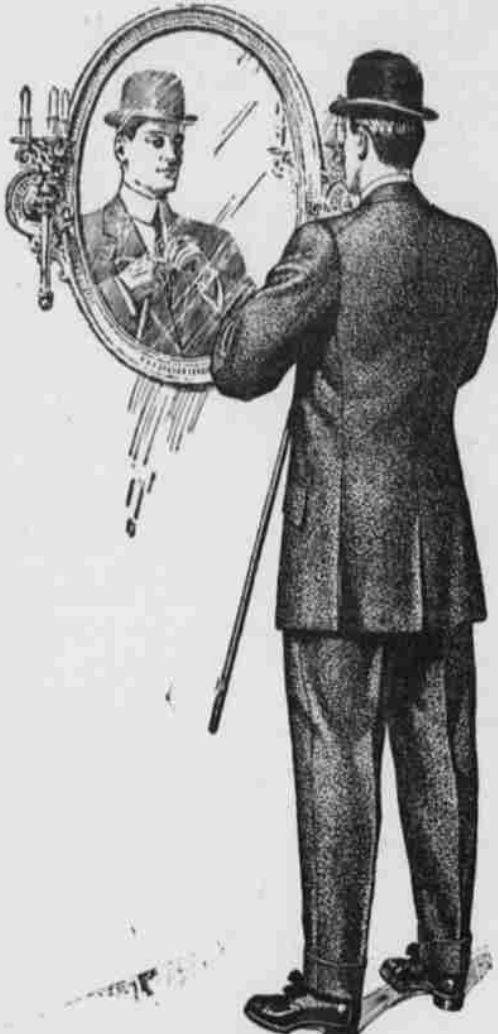

FOR LARGER ARMY

ROOSEVELT ADVOCATES
100,000 IN REGULAR FORCE

Needs More Soldiers to Garrison the
Posts and Insular Possessions.

Washington, Sept. 7.—President Roosevelt in his final annual message to congress probably will recommend an increase in the numerical strength of the army to at least 100,000 men. At present the army is on a footing of 60,000 men, the number provided for in time of peace.

To the general staff it has become evident in the last two years that 60,000 men are too few properly to garrison posts at which it is necessary to maintain an army force. These posts include the garrisons in the insular possessions of America. The law provides that the army may be increased to 100,000 in time of need. This provision in the opinion of military experts, is likely to prove a serious handicap to the army if absolute necessity should arise for a larger force.

It is pointed out that the recruiting of the army from 60,000 to 100,000 men would bring into the service an addition of approximately two inexperienced men to every three experienced soldiers. The injection of so considerable a force of raw recruits, it is said by military officials, would detract seriously from the efficiency of the army.

Need Men for Pearl Harbor.

It is also pointed out that a considerable force will be required to garrison the fortifications at Pearl Harbor in the Hawaiian Islands. An immense amount of money is to be expended in the erection of these fortifications and it is the opinion of army officials that a garrison of at least 2000 men will have to be maintained there in order to protect the works and insure against invasion by a possible enemy. approximately 10,000 Japanese in the Hawaiian Islands. In the remote event of war between America and Japan or some other power with which Japan is on friendly terms, it would be impossible for the comparatively small force of United States troops now in the Hawaiian Islands to prevent the landing of arms and ammunition to supply the Japanese in the islands.

It is expected that the president will recommend the increase of the army by the addition of at least 10 regiments of infantry and five regiments of cavalry, and several companies of coast artillery.

COLLEGE BOYS DISQUALIFIED

FIVE COLLEGES DISCOVER
PROFESSIONAL ATHLETES

Baseball Players the Offenders—Colleges to Stick by Rule Adopted at Walla Walla Last Fall.

How many colleges in the northwest will stand by the rules they pledged in conference at Walla Walla last fall?

How many faculties will disbar offending athletes from competition in games after college opens this month?

Within the next three weeks it will be known whether or not the northwest colleges intend living up to the conference rules adopted at Walla Walla last fall. Should all prove loyal to their pledge it will mean that valuable athletes from at least five of the six colleges must be disbarred from further competition on the grounds of professionalism.

So far as is known locally, there are offenders from Whitman, Idaho, Washington state, Oregon Agricultural and Oregon university. Whitman, the originator of the conference idea, has already declared that three of her crack athletes, including the captain of her football team, must go. This will be a hard blow to the missionaries, and one from which the team may not recover.

Oregon Collegians Offend.

The frankness of Whitman should be extolled. It would be justice to the northern colleges to try and cover up the delinquencies of the Oregon institutions. Both the state university and O. A. C. have athletes who have played summer professional baseball.

Curtis Coleman, the fast 'varsity' end, disregarded the rules this summer and played baseball with the Salem team of the Tri-City league, a semi-professional organization. Whether or not he received any consideration is not the question. He played among professionals and that is tantamount to professionalizing himself, according to the A. A. U. Oregon permits Coleman to play on the football squad this fall or the baseball nine next spring it will be a direct violation of the conference rules.

Perhaps more than one spectator at the Tri-City league games wondered at the identity of a spectacular catcher going under the name of Ruple. He was none other than the clever Otto Moore, crack backstop of the Oregon Agricultural college baseball team. Moore played with St. Johns.

He did not wait until the college season had closed but came to Portland every Sunday to play with his semi-pro teammates. His work with the Agies was largely responsible for bringing the college championship to that place.

Whitman's disqualified athletes are Walter Brubaker, the heady quarterback and captain of the football squad, who played summer baseball, and Stanley and Vincent Borleske, brothers, who were members of semi-professional baseball teams in the inland empire during the summer.

Washington state college's offenders are Vaughn Jones and Frank Brown, two excellent baseball players. Idaho's man who violated the amateur rules is Captain McGee of last season's baseball team. These are the ones known to the conference authorities.

Whether or not the University of Washington can present a clean slate is not yet established. If such is the case it will be quite a feather in the cap of the evergreen college. In the past Washington's athletes have not been wholly above reproach and the reports from Seattle this year will be watched with considerable interest.

SALOON MAN WOULD BE GOVERNOR OF STATE

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 8.—With the arrival of primary day in Washington, one of the most spectacular figures in the political history of the state has closed the most remarkable campaign ever waged in an attempt to secure a gubernatorial nomination. He is Jimmie Durkin of Spokane, millionaire liquor dealer, railroad president and disciple of personal liberty. Durkin seeks to become the democratic standard bearer, and declares that if he is nominated he will certainly carry the state for his party. If nominated and elected, he has promised to donate his salary to charity.

Durkin is aggressive and peculiar. When he has anything to say he spreads the joyful things by means of bulletins in his saloon windows and full four-column advertisements in the daily papers.

He is against prohibition, but advocates temperance in all things, also universal personal liberty. He believes in unionism and urges the laborer and the farmer to organize. His chief aim since arriving in Spokane 11 years ago has been to make people talk about his achievements.

"I believe in newspaper advertising," he said, "because it's the best medium in the world for publicity."

Debate Bank Guaranty Law.

Pittsburg, Pa., Sept. 8.—Bankers of this city and surrounding towns are congregated today at Bedford Springs at the fourteenth annual convention of the Pennsylvania Bankers' association. In addition to reports of officers, addresses will be made today by S. D. Scudder of New York, and William A. Law of Philadelphia.

A spirited debate of the question of federal guarantee of bank deposits, a live issue in this year's presidential campaign, will mark the session. Financiers of this and other states will participate in the discussion.

of western Pennsylvania and those of the eastern section of the state. A novel numismatic exhibition of 6000 coins, illustrating thousands of years of the world's currency, is exhibited by Professor Farren Zerber, of Columbus, O.
