TAFT CONFERS WITH FORAKER.

and Mr. Taft remained till the four hours' parade had passed. Before Judge Taft was allowed to depart on an automobile ride he consented to shake hands for 20 minutes with an enthusiastic throng. The ride ended at the Lyceum theater at 4 o'clock, where, when Mr. Taft had been cheered for a few minutes by an audience which filled the large play house, Senator Foraker made his appearance. He was also enthusiastically greeted as he took a seat beside the candidate, after the latter had risen and greeted him with a handshake. Then the speechmaking began. President Hulholland of the club, introduced Mr. Taft as "the world's big man," and many more complimentary phrases.
Middle Bass Island, Sept. 3.—Taft's friends and advisers here interpret the handshaking between Taft and Senator Foraker as a complete surrender on the part of Foraker. It is said Foraker will make no further effort to oppose Taft.
Taft men call attention to what Foraker said in a speech, namely: "I am for Taft." Taft does not say he is for Foraker. Surrender of Foraker is the talk of the camp. Taft declined to discuss the incident and went fishing again today. On Sunday he goes to Sandusky to make a labor day address.

SULTAN TO HANG.

Also to Pay Heirs of Victim in Parang Island Raid.
Manila, Sept. 3.—The Philippines territorial supreme court today decided that the sultan of Dunaharra must hang for participation in the raid on Parang Island, Mindanao in January, 1904, when J. W. McDonald, an American, was killed. The sultan was ordered to pay McDonald's heirs 1000 pesos.

A RAILROAD INJUNCTION.

Fight on the Two-Cent Rate Passed in Arkansas.

St. Paul, Sept. 3.—A temporary injunction was granted today by Judge Vandewater of the state circuit court, restraining the operation of the two-cent railroad rate law passed by the legislature of Arkansas. He holds the law is confiscatory.

Stewart's Friends Active.

Wilcox, Ariz., Sept. 3.—Discovery of what is believed to be a plan of the war department to shelve the case of Colonel William Stewart, of Fort Grant, now in exile, until after election, has resulted today in a large number of warning messages being received here from the colonel's friends, requesting that they be forwarded to the desolate army post where Colonel Stewart is awaiting orders on his journey to Fort Huachuca to take the 90-mile ride test.

All United to Win.

Chicago, Sept. 3.—Chairman Hitchcock is planning a grand speaking tour of the four presidential aspirants who opposed Taft for the nomination. Fairbanks, La Follette, Foraker and Knox. Leaders think the quartet will make a strong argument for the ticket, by showing all are working together.

THE GREATEST COPPER COUNTRY.

H. H. Grier, an Alaska copper man who is registered at the Cornelius from Valdez, is very enthusiastic over the future of that country. "It is going to be the greatest copper country in the world," he said this morning. "The Lake Superior country can't touch it. The head of the United States geological survey has been up through there, and for more than a year past he has had his men stationed about the country making surveys and investigations, and he says that there is more copper in the Valdes copper belt than in Michigan, Arizona and Montana all put together. That copper belt is 200 miles long by 100 miles wide, and it is all copper. I have been spending two months in the Michigan mining section and have been all through it, and I tell you, it can't touch our country up there."

"No, we're not doing a thing now but just waiting. I have been waiting for eight years and I'd wait eight years more before I'd turn loose of my holdings. I'm trying all the time to get more."

"The Guggenheimer-Morgan-Rockefeller road is progressing fast into that district now and will be there before long. Then things will begin to move. We haven't taken out a bit of ore so far, because we are 150 miles from the coast and have had no means of transporting it. But this line will make things all right."

"Most people when they think of Alaska imagine that it is all bitterly cold. It is not nearly as cold in the Valdez region as it is in Montana, and the Dakotas. I have made a 150-mile trip with a dog team in the middle of winter and wore not even an overcoat, just my ordinary clothes, such as I wear now, and a jumper and overalls."

"Some day before long that country is going to be full of big hotels and sanitariums and will be the greatest health resort in the United States. I never knew of a sick person in that country."

Twin Falls Sugar Beets.

Twin Falls News: The Idaho Beet Sugar company has announced its willingness to take the product of 2000 acres of beets on the Twin Falls tract for its Blackfoot factory. The Oregon Short Line will grant a rate of \$1 per ton and the sugar company has indicated that if conditions warranted it would rebate half this expense. This would give the farmers \$4.25 per ton for their beets, f. o. b. Twin Falls. The company has declared its intention to build two factories on the Twin Falls tract.

Cuban Uses Glue.

Consul General James L. Rodgers, writing from Habana, says that the Cuban imports of dry glue in the fiscal year 1906 amounted to 410,294 pounds, of which the United States furnished 194,713 pounds, Germany, 114,081 pounds, and France 42,909 pounds. The glue is used in the wood working trades, from which there is an increasing demand.

Peace or War.

Helena, Mont., Sept. 3.—The industrial peace of Montana, Washington and Wyoming hinges upon the conference begun here today between the coal miners and United Mine Workers on the wage scale for the northwest. Failure to decide means a general strike affecting Montana and Washington and will prolong the Wyoming trouble. Twenty-five thousand men will be affected.

Will Scrap for Malne.

Chicago, Sept. 3.—The democratic national organization is planning to make a sweeping campaign in Maine between now and the state election, on September 15. The foremost orators will be sent into Malne to make a determined effort to carry it for Bryan.
