RUSTIN WANTED TO BE KILLED

of his house, while he went in the front door of the house, intending to go out the back way to the barn. All this happened Friday, August 28.

"While I was walking along the alley someone drove along and I lost my nerve again and went back to Farnam street," said Mrs. Rice. "I walked east on Farnam to get away from him and waited at the next corner for a car."

Dr. Rustin was on that very car, according to the woman's statement. She said Rustin was angry at her desertion and insisted on her coming back to his place.

"We walked back to Forty-first street and I went around the back way through the alley again to the barn," said Mrs. Rice. She said she was let into the barn through a sliding door.

"He stepped away from me and said: 'Now shoot me,'" declared the woman, without raising her voice or without a sign of emotion.

She said she got away so there would be no powder stains on his clothes—that he had carefully planned that detail against detection.

"I broke down again and refused to shoot," said Mrs. Rice. "He was very angry then and he threatened to kill me and himself and both together there in the barn. I insisted on going back down town. He telephoned for a carriage to take us down town."

Found Someone Else.

Mrs. Rice said she went to his office Tuesday. She said:

"He told me he had found someone else to kill him and that I would not have to do it. A man was coming who was going to kill him—a man by the name of Charley Davis. I was introduced to him."

They met at his office again that evening.

"He was very much depressed," said Mrs. Rice. "His man came in about 8 o'clock and left the office and was to call him up."

Mrs. Rice said Davis was to kill him (Rustin) and that Davis would be given some medicine in return which Davis would use to kill himself. Mrs. Rice said Davis was sent out to get a bottle of beer and tried to talk Rustin out of the notion of being killed.

"He gave me some drug in a bottle—and told me to take it as soon as I was sure he was going to die," said Mrs. Rice.

She told of seeing Dr. Rustin put the other man on the Farnam street car to go to some appointed place where the doctor was to meet him and of her parting with him for the last time.

Davis Testifies.

Charles E. Davis, the man implicated in the affair by Mrs. Rice, gave brief testimony, admitting his own attempt at suicide with morphine and other poisons furnished him by Rustin, but denied any knowledge of Rustin's death until the day after it occurred.

Omaha, Sept. 8.—The net tightened around Chas. E. Davis, a brother of Fred Davis, the vice president of the First National bank, today at the inquest into the strange death of Frederick Rustin. Davis admitted he obtained poison from Rustin with the purpose of killing himself, that

he was in the neighborhood on the night Rustin was murdered, but positively denied he fired the shot. Mrs. Abbie Rice testified that Rustin wanted to be murdered rather than commit suicide so his family would receive the benefit of the \$75,000 life insurance.

BRUTAL OUTRAGE.

Child of Six Years Assaulted and Its Tongue Cut Out.

Chicago, Sept. 8.—Three suspects whose identity is being guarded carefully, were arrested today in connection with the most brutal assault ever known in the police history of this city.

Annie Cooper a 6-year-old girl, the victim, is in a critical condition at her home. She was dragged into a vacant basement, where her skull was fractured by a blow in the mouth that cut off her tongue.

The child's mother found her in a pool of blood and near by was the club which evidently had been used in the attack. Several men of the neighborhood attempted to form a mob, but it was dispersed by the police.

FIGHT NOW ON.

Gans and Nelson Battling in San Francisco for Championship.

MAY NOT LEAVE NEW YORK.

Jerome Will Fight the Removal of Thaw.

New York, Sept. 8.—District Attorney Jerome today declared that he thought it unlikely that Harry K. Thaw would be able to go to Pittsburg in response to a summons in connection with bankruptcy proceedings. He considers the order for Thaw to appear in Pittsburg to be merely a technical move to get the slayer of Stanford White out of New York.

It is understood that Jerome will use every means within his power to prevent the removal of Thaw to Pittsburg and will oppose vigorously the effort to get him out of the state. There is much speculation as to the legal complications that would be caused by such a move.

Aid Society Man Here.

J. Teuscher, representative of the Boys' & Girls' Aid society of Portland, arrived here this afternoon on train No. 1. He is bound for Portland from Union county and stopped over to consult County Judge Gilliland regarding charges from this county. According to Mr. Teuscher his institution is now quarantined for measles and consequently new members cannot be taken at present.

At 2 o'clock this afternoon a meeting of the creditors of John E. Bean, former stock inspector, was held at the office of Judge Thomas Fitz Gerald, referee in bankruptcy. T. C. Taylor was appointed as trustee to settle up the affairs of the bankrupt estate.
