A PATHETIC PARADE

Feeble Veterans Cause of Much Sympathy from Bystanders—Glamorous Struggle to Keep in Line.

Toledo, O., Sept. 4.—The Grand Army parade today was remarkable for the absence of accidents and cases of exhaustion and for the good order which prevailed, not only among the dense crowds along the line of march but throughout the city. Mayor Whitlock tonight stated that despite the crowd of 100,000 visitors there had been fewer accidents, fewer misdemeanors and less work for the police than on any average days of the year. The weather was of the made-to-order variety, bright sunlight and a temperature comfortably below the summer average. To this fact was due the lack of activity at the two emergency hospitals. Aside from a veteran who was slightly bruised by being hit by an ambulance, there were no accidents and not more than a dozen visited the hospitals as the result of fatigue. All were able to leave after resting.

Thousands in Line.

Estimates of the number of veterans in line varied from 8000 to 12,000. The various posts marched with half a block between them and the departments were even further apart. There was a good 10 feet separating each row of marchers, and it was this liberality of space which made it require four hours to pass the reviewing stand. Fully half the veterans wore the badges of either Michigan or Ohio.

Carried Stools.

Some veterans carried camp stools over their arms and whenever there was a halt they promptly sat down, to the envy of their comrades. The first amusing incident of the march came with the marching past of the Rhode Island detachment. The veteran tars in sailor suits, and each carrying a broom bearing the placard, "Who won the battles of '61 and '65? We did," danced along the way and were the targets of many howlers. The Borden sharpshooters carried their name on a twelve foot cloth sustained by poles at each end and borne by men.

Georgia, with 30 in line elicited applause by displaying a bundle of cornstalks from 12 to 15 feet in length. South Dakota's veteran sons paraded with cobs of corn stuck on the end of canes carried over their shoulders, while North Dakota hinted of its staple crop with heads of wheat tacked in their hats. This department also had a full rigged Uncle Sam, one of the two in evidence during the day. Oklahoma, proud of her new statehood, to make sure that the fact was understood, bore a banner with "State of Oklahoma" in ample lettering. The popularity of the refreshments served at the rendezvous points was attested by the appearance of souvenir tin cups at the belt of nearly every man. The Fourth Michigan carried a pole on top of which was an imprisoned rooster. On the side of the coop was the boast, "We Captured Jeff Davis." We swept the ocean; you keep it clean," was an admonition which called for cheers.

Step Is Firm.

While there were details of the picture which appealed strongly to sympathy for the veterans' declining years, it was on the whole a cheerful sight. For the most part the step of the men was firm, their faces betrayed eager interest and they seemed to be enjoying the applause and the smaller fife and drum music without a thought of the years. Many and many a veteran, vowing himself good for another war, pranced and danced along, to the vast approval of his comrades.

Treadwell Not Guilty.

San Francisco, Sept. 4.—After being out seven hours the jury which tried James Treadwell for perjury in connection with the examination by the grand jury into the affairs of the suspended California Safe Deposit and Trust company, returned a verdict late this afternoon of acquittal.

Treadwell, according to the charge in the indictment returned by the grand jury, testified in denial of the fact that he had hypothecated the bonds known as the Colton securities. It developed from the testimony of witnesses that the securities were hypothecated by him, and he now claims that at the time that the question was propounded to him he did not understand it, and disclaimed that he made the answer which constituted the alleged perjury.

ACTOR KILLS WIFE.

was closeted with the police officials and time after time went over the horrible details. While he protested that he was dazed when the crime was committed, yet by the clearness and consciousness of his tale it seemed apparent that whatever preceded the actual killing, the most careful plans were laid for the disposal of the body and the covering up of the crime.

Story of Crime.

Jordan's story of the murder was substantially as follows:

He stated that he was married in September, 1904 to Mrs. Honora Eddy, whose maiden name was O'Reilly and whose home was in Somerville. He did not know who his wife's first husband was or what and become of him. The couple went on the vaudeville stage. Mr. Jordan taking the part of a tramp and his wife that of a nurse, in a sketch.

They went first to Butte, four years ago, but only remained there three or four weeks. Later they went to Chicago and appeared in some of the smaller theaters there, remaining three months. About three years ago they returned to Somerville and took a flat in the house at 509 Medford street. Mrs. Jordan, according to her husband, had taken to drinking of late, and he claims, was associated with other men and he became jealous. It was in a jealous quarrel that the trouble which ended in the death of his wife.

Knocked Her Down Stairs.

Jordan declares that his wife struck him first, that he then knocked his wife down stairs, and was horrified to find that he had killed her. This happened at 7:20 o'clock Tuesday night. Fearing discovery, he conceived the idea of cutting the body up, taking it away on one of the steamers, and throwing the parts overboard and then reporting to the police that his wife had left him.

Jordan, according to his confession, went out and bought a heavy butcher knife. With this and a razor and shears he severed the head from the body and, after putting the scalp and hair in the kitchen range, placed the skull in the furnace in the cellar. The legs and arms were cut from the body and the flesh sliced off in strips, leaving the bones of the limbs practically bare. The bones were placed in the furnace and the chunks of flesh piled into a trunk with the torso. The trunk was taken to the Somerville station and shipped to Boston sometime Wednesday.

Trunk Left at Station.

Jordan came to Boston and endeavored to secure passage for New York on the Harvard but learned that the steamer was not running that day. The body remained at the North station over night.

Early today Jordan engaged Hackman Collins to take the trunk to the South station, where Jordan intended to board a New York train. He changed his mind, however, and purchasing a ticket of the Cunard steamer Ivernia, which was to sail tomorrow for Liverpool again called the same hackman and had him take the trunk to the Hancock street house. Jordan then went off and bought a roll of wire, wire nippers and eight window weights, which he described as "sinks," and several sheets of heavy wrapping paper. With these he stated he intended to wrap up the parts of the body of his wife, weigh them with the window irons and throw them into the Charles river. The weights, paper and wire were found in the room with the trunk.

Jordan declared to the police that after knocking his wife down stairs and finding that she was dead, he placed the body in the kitchen and went to bed to sleep. When he awoke in the morning he cooked his own breakfast in the kitchen, eating it in the presence of the body of his wife. In the afternoon, Jordan said, he dismembered the body.

Deer Island, Me., Sept. 4.—Searching parties are today dragging Penobscot bay trying to recover the bodies of five of the seven who were drowned last night through the capsizing of a sloop commanded by Captain Haskell. Two dead have been recovered. It is thought the other five have been carried away by the sea.

Los Angeles, Sept. 4.—Ceremonies attending the laying of the corner stone of the \$150,000 building now being erected at Third and Olive streets for the Los Angeles lodge of Elks, were held tonight, several hundred members of the order from other cities of southern California being present.

Dies on Witness Stand.

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 4.—Mrs. John Reinhardt died yesterday of heart failure produced by mental strain and fear while testifying at Beaumont, near here, to save her husband, who had invoked the "unwritten law" as his defense for killing Edward Cantrell. She was undergoing a severe cross-examination at the hands of the prosecution attorney and suddenly collapsed on the stand. It was thought she had merely fainted, and was removed to another room. The trial was proceeding when the announcement came that she was dead. Judge Pope immediately released the prisoner on \$500 bail.

Reinhardt killed Cantrell at Saratoga, Texas, August, 4. Mrs. Reinhardt had complained that Cantrell pursued her and annoyed her frequently. She had warned him that he must desist, but he paid no attention and she finally told her husband, Mr. and Mrs. Reinhardt were together at Saratoga at the time of the killing, and Cantrell, believing Mrs. Reinhardt was alone, approached her. She called her husband and the shooting resulted.

Sues Doctor for Damages.

New York, Sept. 4.—Denying the right of a coroner's physician to perform an autopsy when it is not necessary to determine the cause of death, and denying particularly the right of the physician to remove the organs of a body, even though that action may add to the medical knowledge of the world, Mrs. Mary Hassard, has brought action against Dr. Timothy D. Dehane for \$25,000 damages. Mrs. Hassard's son, Francis, 29 years old, died on April 2, 1907, as the result of an injury sustained by falling from a coach. Mrs. Hassard alleges in her complaint that immediately after that, without warrant, law and without her knowledge or permission, Dr. Dehane performed an autopsy.

Also Stage Robber.

Chicago, Cal., Sept. 4.—Matt Jackson, who was arrested and charged with holding up 15 lumbermen in a single night, has been identified by the federal authorities as A. Carlson, and is charged with robbing the Elkhorn stage in Oregon on July 2. It is understood that he will be indicted.

Arrested on Serious Charge.

Walla Walla, Sept. 4.—Charged with a statutory offense on the person of Miss Leona H. Slater of this city, Maurice W. Miller lies in the county jail where he will be held awaiting trial. The charge was filed with the prosecuting attorney yesterday afternoon and was sworn to by C. C. Slater, the father of the girl.

It is alleged in the complaint that the offense was committed on May 1. The fact that Miss Slater is but a trifle over 16 years of age makes the charge against Miller all the more serious. It is very probable that the case will come up for trial in the superior court, but the date has not been set.
