PROMINENT MEN WILL ATTEND FAIR

John W. Kern, Vice-Presiden-
tial Candidate, Latest on the
Program.

AARON S. WATKINS WILL
REPRESENT PROHIBITION.

Fair Preparations Now Rushing—
Old Fiddlers' Contest for Pioneer
Day Promises Excitement—Morrow
County Enters the Game—Special
Train Will Bring Pilot Rock People
to the Fair One Day in the Week.

The vice-presidential candidates are
now scheduled to speak here during
the district fair, John W. Kern, dem-
ocratic candidate, being the latest ad-
dition to the program. The other
will be Hon. Aaron S. Watkins, can-
didate for vice-president on the pro-
hibition ticket.

News was received here last even-
ing from J. B. Ryan, democratic
state chairman, to the effect that Mr.
Kern will be here during the fair.
The fair commissioners asked some
time ago that a speaker of national
prominence be sent here and as the
vice-presidential candidate is to be
in the northwest on a campaigning
tour about that time he has been
slated for the post.

Because of his prominence through-
out being W. J. Bryan's running mate
the coming of Mr. Kern will be await-
ed with interest and his presence will
add much to the fair.

Old Fiddlers' Contest.

Another feature that promises to
be a good one was arranged by the
fair board this morning. It is to be
an old fiddlers' contest and the qual-
ifications for admission will be that
the contestant crossed the plains not
later than '69 and cannot read music.
The contest will be held on Pioneer
day and will be arranged by the of-
ficers of the pioneer association.

Morrow County Coming.

Word was received here last even-
ing that Morrow county has appro-
priated the \$250 asked for to provide
a county exhibit. The display is to
be managed by D. C. Gurdane, broth-
er of Chief of Police Tom Gurdane.

On one of the days of the fair week
a special train will be run on the
Umatilla Central for the accommoda-
tion of the people in that section. The
train will be run to this place in the
morning and will return at a late hour
in the evening.

This forenoon the board held a
meeting at the fair office for the pur-
pose of going over matters then pend-
ing. It was the first meeting that
Leon Cohen had attended since the
middle of August and he expressed
himself as surprised and pleased at
the progress that has been made at
the fair grounds.

Concessions Granted.

The right to sell ice cream, candy
and ice cream cones within the fair
pavilion during fair week was given
to the Pendleton creamery company,
their bid being the most favorable
one for the concession. Restaurant
rights were given to the sisters of
the St. Anthony's hospital and the
eating booth will be maintained by
that organization.

MONEY FOR THE HINKLE PROJECT

The Western Land & Irrigation
company, owners of the Hinkle pro-
ject, southwest of Echo, is now ar-
ranging to borrow \$150,000 and it is
understood the money is to be used
in the development of the project.

A trust deed for the above named
amount was filed at the recorder's
office this morning by J. W. Mesmer,
president of the irrigation company.
The deed is to the Marion Trust
company, a bonding company.

CUMMINS HAS TROUBLE.

Des Moines, Sept. 5.—The
48 stand-patters who bolted
the republican caucus nominat-
ing Gov. Cummins for senator
yesterday, today held a meet-
ing and decided to oppose the
election of Cummins Wednes-
day. If stand-patters are forced
to vote they will divide their
strength between the candi-
dates, making a deadlock and
preventing a decision. "Pro-
gressives" favoring the election
of Cummins say the stand-pat-
ters will split the party in Iowa
and cause a democratic victory
here.

Cummins Issues Statement.

Governor Cummins today issued a
statement: "If elected to the senate
for the short term and am not the
choice of republicans at the November
primaries, I will resign and use my in-
fluence to secure the election of the
nominee receiving the greatest num-
ber of votes." The statement is cal-
culated to offset efforts of the stand-
patters to delay the selection of a
senator by the legislature until after
the November election.

SOCIALIST RIOT IN SCOTLAND

HUNGRY SOCIALISTS TRY TO MOB PRINCE

Attack Hall Where City Corporation
Were Giving Extravagant Lunch-
con—Driven Back by Bayonets and
Clubs—Hooted Procession on Way
to City Hall.

Glasgow, Sept. 5.—Thousands of
hungry socialists stormed the hall
where Prince Arthur and suite were
guests of honor at an elaborate lunch-
con today. They tried to mob the
prince but were driven back by the
guard. Many were injured in the
fighting. Trouble followed cries of
denunciation against the managers of
the city corporation for the extrava-
gance of the luncheon served in hon-
or of the prince.

The socialists shouted that thou-
sands were hungry and starving and
held meetings of protest. An attack
followed, but they were driven back
with bayonets and clubs. The social-
ists followed the officials, under the
protection of guards, as they pro-
ceeded to the city hall and jeered and
hooted the procession all the way.

ENGLISH NOBLEMAN BROKE AND WANTS WORK

Cincinnati, Sept. 5.—The mayor has
undertaken to secure work for a
member of the English nobility who
has but 15 cents, and whose room
rent is due. The mayor was accosted
by a man appearing to be a club man
who asked for help. He said: "I
have but 15 cents; my name is
Charles E. Kilcourse-Lambert, am an
Oxford graduate and was a lieutenant
in her majesty's service during the
Boer war, and am a cousin of the
Earl of Cavan, and want work."

New Rear Admiral.

Washington, Sept. 5.—Rear Admi-
ral John P. Merrell, one of the most
proficient and versatile officers of the
navy will retire Monday, by operation
of the age limit. Captain William J.
Barnette will be promoted to the
rank of rear admiral.

REPUBLICANS OPEN CAMPAIGN

Formally Commenced at Big
Meeting in Youngtown,
Ohio, Today.

GOVERNOR HUGHES CENTER OF INTEREST

Ten Thousand Mill Workers March-
ed in Parade—City Spends Twenty-
Five Thousand Dollars in Decora-
tions—Hughes Assails Bryan
and His Policies—Arthur Vorys Al-
so Makes Speech.

Youngstown, O., Sept. 5.—Arthur
Vorys, the original Taft manager, acted
as chairman today in the meeting
held marking the opening of the re-
publican campaign in Ohio. Thou-
sands from all parts of the state are
participating in the event. Governor
Hughes is the center of interest. His
speech supporting Taft and assailing
Bryan was the main feature. It was
the first appearance of Hughes in the
campaign. The parade started at 11
o'clock. Ten thousand mill workers
marched in the parade. The city
alone spent \$25,000 in decorations.

Congressman Kennedy introduced
Vorys as chairman in a lively speech.
Vorys, in the opening address, declar-
ed that the republican party courage-
ously faces the problems arising from
the great developments of the coun-
try. He paid a high tribute to Presi-
dent Roosevelt and praised his poli-
cies. Vorys ridiculed the idea that
the democrats' plan was sufficient to
eradicate the evils in the government
and in conclusion eulogized Senator
Reveridge and Governor Hughes. The
New York governor was given an
ovation when introduced and spoke
for almost two hours upon the issues
of the campaign and the interests of
the people as against those of the
corporations. He devoted some time
to the doctrines advocated by Bryan.
In the course of his remarks he said:

"William Jennings Bryan is an elo-
quent critic, but the record of the
republican party is known to all and
the American people will neither be
confused nor misled by adroit thrusts
or pleaders' skill. If all that Bryan
has favored during the past 12 years
had been enacted into law, we would
have been overwhelmed with disaster
and would regard it our chief busi-
ness in the future to find a way of
escape from the meshes of ill-con-
sidered legislation. Bryan says the
democratic platform 'is binding as to
what it omits as well as to what it
contains.'"

LABOR DAY WILL BE CELEBRATED

Monday, September 7, Will Be
Fittingly Observed All Over
the United States.

PROMINENT MEN SCHEDULE TO SPEAK

Parades, Music, Games, Sports and
Literary Programs Planned—
Be a Universal Holiday—Many
Subjects Vital to the Interests of
Labor Will Be Discussed by Well
Known Orators.

New York, Sept. 5.—New York
unions will celebrate Labor day with
the customary enthusiasm which has
marked every observation since the
first September 5, 1882. Following
the parade, many outings and picnics
will be held. In the evening a great
mass meeting will be held in Grand
Central Palace, with Clarence S.
Darrow of Chicago, as the principal
speaker. Mr. Darrow is an attorney
of international reputation and was
chief counsel for Moyer, Haywood and
Petibone, the western labor leaders,
whose trial for murder in Idaho re-
sulted in their acquittal. He was also
attorney for Eugene V. Debs in the
cases growing out of the great Pull-
man strike in 1894. He is a social-
ist, and the proceeds from his address
will go to the support of the New
York daily newspaper organ of the
socialists. Addresses will also be
made by Robert Hunter, the author,
and several others.

Boston.

Boston, Sept. 5.—Final prepara-
tions were concluded today by the
Boston Central Trades union for the
biggest observance of Labor day in
the history of the Hub. A mammoth
pageant, with representatives of all
the unions of Boston and surrounding
cities in line, will pass through the
streets and will be reviewed by Gov-
ernor Gould, Mayor Hibbard and
other officials.

Despite the depression of the last
year, organized labor was never
stronger in this city, and the pros-
perity of the working men will be
reflected in the many bands, banners
and spectacular features of the pa-
rade.

New Orleans.

New Orleans, Sept. 5.—Reports re-
ceived here from all over Dixie indi-
cate that southern wage workers will
observe Labor day more generally
than ever before. An extensive pro-
gram has been arranged for the cele-
bration in this city, and elaborate fe-
stivities will also mark the day in Gal-
veston, Jackson, Memphis, Chatta-
nooga and other industrial centers of
the south.

Atlanta.

Atlanta, Sept. 5.—Labor unions,
all over Georgia have been invited to
celebrate Labor day in this city as the
guests of the Atlanta Federation of
Labor, and an immense crowd is ex-
pected in the city. Every effort is
being made by the committees in
charge to eclipse their previous suc-
cesses.

St. Paul.

St. Paul, Minn., Sept. 5.—All of the
seventy-five international unions rep-
resented in St. Paul will take part in
the Labor day celebration, which will
include a parade and an athletic pro-
gram at Harriet Island. Observance
of the day as a holiday will be gen-
eral all throughout the northwest.

Chicago.

Chicago, Sept. 5.—Problems con-
nected with the relations of labor
and capital will be discussed from
many pulpits tomorrow. As usual,
Labor day will be elaborately cele-
brated here and in Milwaukee, Pe-
oria and other cities in Illinois and
Wisconsin.

ALASKA WHEAT IS "NO GOOD"

SECRETARY WILSON MAKES STATEMENT.

Department Receives Report From
Agent Sent to Investigate—Poor
Quality and Yields Poorly—Recent
Analysis Shows Real Character.

Washington, Sept. 5.—Secretary of
Agriculture James Wilson today an-
nounced that Dr. Galloway, the gov-
ernment agent who was sent to Ju-
nata, Idaho, to investigate the re-
ports concerning the wonderful new
wheat, claimed to have been discov-
ered in Alaska, and introduced into
Idaho, reported the wheat is a fake.
Wilson said: "The Alaska wheat
yields but 25 bushels to the acre. The
grain is badly mixed, and of an in-
ferior quality. The recent analysis
showed the so-called Alaska wheat
contains but little more than nine-
percent of protein. All soft winter
wheat contains on an average
of 16 per cent."

CONTINUE THE JOURNEY.

American Fleet Sails From Melbourne
Today En Route for Albany.

Melbourne, Sept. 5.—Amid the
roaring of guns from the forts and
the British ships in the harbor the
American fleet promptly at 8 o'clock
this morning left for Albany. King
George's sound, Queensland. The
New Jersey remained behind to get
to mail from America, which is ex-
pected tomorrow.

The officers said: "We have kept
our dates almost to the minute." The
ships are expected to arrive at Al-
bany on September 11 where they
will coal for the long trip to Manila,
which is a distance of 3200 miles, ex-
pecting to arrive there October 1.

FOUR AMERICAN BOYS ARRESTED

Mexican Authorities Refuse
to Release Them When Re-
quested by Consul.

WERE FISHING ON MEX- ICAN SIDE OF LINE.

Boys Were Carrying Small Target
Rifles—Enticed to Mexican Side by
Rurales—Relatives Forbidden to
See Them.

El Paso, Sept. 5.—American Con-
sul Edwards today failed in his ef-
forts to secure the release of the four
American-born Mexican boys who
were arrested while fishing on the
Mexican side of the line, because
they were carrying small target rifles.
Their relatives have been forbidden
to see them. The boys were enticed
to the Mexican side of the river by
Rurales.

LION TAMER INJURED.

Attacked by Lion While Giving an Ex-
hibition.

New York, Sept. 5.—Heinrich Fal-
kenderph, the internationally famous
lion tamer, is in a precarious condition
today as a result of an attack on him.
His scalp was terribly lacerated and
his shoulders were ripped to shreds
by the claws of the monster lion, Ra-
jah, in an exhibition cage at Coney
Island in the presence of 500 people.
The animal was separated from the
tamer by firing blank cartridges in
his face and prodding him with sharp
prods spiked to poles.

AFTER SIX ATTEMPTS.

Divorce Granted After Repeated Ef-
forts in Court.

San Francisco, Sept. 5.—After
suing each other on six different oc-
casions in the superior court in this
city, James Dunphy, a millionaire
stock rancher, and Mrs. Edith Dun-
phy, were legally separated by Judge
Graham granting the wife a divorce,
and awarding her alimony in the sum
of \$60,000. The decision ends a
long series of sensational suits. The
wife alleged cruel and inhuman
treatment by her husband, and he
averred that she was often unfaith-
ful.

ATTRACTS MORBIDLY CURIOUS.

Search for Barry's Remains Where
Mrs. Donohue Was Found.

Oakland, Sept. 5.—A curious crowd
collected about the sewage moistened
foul-smelling pit under the walls of
the western furniture factory at Em-
eryville today watching Deputy Mar-
shal Lippl delving into the soft mud
where the decomposed body of Mrs.
Alice Donohue was found Sunday. It
is thought Joseph Barry, the woman's
former consort, is buried in the same
place. That both were victims of
the same plot.

Wright May Win Prize.

Lemans, France, Sept. 5.—After
the first flight around the military
course here today when the aeroplane
remained in the air 19 minutes and
48 seconds, and almost equalling Hen-
ri Farman's record flight, Wilbur
Wright, American, attempted a second
flight, damaging the machine. Experts
believe Wright will be able
to meet the requirements imposed by
Lemans Weiller, thereby winning the
\$100,000 prize offered by a syndi-
cate.

Gompers Visits Democrats.

Chicago, Sept. 5.—Gompers visited
democratic headquarters today and
conferred with the leaders in connec-
tion with the proposed appeal to the
labor vote.

CHAUFFEUR KILLED BY ENRAGED PARENT

Genoa, Italy, Sept. 5.—Distracted
by the sight of his little son Anton
killed by an auto here today, Angelo
Caffoni, an engineer, shot and
killed the chauffeur and fatally
