PREVENTS WRECKS

O. R. & N. EMPLOYEES HAS A NEW DEVICE

J. Shannon of Portland Invents an Apparatus to Apply to the Track to Stop Trains—Test Will Be Made by Eight General Superintendents at Portland This Week.

A Portland man who for years has been an employe of the O. R. & N. has invented what experts say is the surest safety device known to modern railroading and which makes collisions practically impossible where it is used, says the Oregon Daily Journal.

The invention is to be given a trial this week by the eight general superintendents of the Harriman lines who are holding a semi-annual conference in this city.

J. Shannon, the inventor of the device, has been conducting his experiments at Graham station, near Montavilla. He says that the trials have met with complete success.

The device is simple and is intended to supplement the work of the semaphore. It consists of a spring of boiler plate placed near the rail within the track. Whenever the semaphore arm is down, that is, points to safety and shows the track is clear, the spring releases itself and is at a level with the rail. But as soon as the semaphore arm points to danger the spring files up six or eight inches above the track.

A locomotive is fitted with an iron shoe suspended beneath the cab and attached to the throttle. This shoe is forced up as the locomotive passes over the spring and shuts off the throttle, thus bringing the train to a stop.

In case the engineer wishes to disregard the danger signal—as, for instance, in the case of wrecking trains or helper engines—he can set the shoe from the cab and it will not act upon the throttle.

Railroad records show that 63 per cent of the serious accidents are caused by disregarding danger signals. It is claimed by Shannon that if his device is put into use the "human equation" is reduced to almost nothing. An engineer can die at his post but his train will be brought to an instant stop by the action of the spring and the steel shoe.

Michael J. Buckley, general superintendent of the Harriman lines in Oregon has inspected the device and he is anxious to have the other general superintendents who are present at the conference also see it and pass upon it.

TO WATER THE HIGH LAND.

Irrigation Project Near Boise to Reclaim 7000 Acres.

A party of high officials in the reclamation service is expected to arrive here this evening and tomorrow in company with a committee from the Boise Commercial club they will make a trip to the government dam above the city and also over the lands on the upper bench above the New York canal for the purpose of looking into the advisability of installing a pumping plant at the dam and bringing several thousand acres of land under irrigation, says the Boise Capital News.

W. T. Booth, president of the Commercial club, states the idea is to pump water into a reservoir during the time when the river is high and store enough to irrigate with during the summer.

He states that by installing a plant which will raise water 60 feet, 7000 acres can be brought under the cultivation and by raising it 120 feet, 10,000 acres can be irrigated.

All this land, he says, lies within six and a half miles of this city, and is among the finest bench land in the state.

The state owns several thousand acres in this section which he believes an application would be made to have put on the market if water were obtainable.

The people under such a project would do the work of putting in the canals and building the ditches taking in pay script which would apply on payment for their water rights.
