WOULD CONTROL THE WOOL OUTPUT

WOOLGROWERS WOULD HOLD THEIR CLIPS. Storage Warehouse Proposition Is Being Considered by the National Association at Salt Lake This Week—Buyers Have Hammered Down and Sheepmen Have Lost Money in the Past.

Salt Lake, Utah, Aug. 25.—Woolgrowers from all over the west are meeting here today with the executive committee of the National Woolgrowers' association to consider plans for a national wool storage movement. If the scheme is put into effect, sheepmen say, it will put an end to the bear movement in the wool market which takes place at shearing time every spring and usually results in heavy losses by the woolgrowers of the west. Wool warehouses will be established at central points throughout the country, where the wool will be stored until such time as the growers are offered what they consider a fair price.

Cotton growers of the south, by means of their union, have for years used the same plan to keep up the price of cotton, and the sheepmen believe that it will be fully as effective when applied to the wool growing industry. Secretary C. B. Stewart of the Utah Woolgrowers' association, a leader in the "woolgrowers' trust" movement, declares that the sheepmen in this state who were offered 8 cents a pound for their clips just after shearing time, have netted 16 1/2 cents a pound through the storage movement, saving 8 1/2 cents a pound above the price first offered, which would otherwise have been pocketed by the buyers.

The meeting here today is a recognition of what has already been accomplished by the Utah sheepmen, and marks the beginning of the movement of national extent. At the present meeting a report will be read from the committee that was appointed by the national association to go to Chicago and look into the proposition of bankers and business men there, which was made to encourage the shipment of wool to that city.

Chicago Will Help. It is said that at Chicago bankers have promised to advance millions of dollars upon wool for next year's clip that is sent here for storage, and that other business men have made encouraging offers concerning the handling and storing of wool. But Chicago is not the only city that is in the field to secure the wool that will be shipped for storage under the national movement. Boston, Philadelphia, Omaha, St. Louis and other cities are just as eager to get the wool.

Mr. Walker said that for years wool growers had been at the mercy of buyers and that the national storage movement was for the purpose of putting an end to this condition, which had caused losses to producers.

"The national storage movement would result in the saving to woolgrowers of immense sums of money. Take the results of the Utah storage movement as an example.

"Recently between 100,000 and 200,000 pounds of Utah wool, for which the sheep men were offered 8 cents a pound by buyers early in the season, were sold at 16 1/2 cents a pound net. That is, the wool growers cleared 16 1/2 cents above all expenses of shipping and storage. The price was 8 1/2 cents more than was offered by the buyer he would have made more than the wool grower, who took all the risks and did all the work simply because he shipped the wool from the producing point to the eastern markets. That gives some idea of what can be saved to the western producers of wool.

"If the wool of the west is stored until the manufacturers enter the field for it, there will be no further need of paying annual tribute to the buyers, whose work in shipping the wool to the right market can just as well be done by the producers.

"As the wool growers begin to more thoroughly understand what the storage movement means, their enthusiasm increases. Next season, there will be a vast amount of wool stored, or buyers will offer better prices at shearing time."
