ATTORNEY GENERAL EXPLAINS TAX LAW.

In reply to a letter from Sheriff Stevens of Multnomah county, Attorney General Crawford has rendered a decision in regard to the collection of delinquent taxes, which affects the whole state as well as Multnomah county.

The decision is in regard to the 1907 law which differs from the previous law in the matter of the collection of delinquent taxes, under the present law when taxes have been delinquent for six months a certificate of delinquency is made out against the property on which the tax is owed. The payment is then enforced by foreclosure, without advertisement. Under the decision no certificate of delinquency can be issued on the 1906 tax roll, and taxes on that roll which are now delinquent must be collected under the old system, as though the 1907 law had not been passed.

BOY KIDNAPPED.

Stolen While Playing in Front of His Home.

Chicago, Sept. 4.—Golden Anderson, aged 3, son of William Anderson, the assistant auditor of the Illinois Steel company, was kidnapped today while playing in front of his home. It is supposed he will be held for ransom. A woman saw a strange man drive up and seize the boy. A general alarm has been given.

Trouble Over Tickets.

Boise, Sept. 4.—Both the factions of the democratic party today filed their tickets nominated in the Wallace convention with the secretary of state, who will be required to recognize one as the regular ticket. The losing faction will bring an action in the supreme court.

Boise, Sept. 4.—Secretary of state Lansdon accepted the anti-Dubois ticket as the regular ticket and refused to file the Dubois ticket. Dubois' attorneys have announced today they will bring mandamus proceeding in the supreme court against Lansdon.

Jordan Talks of Crime.

Boston, Sept. 4.—Chester S. Jordan today told Judge Wentworth how he killed his wife. He said he hacked the body to pieces with a razor and a butcher knife and planned to throw the parts of the remains in the ocean from the steamer, then to go to New York. He says he slept all night after the killing and cut body up the following day. He said they quarreled and his wife struck him. Then he knocked her down stairs, where he found her dead. He put the hacked body in a trunk which aroused the suspicious hackman.

Mysterious Murder.

Boise, Sept. 4.—Wm. C. Simmons, who shot and killed August Stanke, about two years ago in a quarrel over a line fence, was found dead in his barn yard today on his ranch in Highland valley. The body was covered with blood, indicating foul play. No examination of the body has been made pending the arrival of the coroner. At the time he killed Stanke he wounded Louis Jaernling, who was a witness against him. Simmons was acquitted on self-defense.

Local Option Scares Them.

Boise, Sept. 4.—Because of the recent action of the state republican convention which pledged the party to local option, eastern capitalists who have invested hundreds of thousands in property here as a site for a half million dollar hotel, announced they had abandoned the project today on account of being unable to make a hotel pay without a bar.

Head in a Bucket.

Rome, Sept. 4.—Morgue officials are today aiding the police in an effort to unravel what is thought to be a gruesome murder. It was revealed when Mrs. W. H. Alexander pulled up a man's head in a bucket from an old moor ditch running through the fashionable part of the city. The head bore marks of violence.

Chicago Marathon.

Chicago, Sept. 4.—The annual Marathon run of the Illinois Athletic club of Chicago, the big event of its kind in the west, will be contested tomorrow, with a big field of entrants.

OLYMPIC ATHLETES TO COMPETE.

New York, Sept. 4.—James H. Rector, Lawrence Robertson and Robert Cloughen will meet in the 100-meter dash in the games of the Irish American A. C. at Celtic park on Labor day. Altogether, nearly a score of athletes who won the Olympic championships in London for the United States will be among the competitors.

The meet will be a revival of the Olympic games, and the program will consist of the more important of the events contested at Sheppard Bush.

In the 400-meter run Melvin W. Sheppard, J. B. Taylor and C. R. Bacon and several other champions will face the starter, while in the 800-meter event the same men, with H. Muller, Joseph Brownlow, Jr., and J. Glassing are entered. The 1500-meter event will be contested by Harvey Cohn, W. Berker, Win Bailey, George V. Bonhag and others, and John Daly and J. J. Joyce are scheduled to start in the 3200-meter steeplechase.

All the famous weight men have agreed to take part in the hammer, shot and discus events. They include John Flanagan, Matt McGrath, S. P. Gilchrist, M. F. Horr, Lee J. Talbot, Platt Adams, W. Kersburg and Ralph Rose. A special 16-pound shot match event has been added to the program in which Rose will endeavor to break the existing record. The all-round championships will be decided at the meet.

Commercial Congress.

Prague, Sept. 4.—Matters connected with international trade and commerce will be considered at length by the influential delegates gathered in Prague today for the annual session of the International Commercial congress. The inaugural session will not be held until tomorrow, but all the delegates are in the city and are entertained by the municipality of Prague and representatives of the Australian government.

The United States is officially represented at the congress by Frank D. LaLanne of Philadelphia, who was appointed by the state department of the Washington government. He was present at the last session in Milan and his knowledge of commercial affairs led to his election as vice-president of the congress.

Buried His Savings.

Morrilton, Ark., Sept. 4.—O. D. Earl, of this place, is the happiest man in Arkansas. A check for \$975, signed by the authorized agents of Uncle Sam's treasury department, is the reason for his joy.

Four years ago Mr. Earl accumulated the neat sum of \$10,000. Distrusting the banks, he deposited the currency in an old pall, which he buried. Having occasion to use some of the money recently, he dug up the pall, only to find his treasure rotted and decayed to an extent that resembled a bunch of dried leaves.

On the advice of local bankers Mr. Earl sent the decayed money to the treasury department at Washington.

but he was hopeless of receiving any return, believing the currency decayed beyond recognition. The experts of the redemption division were wiser than he thought, however, and succeeded in identifying all but \$25 of the \$10,000.

Mr. Earl declares that one experience of the kind is sufficient and hereafter he will allow the banks to take charge of his savings.

Frank H. Sargent Dead.

Washington, Sept. 4.—Frank H. Sargent, United States commissioner general of immigration, died here today from the effects of a fall resulting from a sudden stroke of paralysis two months ago. Sargent was named by the republican national committee as one of the principal speakers for the coming campaign.

A sensation was caused recently by the democratic national committee republishing an article written by Sargent some 15 years ago vigorously attacking Judge Taft for the adverse labor decision from the bench of the state circuit court. Sargent was then president of the American Brotherhood of locomotive firemen.

Sweetpea Carnival.

Bozeman, Mont., Sept. 4.—After one of the most elaborate celebrations ever held here, Bozeman's annual sweetpea carnival and interstate fair will come to a close today. Thousands of people are here for the closing day of the festivities.

To Greet Athletes.
