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REVIEW OF FOOTBALL RULES FOR 1908

New York, Aug. 26.—All over the east college men are beginning to think of the annual struggle for supremacy on the gridiron. Already several of the big universities have issued calls for the candidates to gather for preliminary practice, and within the next few weeks the prospective football gladiators will be found on their respective fields trying out the new maneuvers contrived by ingenious coaches.

The Carlisle Indians will be the first to play a real game this year, having scheduled a contest with Albright College for September 19. Harvard will open its season with Bowdoin on September 30, and on the same date Yale will play its initial game of the season with Wesleyan, while Pennsylvania will meet Uthman, Princeton, Cornell, West Point and Annapolis will begin the season on October 3.

While it is yet too early to estimate the comparative strength of the eleven of the big colleges, nearly all of them have good material and the struggle for first honors will probably be the closest and most exciting in years.

Changes in the football rules are not as many as in previous years, but they are important. A change in the forward pass rule which will likely have a decided bearing on the game has been made. When a forward pass is legally touched only the man of the passer's side who first touched it shall be entitled to recover the ball until it is touched by an opponent.

If a forward pass is thus legally touched, fumbled and touched by another player of the passer's side before the ball is touched by an opponent the ball shall go to the opponents on the side where it was illegally touched.

Dangerous to Try "Pass."
This rule will make it more dangerous for the side in possession of the ball to try a forward pass. If a man misses the ball it practically means that the other side will get the pigskin. The forward pass will, therefore, probably not be used so extensively this season.

While the ball is in the air for a forward pass, players on the defensive side may not use their arms or

hands on opponents except to push them out of the way in order to get the ball themselves. Players of the side making the pass who are ineligible to receive the pass may use their hands and arms as in the case of players going down the field under a kick.

Neither side may, however, "hold" or "tackle" an opponent who has not the ball. If the ball is illegally touched outside of these provisions the penalty provides that the ball will go to the opponents on the spot where the pass was made.

Time will be taken out during the enforcement of penalty for incomplete pass. If a ball on a forward pass or kick strikes the uprights or the cross bar of the goal posts the ball shall be considered as having crossed the goal line.

Must Start Again.
In case the ball accidentally strikes an official the play will be started over again. A change which appears to be somewhat uncalculated for is the lengthening of the intermission between halves from 10 minutes to 15 minutes. The referee must notify the teams three minutes before its expiration.

Five minutes after this notification if either team has failed to appear the ball shall be put in play as first down by the offended side on offensive side's 30 yard line.

In order to render the rules and penalties more consistent the rules which govern the conduct of players and persons not in the game who sometimes cause fouls are made to read: "Loss of 15 yards, point to be gained and number of downs to remain unchanged." Penalties for fouls may be refused by the offended side except penalties under the forward pass.

This, however, in cases where the penalty includes disqualification, does not save the player from being put out of the game. If a player bats the ball forward his side loses the pigskin. This comes under the jurisdiction of the umpire and field judge. The field judge also is the timekeeper in place of the head linesman. The score of a forfeited game shall be 1 to 0. This distinguishes it from all other possible scores.

LINCOLN-DOUGLAS DEBATE.

Anniversary of Famous Event Is Being Observed.

Freeport, Ill., Aug. 26.—Fifty years ago Abraham Lincoln and Senator Stephen A. Douglas met in Freeport in the most important, history-making joint political debate ever held in America, and the anniversary of the great warfare of words will be celebrated in a fitting manner here tomorrow.

Prominent men have been engaged to pay tributes to Lincoln, Douglas and Robert H. Hitt, the shorthand reporter who made a record of the speeches and preserved them for posterity.

The orators of the day will likely be greeted with a larger audience than greeted Lincoln and Douglas on that memorable day 50 years ago. Both Lincoln and Douglas will have their defenders and the memory of both great statesmen will be honored with due praise.

TEACHERS FOR THE ISLANDS.

Examinations to Be Held for Good Positions in Philippines.

Washington, Aug. 26.—Civil service examinations for teachers in the Philippines will be held today and tomorrow in cities throughout the country. Many additional pedagogues are needed in the islands, owing to the establishment of new schools and the retirement of teachers now there, who have completed their terms of service.

The positions pay a minimum salary of \$1200 per annum and promotions up to a superintendency at a salary of \$3000 are rapid. Women will be accepted only if they have relatives, present or prospective, in the Philippines.
