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WASHINGTON'S NEW NATURAL WONDER

One of nature's wonders, the cave of the Pend Oreille river region, visited by a score or so only, yet comparatively easily approached from a pioneer's standpoint, was explored by a party of seven, four ladies and three gentlemen, Friday last, who walked six miles by trail from the Frisco-Standard mine, 12 miles from Boundary, on the S. F. & N. railway.

The party was composed of Mrs. Estella B. Hall and Mrs. Elizabeth E. Lattimore of Spokane, Sylvester Rumsey, Miss Myrtle and Mrs. A. E. Conrad of Northport, Floyd Z. and E. E. Alexander of Spokane.

The cave is nearly one-half mile north from the main trail, with old blazes on trees, among logs and brush and perhaps at 200 feet greater elevation. A timber claim notice is near the only sign, "Trail to C," cut in a tree a half mile from the burnt district. This point is perhaps 15 miles down the Pend Oreille river from Metalline by trail.

The cave was measured by tape in a careless way, giving a distance of 785 feet in length, on a downward slope, generally easily traversed, as all, properly prepared in dress, went to the end.

The first half is a delightful spectacle in all the fantastic forms of stalactite growth, in their pure white and creamy tints, only marred on portions of the floor by surface drift, assisted by mountain rats.

A half dozen trees have fallen over the entrance which is about 12 to 14 feet wide and eight feet perpendicular, filled with broken rocks that extend 30 feet farther where the smoother floor begins. For 150 feet the chamber is from 20 to 30 feet high and from 10 to 16 feet wide.

In this space to the left is the cream-tinted velvet drapery in numerous folds reaching nearly to the floor from four feet above, extending about 10 feet with openings leading to a passage back in the surface direction, a distance of about 30 feet, where lining the walls, roof and floor are the deposits of lime from the pure white dolomite or marble of the country. From the upper end of this mystic gallery the "speaking tube" leads to the "fairies' chamber," in such a way that sounds appear to originate in each instance from opposite directions from the tube.

The gallery to the "fairies' chamber" leads upward, paralleling the mystic gallery but of greater length, and like the former there is room for only one person at a time in the passage.

The entrance is narrow and only a person of ordinary stature or less, may enter; then only by climbing four feet high and two down when one is in the most fascinating of places where only three may find room at a time.

Looking back by light of candles the purest of white icicle formed lime crystallized are pendant from the room while the purity of the walls and even floor is an everlasting delight in memory's storehouse. The "fairies' nectar tubes," the size of a soda-water straw, are in convenient places, about the gallery.

Fairies' Bathub.

The bathtubs of the fairies are in the main passageway and consist of several depressions, or rather built up walls in curves, an artist would be pleased to add to lawn ornamentation. These baths, now dry, are about a foot high and from two to six feet long, all with a substantial base tapering to an inch at the top, finished by a distinct "accordion pleating" a half inch high. The walls of the passageway are white and extend to the "giants' bathtubs," which are between three and four feet deep by eight in length, finished as the others. The dome, a stalagmite, as shown in pictures, is about 10 feet high, almost touching the roof; a beauty in tint and form—grand in conception. It is about five feet in diameter at the base, corrugated in perpendicular lines with a passageway on each side.

Then comes 12 baths, the larger of them 12 feet long, four feet wide and one deep, made of finest marble, in beautiful curves, all "accordion pleated," as the dressmaker expresses it, "Altar of the Gods."

To the right is the "Altar of the Gods," raised six feet and roofed over in suspended tapering forms, also frescoed as the handiwork of the "Gods of Nature" willed. Tapestry in varied fantastic forms are seen in various nooks and corners. The "Giant's Hat Block" is brown in color, smooth, shape of a derby, about two feet high and 18 inches in diameter, in the center of the passageway. At the beginning of the last 150 feet is the difficult passage only to be used by ordinary sized people. It is about four feet in length, horizontal, by 10 to 16 inches in height, with jagged roof. It begins on a steep,

smooth slope, ending in a five-foot perpendicular. To the right is the "Devil's Mud Bank" and gallery leading down to a narrow passage. The main cavern terminates for present pleasure and wonder seeking folks in a horizontal crevice too narrow to enter, as appearances indicate.

The original bottom is exposed in few places toward the lower portion, is covered with boulders of small dimensions, including granite quartzite slates, porphyry, syenite and other stones; the sediment is sand and clay.

YOUNG REED IS

TO BE TRIED

Jackson C. Reid, the 11-year old boy who shot and killed George F. DeMars at Guild's Lake last month, will be tried before a jury in the juvenile court Monday, September 14. Judge Gantenbein this morning fixed the date for the beginning of the trial. A jury of six will be drawn from the regular panel, and the trial will be presided over by Judge Gantenbein.

In company with Deputy District Attorney Thad Vreeland and Attorney H. M. Easterly, senior counsel for the boy, Judge Gantenbein went this afternoon to Guild's Lake to inspect the scene of the shooting. The judge will see for himself the distances from the house and from the shore the party was when the shooting occurred.

The jury of six before which the boy will be tried will determine whether he is a delinquent child by reason of the shooting. If they find that he is not, the case will end there, but if the jury should determine that he is delinquent, it will then be in Judge Gantenbein's discretion to determine whether to sentence the boy to the reform school or remand him to the grand jury for indictment and trial before the circuit court on such a charge as the grand jury may find.

Archie Loves to Whistle.

Because he carved the name of his beloved tutor on the back of his father's church pew, Archie Roosevelt was publicly reprimanded by the president, in the presence of many of the congregation, says an Oyster Bay item. Young Roosevelt stealthily cut the initials in the back of the pew while his parents were absorbed in the sermon, and it was not until the close of the services that the President observed what had been done.

The shut down of operations in the coal mines of Wyoming has put a sudden stop to the storing of coal in the railroad yards at La Grande. The company started in a few weeks ago to store 30,000 tons of coal in the new docks at this place and the work was discontinued yesterday on the arrival of the last trainload from the east.
