CAMPAIGN TO SAVE NATION'S RESOURCES

Washington, Sept. 3.—Interest in the coming national conventions of the conservation commission, of which Gifford Pinchot is chairman, and the National Rivers and Harbors congress, of which Hon. Joseph E. Ransdell of Louisiana, is president, is largely on the increase, as is shown by the discussions throughout the country during the past few weeks.

The meetings of these two great bodies, in December next, gives promise of being most largely attended by the representative men of the nation interested in the conservation of our natural resources and in waterway improvements.

Although no special effort has been made to bring together the leading experts and enthusiastic workers for the causes represented, letters received by the president of the Rivers and Harbors congress and the secretary of the conservation commission, show that the week of December 7 in Washington will be crowded with important meetings. The conservation commission will meet on Tuesday the 8th, while the national convention of the Rivers and Harbors congress will be held on the 9th, 10th and 11th of December, at which 5000 delegates are expected.

Among the governors who have already indicated their intention of being present at the conservation commission meeting, and who will remain over to attend the National Rivers and Harbors congress, are:

Hogsett, of Alaska; Frear, of Hawaii; Wilson, of Kentucky; Gull, of Massachusetts; Warner, of Michigan; Johnson, of Minnesota; Glenn, of North Carolina; Post, of Porto Rico; Cummins, of Iowa; Brooks, of Wyoming, and Sheldon, of Nebraska.

These state executives have indicated their presence in Washington during the period mentioned, while many others are yet to be heard from.

It is expected that in conjunction with the annual national conventions of the Rivers and Harbors congress and the national conservation commission, President Roosevelt will ask

the attendance of the governors of all the states into conference largely patterned after the wonderfully successful meeting at the White House last spring, and from which vast benefits have already accrued.

During the next month or six weeks both the president of the Rivers and Harbors congress, Representative Ransdell, and the chairman of the conservation commission, Chief Forester Pinchot, will be busily engaged in addressing conventions upon the subjects of interior waterways and the conservation of natural resources.

Mr. Pinchot, and, in all probability, Mr. Ransdell, will address the National Editorial association to be held in Boston August 21-27.

Mr. Ransdell will speak before the National Irrigation congress to be held at Albuquerque, N. M., September 29, to October 2. Vice-President Fairbanks and President Ransdell are scheduled for addresses at the convention of the Upper Mississippi River Improvement association, to be held at Clinton, Iowa, September 22-24. Both Mr. Pinchot and Mr. Ransdell are expected at the Farmers' National congress, to be held at Madison, Wis., September 24-28.

Chairman Pinchot and possibly Representative Ransdell will address the American Bankers' association, which meets at Denver September 28 to October 1.

Among the many organizations which have held their annual conventions, conservation of natural resources, and improvement of the waterways of the United States had earnest consideration at the National association of Manufacturers, which met in New York city in May, the Lumber Educational association at Cleveland in June; the Yellow Pine Lumber association at Chicago, in July, and the Chautauqua Institute at Jamestown, N. Y., July 26 to August 1, at which meetings committees were appointed and resolutions adopted looking to a comprehensive movement on the part of the general government for the conservation of our natural resources, and the improvement of the nation's water highways.

STORMING IN MOUNTAINS.

Early Snows Drive Cattle From the Hills.

Lewiston, Idaho, Sept. 3.—The storms of the last week have started the herds of cattle and sheep from the high ranges of the Bitter Root forest reserve, where pasture is furnished each summer for thousands of head of range stock. During the next few weeks the cattle will be ranged on the low hills adjacent to the mountains and the sheep brought to the high plateaus. Winter range is found on the breaks of the Salmon, Snake and Clearwater rivers.

Farmers of the prairie sections are being offered fancy prices for their stubblefields and stacks by stockmen who have winter range in the districts devastated by grasshoppers, and it is probable large herds will be maintained in the fields during the entire winter.

800 CARS OF PEACHES.

Estimates Run That High for Clarkston, Idaho, Crop.

Lewiston, Idaho, Sept. 3.—Many estimates of the peach crop have been made, some of the growers declaring that 800 cars of peaches will be shipped from Clarkston orchards, George Crum, who is familiar with almost every orchard on Clarkston flat, said recently that the peach production would not be as large as at first estimated but that 400 cars would be gathered this fall.

The small fruits have been profitable this summer because the canneries have been using all that they could handle.

Walla Walla, Aug. 3.—Whitman college will open for the fall semester September 14, and already applications for rooms are being received in the city, the dormitory having been practically all engaged. From present indications the attendance will be larger in every department than last year.

Nine new instructors will begin work this fall. Several will open new departments which have been established this year, while others will

take the place of instructors who left for other fields after commencement. The boys' physical training department will be in charge of J. M. Blanchard, who takes the place of D. V. Mitchell. Miss Hugena Thompson will have charge of the girls' training department and oratory and expression. In the English department Professor H. C. Merriam will be an added instructor. In the academy the following new instructors will take place: Miss Marjorie Lyman and Miss Odessa A. Sterling, piano; A. A. Jackson, instructor in piano tuning and wind instruments; Mrs. William Worthington, in voice; Miss Helen Ruth Ingalls, piano; Miss Rachel Hamilton, instructor in the dead languages.
