietor who appeared in police court and accused a well-dressed young man of larceny in failing to produce a nickel for a cup of coffee the latter had ordered.

Questioned by the magistrate, the grub dispenser admitted that a fly had fallen into the coffee after it had been served, but declared volubly that it wasn't his fault and that he was not supposed to protect customers from inquisitive insects.

The objection was maintained by the judge and the accused walked forth a free man. And the learned and just judge has earned the respect of all honest men, except restaurant proprietors.

It has a pit like a plum, but is much smaller according to the size of the fruit. It is very delicious and much sought after because of it being a new fruit and because of its flavor. People sometimes do not like the taste at first but in a short time learn to like it and then they prefer it to any other fruit of its kind.

It grows on a tree resembling a prune tree or plum tree and seems to be specially adapted to this country. It will without a doubt, become a great factor in the export of this country some day.
