WOMAN SLAYER TO GO FREE.

McComas Be Dismissed After Having a Mistrial.

Los Angeles, Sept. 5.—According to a story published here today, W. P. McComas, the mining man and club man, who slew Mrs. Charlotte L. Noyes, on the 28th of last February, and whose trial for her murder resulted in a hung jury, will not again be tried. The court states that the complaint will be dismissed on September 21.

The trial attracted wide attention owing to the McComas prominence and the sensational features of the affair. McComas shot Mrs. Noyes to death after he had lived with her for several years. His defense was that the woman was attempting to throw acid in his face when he fired.

JUST FOR FUN.

Spends a Fortune for a Few Days' Pleasure.

San Francisco, Sept. 5.—Eleven thousand dollars seems but a mere handful of money to spend to see the sights of San Francisco, yet the Duke Ferdinand Mont Pensier, who is a cousin of the king of Spain, and son of Louis Philippe D. Orleans, the defender of the throne of France, thinks that much money sufficient for a few days. He is going to Delmonico and back in an auto, then goes to Mexico and then to Vancouver, B. C., on a hunting trip.

Attorneys Clash.

New York, Sept. 5.—A large crowd was attracted to the custom house today to hear the proceedings in the standard oil case before the government.

Moritz Rosenthal, representing the trust, and Frank Kellogg, for the government, clashed while C. T. Collins, second vice-president of the oil company of Kentucky, was testifying. He referred to A. C. Boardman the government witness who recently gave damaging testimony against the company and accusing it of being dishonest. Kellogg replied: "He is under indictment, like you." The lawyers clashed and were ordered to cease their personal attacks.

To Search for Brother's Bones.

Santa Ana, Calif., Sept. 5.—R. C. Howe is going to San Francisco to sail on September 8 for San Jose, Guatemala, where he will search for the bones of his brother Converse, who was drowned there 11 years ago while working on a dredger. Another brother, Edward C. Howe, a Colorado lawyer, is dead and left \$3000 for a search for the remains. If successful the remains will be brought to Pomona, California, for burial.

Sea Mystery Explained.

San Pedro, Cal., Sept. 5.—The mystery surrounding the wreck off Point Arena was cleared up today when the steamer Shanyak arrived here and Captain Hutton reported his vessel aground on a rock Wednesday night and was only saved by throwing the deckload overboard. Five men also fell into the sea, but all were saved through heroic rescue. The vessel ran into a dense fog.

Taft and Hitchcock Confer.

Middle Bass Island, Sept. 5.—Chairman Hitchcock arrived here today and held a long conference with Taft. He said: "The hard work has now begun and there will be no cessation until the election."

Johnson to Speak.

Huron, S. D., Sept. 5.—An address by Governor Johnson of Minnesota, will be a feature of the South Dakota state fair, which opens here Monday. It is expected that his address will deal with political topics.
