NEVINS TO COMMAND G. A. R. VETERANS

Toledo, Ohio, Sept. 5.—Colonel Henry M. Nevins of Red Bank, N. J., was today elected commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic. The election occurred on the first ballot which gave Mr. Nevins 454 votes, compared with 254 for former Governor Van Sant of Minnesota and 99 for L. T. Diskason of Illinois. On motion of the former Minnesota executive the nomination of the New Jersey man was made unanimous. Other officers were chosen as follows:

Senior vice commander—J. Kent Hamilton of Ohio; junior vice commander, C. C. Royce of California; Chaplain in chief, J. E. Spence of Tennessee; surgeon in chief, J. Lane Tunchill of Maryland.

J. W. Stephens of Alabama made a fight for junior vice commander on the ground that the south, with its 150,000 graves of unburied dead to care for, still is represented on the national staff.

Choose City Today.

The selection of a city for the next encampment will be made tomorrow and although the weight of sentiment so far expressed is in favor of Salt Lake City, his city is certain to meet with opposition.

Colonel Nevins, a native of New Jersey, was studying law with the late Russell A. Alger of Michigan when war broke out and enlisted from Michigan with the Lincoln cavalry. Young Nevins rose to a commission with the seventh Michigan and the twenty-fifth New York cavalry regi-

ments, and lost an arm in front of Fort Stevens when the union army was engaged with General Early. Col. Nevins, beside being twice department commander of New Jersey has been a judge and president of the New Jersey senate.

Indians Fined.

Victoria, B. C., Sept. 5.—The difficulty with the Indians of Salmon Arm has been settled by Superintendent of Provincial Police Hussey without appeal to force, and a dangerous situation was averted through tact and skillful handling of the veteran police officer.

Rescued by their fellows when sent to jail for an infraction of game laws, the Indians of the district assumed threatening attitude. Chief Hussey was sent out by the government and on his approach the Indians fled. He sent out runners informing them that they must come in and hold a pow-wow and such was their confidence in him that the delinquents came. The chiefs have agreed to pay a fine, the braves implicated in the rescue surrendering themselves to the law and all have promised to respect the fishery regulations in future. The Indians who effected the rescue, in view of their surrender will not be prosecuted by the crown, Attorney General Bowser has announced.

Taft Comments on Vermont Returns

Commenting on the returns of the Vermont election Secretary Taft said: "The returns are very satisfactory."

In round numbers the majority is 30,000, which is nearly what it was in 1904, and equal to what it was in 1906. It is an indication that there is no trend toward such a radical change in the opinion of the electorate as is essential to the democratic success in November. It would perhaps have been better, from the standpoint of the party managers, if the majority had been less, in order that the danger of over confidence might be lessened among the republicans.

James R. Garfield and Mrs. Garfield reached here today. It was announced that Secretary Garfield would put in four days on the stump in Maine.

Bass fishing conditions today were the best since Mr. Taft has been here. This morning the catch amounted to 17 bass, five sheepheads and one pickerel.

TO ENTERTAIN THE ATHLETES

BAKER CITY PLANS RECEPTION FOR OREGON BOYS

Olympic Heroes, Kelly, Gilbert and Smithson to Be Given a Grand Reception in Kelly's Home Town.

Baker City, Sept. 5.—Yesterday Mayor Johns took up the matter of entertaining the returning athletes in a vigorous manner, and appointed a committee to secure funds and create a program for the occasion. The committee consists of J. A. Churchill, chairman; J. T. Donnelly, F. P. Bodinson, W. S. Bowers, C. H. Breck. The committee has full power to do all things for the entertainment of the boys. There is a committee appointed by the Elks which will cooperate with the civic committee.

Gauntlet Lodge K. of P. No. 8 appointed a committee consisting of W. S. Levens and Walter Meacham to cooperate with the other committees and will throw the auditorium of the Castle Hall open to the committees and to the athletes free for any purpose it may be necessary to use it for.

There will be undoubtedly a royal time extended to the boys when they arrive in Baker, and to this end, J. H. O'Neill, traveling passenger agent of the O. R. & N., was in the city yesterday for the purpose of arranging rates from near points of a fare and one-third rate. The O. R. & N. is doing all it can to make the return of the Oregon boys a feature in the history of the state. Portland has raised the sum of \$10,000 for the entertainment of the young men and the business men of the city have decided to make the occasion one for a municipal holiday. Baker will be in line for a similar celebration.

THREE LIVING WIVES OF EX-PRESIDENTS

There are now living three widows of ex-presidents, Mrs. James A. Garfield, Mrs. Benjamin Harrison and Mrs. Grover Cleveland, says a Washington item. The presidents have usually died before their wives, as the work of the chief executive of the nation generally uses most of the vitality of the man engaged in it. Mrs. Garfield spends much of her time in Washington, where her son lives, and divides the rest between her old home in Ohio and Pasadena, Calif. She is a gentle, sweet woman, always ready to speak of her husband.

Mrs. Garfield receives a pension of \$5000 a year. Mrs. Benjamin Harrison married President Harrison after he left the white house, and she does not receive a pension. Mrs. McKinley also received the \$5000 pension up to the time of her death.

Harriman Comes Out of His Hole.

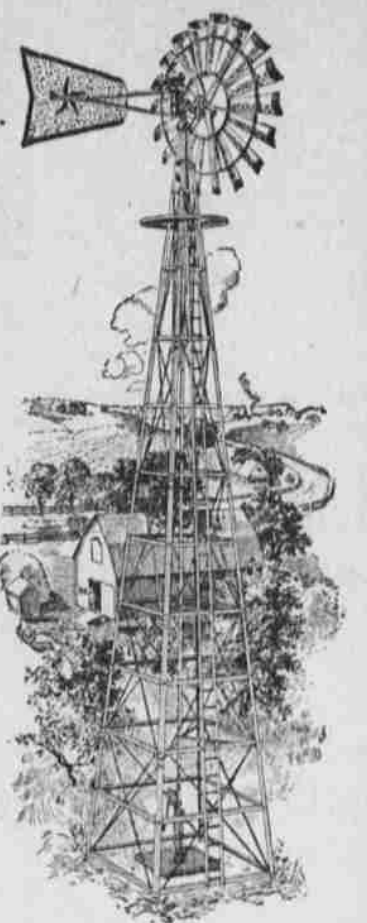
Klamath Falls, Ore., Sept. 5.—President E. H. Harriman of the Harriman line, who has been sojourning at his summer home at Pelican Bay with his family, will get into harness once more tomorrow. It has been arranged that Mr. Harriman will leave his lodge tomorrow morning for the east, via Portland. Mr. Harriman will be detained in Oregon for at least a week unless the present program is abandoned. He has accepted invitations to address commercial bodies in several Willamette valley towns and a number of conferences between Harriman and various officials of the O. R. & N. have been planned to occur in Portland. It is expected that Mr. Harriman will meet with the transportation committee of the chamber of commerce of Portland to talk over railroad development in eastern and central Oregon and the transportation situation generally.

Portland, Sept. 5.—To give President E. H. Harriman a chance to see what a stockholders meeting of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation company looks like, the directors of the corporation meet in annual session at noon today for the purpose of electing a new set of directors for the coming year, but adjourned for one week. This was done primarily to give Mr. Harriman an opportunity to be present, as he is expected to be in the city several days next week. The members of the board also thought it was only common courtesy to the "wizard of Wall street" to defer action, inasmuch as he owns all but about 15 shares of the stock, and has been so busy that he has not been able to attend a meeting in the entire history of the road; in fact, since its organization in 1896. It is hinted that Mr. Harriman may preside at the meeting.
