WILL PRESENT DAIRY ORDINANCE

City Physician Will Ask for
the Adoption of a Worthy
Measure.

TUBERCULAR COWS AND FILTH MUST GO

Ordinance Drawn During Summer
Will Be Given Council Tomorrow
Evening—Provides for General
Regulation of Dairies and For In-
spection for Bovine Tuberculosis
—Bureau of Animal Industry Will
Make Inspection.

At the council meeting tomorrow evening the dairy regulating ordinance, drafted this summer by Messrs Cole and McClure, will be presented and its adoption asked for. If passed the work of enforcing the measure will be taken up at once and every dairy cow in the vicinity of Pendleton will be tested for bovine tuberculosis. The work will be done by the bureau of animal industry men, working under Dr. McClure. The bureau is now doing similar work at Washington, D. C.

According to the authors of the ordinance it is a most meritorious one and should have been adopted here long ago. The ordinance in full is as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to sell or offer for sale within the city of Pendleton any milk or cream in which has been placed any foreign substance of any character for the purpose of preserving the same or of diluting the same or for any other purpose or to sell or offer for sale any milk containing less than 12 per cent of total solids, or to sell or offer for sale any milk which shall contain less than 3 1/4 per cent butter fat, or to sell or offer for sale any cream containing less than 18 per cent butter fat.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to sell or offer for sale within the city of Pendleton any skimmed or separated milk or any milk or cream from which has been removed any butter fat or other part of such milk or cream, unless the seller thereof causes the same to be labeled according to the true character thereof so that the purchaser may know the true condition thereof at the time of such purchase.

Sanitary Regulations.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to sell or offer for sale within the city of Pendleton any milk or cream unless the cows from which said milk or cream is obtained, and all enclosures, utensils and processes shall be kept and conducted in substantial requirement with the following conditions: The cows shall be in healthy condition and free from disease of any character, and shall be fed on wholesome food and shall not be allowed water from stagnant pools, and no milk shall be sold from any cow having any disease or having any abscess or suppurating sores or any inflamed condition of the udder, and all cows having any such disease, sore or inflammation shall be separated from the dairy herd until cured.

All stables shall be kept dry and free from drainage and in a good, clean, sanitary condition, and shall be thoroughly whitewashed at least four times each year, and no manure pile shall be located, kept or allowed to stand within 100 feet of such stable. All milking utensils or utensils used for the purpose of containing milk, or with which the milk shall in any manner come in contact shall be sterilized with boiling water after each using. Dairymen shall use all reasonable care to keep the cows clean and free from dirt, and to prevent any dirt, filth or contamination of any character from entering the milk, and all employees or persons engaged in milking or handling milk shall be cleanly dressed and shall wash their

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BANK BANDITS PLEAD GUILTY.

Young Outlaws Got 3000 in Bold Daylight Raid.

Sedan, Kan., Sept. 8.—Bill Tennant and Harry Coleman, the young bandits who robbed the Chautauqua State Bank at Chautauqua Springs, this county, in daylight on the morning of April 17, locking Cashier Waterhouse and Del Eastley, a customer, in the vault, entered a plea of guilty here today and each was sentenced to serve an indeterminate sentence of from 10 to 21 years in the state reformatory.

The men secured \$3000 and escaped on horseback. Tennant was captured in Denver and Coleman was arrested in the state of Washington.

SHERIDAN DISCHARGED.

Case Against Him Dismissed on Motion of Prosecutor.

Boise, Sept. 8.—On motion of special prosecuting attorney Fraser the case against R. S. Sheridan, the managing editor of the Capital News, accused of criminal libel, was dismissed today on the ground of insufficient evidence. The charge was brought by Gov. Gooding because the Capital News editorially attacked his administration.

MARRY WITHOUT QUEEN'S CONSENT

ABRUZZI TO WED MISS
ELKINS IN DECEMBER

Opposition to the Wedding by the Royal Italian Family of No Avail—The Duke Considered to be a Fortune Hunter by the Queen—The Reception of Katherine in Royal Circles Will No Doubt Be Very Pleasant for Her in View of the Circumstances.

Rome, Sept. 8.—The Milan Unione, a clerical paper, published an article which has been reprinted by the whole Italian press, to the effect that the Duke of Abruzzi will probably soon go to the United States to make definite arrangements for his marriage with Miss Katherine Elkins, daughter of United States Senator Stephen B. Elkins of West Virginia, and the ceremony will take place in December, on the duke's birthday. According to the Unione, the count of Turin, a few days ago, visited Dowager Queen Margherita at Grossen, where she is spending the summer and attempted to overcome her opposition to the marriage of his brother, the duke of Abruzzi, to Miss Elkins. It had been the intention of the duke to have the marriage ceremony take place in December if the opposition of the royal family could be removed, but during the recent celebration of the silver wedding of the duke and duchess of Genoa at which all the Savoy princes were present, opposition on the part of the queen appeared stronger than ever. She said that her views on the subject had not changed and she refused to give her consent to the marriage. She objected to such an alliance also because she believed many American thought that the duke of the Abruzzi had sought marriage with Miss Elkins when he found the American girl would come into a large estate.

The count declared that the duke was ready to marry Miss Elkins even without the queen's consent and left for Spezia to inform his brother of the failure of his mission.

CUMMINS MAY BE DEFEATED.

Des Moines, Iowa, Sept. 8.—The house took a vote on the senatorial contest here today with the following result: For Cummins, 44; Porter, democrat, 31; republican "standpaters," 28. Prospect not encouraging to Cummins. An adjournment was taken until this afternoon.

IS NOW THE CHAMPION

Ketchell, Former Holder of
the Middleweight Title, is
Knocked Out.

ATTELL AND MORAN FIGHT A DRAW

California the Scene of Two Great Fights—Papke Was Not Scratched—The Featherweights Put Up Rather a Tame Contest—Both Little Men Insist Victory Was Theirs—Moran Claims to Have Broken Hand Early in Fight—Ketchell's Manager Says "Best Man Won."

Vernon Arena, Los Angeles, Calif., Sept. 7.—Stanley Ketchell of Michigan, middleweight champion of the world, was knocked out in the twelfth round at Jeffries Vernon arena at 4 o'clock this afternoon by Billy Papke of Illinois, who is now middleweight champion of the world.

It was a case of Illinois thunderbolt against the Michigan cyclone and the thunderbolt won. Both men entered the ring in apparent perfect condition and neither had ever been knocked out. Ketchell had a decision over Papke in a previous ten round bout.

Papke's From First.

The fight was practically over one minute and twenty seconds after the gong sounded. From that time on it was merely a question as to how long Ketchell would last. Papke tore into Ketchell with such fury that the undefeated ring champion was simply lifted off his feet four times within the next minute. Papke knocked Ketchell to the mat for the count and from the first knock down Ketchell never really recovered his form. He was a defeated man, dazed, bleeding, struggling from 20 blows in the face and yet he came back and stayed with a terrible determination. And for at least three rounds he held his own with the victorious challenger. When Ketchell stepped to the center for the second round it was seen that his right eye was closed. At the next intermission his seconds lanced the eye socket and sucked the blood but Ketchell never regained the sight of his right eye. Before the finish the other eye was all but closed, and for the last three rounds he staggered about the ring dazed like a drunken man practically blind.

In the third Ketchell showed his best form when he forced Papke through the ropes, but when the bell sounded he stepped with his long fine stride eagerly for his corner.

Plays With Ketchell.

Through the fourth, fifth and sixth rounds Papke seemed to be babying his man along, seemingly to give the crowd a run for its money.

In the seventh Ketchell's mouth was bleeding and sucking air like an oyster.

In the eighth Ketchell's smile became ghastly. The corners of his mouth which smiled so boyishly when

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ATTEMPT TO KILL THE PRESIDENT

News Has Just Leaked Out in
Connection With Appearance of Armed Crank.

BULLET WHIZZED OVER THE PRESIDENT'S HEAD

Hurried Trip of Chief Wilkie and Force of Secret Service Men to Sagamore Explained—Roosevelt Wanted to Search Bushes Himself—Was Dissuaded by Friends—Might Have Been Fired by a Careless Hunter.

Oyster Bay, Sept. 8.—It was learned today that an attempt was made to assassinate President Roosevelt on last Saturday while he was out riding on the Cove road near Sagamore. The assassin fired from the bushes along the roadside, the bullet whizzing over the president, who pulled his horse up and wanted to search the bushes but a friend dissuaded him.

This explains the hurried trip of Chief Wilkie and a corps of secret service men to Sagamore.

Major Wadsworth, who was riding with President Roosevelt at the time declared today that he thought the bullet was fired by hunters engaged in target practice and not at the president.

The attempt to assassinate the president was made known when a crank armed with an antiquated bull dog revolver was caught near the president's house yesterday by the secret service guards. The man described himself as John Coughlin, a detective and when stopped by the secret service men, presented a card upon which was inscribed his name and the word "officer." He said that he had come to ask the president to order out 10,000 troops to catch yeggmen who had been terrorizing Boston. Coughlin is supposed to have reached Oyster Bay on the 12:19 train. He walked three miles to Sagamore Hill. The road leading to the president's house forks at the tennis court, 200 yards from the house and forms a loop about the president's home. The two guards who are on duty in the day time attend at either end of the house and their view commands both roads. One of the rules for visitors at Sagamore Hill is that no one shall come on foot; so when Secret Service Agent Adams caught sight of Adams totting up the hill road, he guessed that something was wrong, and motioned for the man to go back. Coughlin kept right on. Adams ran down the road to meet him. Coughlin produced his card and explained in the most casual way that he had come to confer with the president concerning the recent outrages by yeggmen in Boston and to lead back such troops as the president saw fit to order out.

Attempts to Draw Gun.

The secret service men tried to explain that the president was not seeing visitors at that moment, hoping to get him quietly out of the grounds. Coughlin hesitated a mo-

ment and then slid his hand toward the back pocket of his trousers. Adams grappled with him without further parley. Coughlin struggled for a moment but he is a slight built man and Adams had no difficulty in holding him until Agent Sloan came to his assistance. Sloan searched the man and found in his hip pocket a 32 calibre revolver of the "bulldog" type. The weapon was wrapped in a woolen bag and according to the secret service men, was not loaded. The slight struggle near the tennis court had not been observed at the house and the secret service men without alarming the president's family, got automobiles and carried Coughlin to the Oyster Bay town hall where he was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Franklin committed Coughlin to the county jail at Mineola. Coughlin will be examined as to his sanity.

Been in Asylum.

According to the secret service men Coughlin told them that he had been confined for three years in an asylum for the insane. President Roosevelt had returned from a horseback ride only a short time before Coughlin appeared at Sagamore Hill. He did not witness the arrest of the crank and had not been informed of the occurrence this evening.

STONE CAUGHT IN WALLA WALLA

FORMER WESTON LAWYER
AGAIN IN THE TOILS

Charged at Echo With Selling Liquor Was Released on \$500 Bail and Then Left State—Refuses to Return Without Requisition Papers, Which Are Being Secured.

O. C. Stone, former Weston lawyer, convict and more recently salesman in a blind pig at Echo, is now being held by the officers at Walla Walla and he will be brought back here to face the charge that stands against him. He was arrested at the instance of his bondsmen, who feared he was striking for timber that is tall.

Stone's first experience with the law began several years ago when he undertook to practice that profession at Weston. In some manner he became involved in difficulty over bogus checks and he was sent to serve a term in the penitentiary. Meanwhile he was disbarred from the legal profession.

When the Echo blind pig was raided a few weeks ago Stone was one of those caught in the net and like the others he was required to give \$500 bail in order to secure his liberty. This he did, one of his bondsmen being M. H. Gillette.

This morning Stone refused to return without requisition papers being first secured and District Attorney Phelps is now engaged in securing them from the governor.

TWO BURNED IN HOTEL FIRE.

Many Were Forced to Jump From Windows.

Denver, Sept. 8.—Two men were burned to death and a dozen were seriously hurt here today by a fire which destroyed the Hotel Belmont. The hotel was crowded with more than 100 guests. Starting early in the morning the fire forced many to jump from upper stories in their night clothes. The two who were burned were suffocated, the rescuers being unable to reach them. Investigation of the ruins revealed the fact that four lives were lost. John D. Kane is one of the victims.

STANKE IS UNDER ARREST.

Caught at Harrison, Nebraska—Charged With Murdering William C. Simmons at Boise.

Boise, Sept. 8.—Revenge is believed to be the motive for the murder of William C. Simmons, who was found dead with a bullet hole in his neck in Highland valley on Saturday, according to the theory of the detectives and suspicion is pointed to Emil Stanke, brother of August Stanke, who was killed by Simmons two years ago. Emil was arrested yesterday in Harrison, Neb.

HILTON LINE HAS BEEN SOLD

Seattle Man Buys Rural Telephone System and Will Improve It.

PURCHASE PRICE WAS NINE THOUSAND DOLLARS

One Hundred and 30 Miles of Phone and 80 Subscribers on System—Runs to Pilot Rock, Ukiah, Lehman Springs, Hildaway Springs and Scores of Ranches—New Man Will Extend Line Into Grant County.

For the sum of \$9000 T. E. McGintie of Seattle, has purchased the Hilton telephone line, running from this place to the south end of the county, and it is announced that the line will be both extended and improved in the near future.

Though the deal for the phone line was made several days ago the deed was not recorded until this morning. The Hilton system has a total of 130 miles of phone line and there are something over 80 subscribers on the line and its branches.

From Pendleton the line runs to Pilot Rock and thence south to Ukiah, Hildaway Springs and Lehman Springs. A branch line extends up McKay creek, another to ranches on Birch creek, among the J. D. Ingram place. Another line extends up east Birch creek to the L. L. Mann place; another branch up Stewart creek from Pilot Rock to the Mathews place, while a line also extends up the right fork of Stewart creek to the McCune place. A branch line runs from Stewart creek to Frank Michael's place on the Little McKay. A branch line extends up West Birch creek to the Cunningham company's ranch and another runs to the Rugg Bros. ranch, thence to Nye, thence to A. A. Cole's place, thence down Webb slough to Butter creek. Branch lines connect with various places on Butter creek.

The original line from this place to the south end was purchased by Mr. Hilton about four years ago and at that time the line had only a few subscribers. Since he acquired the line Mr. Hilton extended it greatly and increased the number of patrons.

T. E. McGintie, the new owner, is a Seattle real estate man and he is now in Seattle. He was here and looked over the line personally, after which he returned to Seattle to attend to business he has there. He will come to this place to live and intends devoting his time to the line. It is understood he will extend it considerably and that he may extend the line through to Grant county.

LAUNCH IS SAFE AT HOME.

The "O. K." Reported Missing Yesterday Shows Up.

Los Angeles, Sept. 8.—After drifting about helplessly disabled the launch "O. K." missing 15 hours with 16 passengers, is reported safe at home today. The engines of the "O. K." broke down Sunday afternoon during a squall and the boat drifted to sea.

KILLED ON HIS OWN ROAD.

Dr. Caleb Whitehead, Formerly Chief Assayer in Washington, Killed in Wreck in Alaska.

Seattle, Sept. 8.—Dr. Caleb Whitehead, the president of the Alaska Banking Safe Deposit company, and general manager of the Seward Peninsula railroad, died here yesterday as a result of injuries received in a wreck on his own road, says a dispatch. The train was derailed, falling into Iron creek. The observatory car in which Whitehead was riding, with some friends, was tipped over into the creek, and remained in the water for several minutes before the occupants could be rescued. Whitehead failed to regain consciousness. He was chief assayer at Washington, D. C. for a long time and resigned to come to Alaska. He owned several big paying claims in this district.

EXPERIMENT STATION PARTY WILL BE HERE SATURDAY

President W. J. Kerr of the Oregon Agricultural college, together with government experts in dry farming and irrigation and the agronomist at the agricultural college, are to be in this county Friday and Saturday on a mission of much importance to both dry land and irrigation interests.

In a letter received here this morning President Kerr states that the party will be here for the purpose of obtaining data that may be of assistance in determining the advisability of establishing experiment stations in this county for irrigation and dry farming work.

The party expects to arrive here

Saturday morning and will presumably spend the day here. President Kerr has written Judge Lowell of his coming and he has asked the assistance of local people in the work they will have to do.

For many months a branch experiment station has been desired in this county for it is believed that such a station would be highly beneficial to the irrigation section while a dry farming station would materially help in solving the problem of the big ranches in the country. Seemingly the county is now in line for these things if President Kerr and his party can be shown that they will be of benefit.
