PATHETIC OUTCAST

WASHINGTON LEPER
WORRIES ABOUT FAMILY

Does Not Care for Himself—Is Re-
signed to His Fate—Seeks Consola-
tion in the Bible.

Washington, Sept. 8.—The thoughts
and feelings of a leper, who knows
his doom is awaiting the terrible end,
were pathetically voiced by John R.
Early. He is the North Carolinian
who walked the streets of Washing-
ton for six days before it was dis-
covered that he was a victim of lepro-
sy. He is being detained in a tent
in an isolated spot on the outskirts
of the city.

Arrangements are being made to
remove Early from Washington as
soon as possible. It is expected he
will be sent to the leper colony in
Louisiana, although negotiations are
pending to have the North Carolina
authorities take charge of him.

None of the physicians who have
seen him will venture a prediction as
to the length of time the disease may
run before it kills him. He may live
two or a dozen years, they say. They
only are certain that leprosy will
claim him finally.

Thoughts All of Family.

"I don't know what they are going
to do with me," said Early to his in-
terviewers, 50 feet away. "I don't
know what is to become of the wife
and child I left behind me at Lynn,
but I feel that the world is kind, and
somehow, though I never see them
again, a God will provide. My
thoughts are of them; I care nothing
for this old frame of mine now," he
sobbed.

"They are lepers, too?" he asked,
pleadingly, as he regained his com-
posure. "The world regards them as
such, for they have been near me.
Yet I wonder if there is not some way
out—if there is not hope. The bible
tells me so, and were it not for the
bible I do not know what I would do
in the dark days that have overtaken
me."

"Yes, I would like to see them
again," he continued, as his eyes
wandered over the green fields and
the waters of the Potomac, "even if
only as I see you—afar off, to look,
but not to touch; to hear, but not
to feel the press of a hand that is
gone forever."

The Bible His Mainstay.

"It would mean something just to
have them near. The Bible is my
mainstay now. I read it constantly,
and somehow I feel that God has
prepared me for this trial. He doesn't
allow my mind to dwell too much up-
on my troubles. He makes me real-
ize that it is only a question of years
between your end and mine; that the
body is not everything, and that al-
though the home of clay may be 'un-
clean,' the soul may look for brighter
things."

"Therefore I am not afraid to go. I
don't know when the end will come,
I may live a long time; it may be
soon. All I ask is that I may be as
little trouble and as little danger as
possible to my fellow man. I am a
leper, you know, and, of course the
world must turn the other way."

"Next to my wife and child my con-
cern is for those with whom I have
innocently come in contact. I do not
know what they will think; I would
not have them be like me. Perhaps
after this is over and I am gone they
will forget that a leper has been this
way. I hope I have not subjected
any human being to a fate like mine."

Harry L. West, commissioner for
the District of Columbia, created con-
sideration here by the announcement
that there are at large in Washington
many cases of leprosy in its primary
stages. He quoted as authority an
expert of the marine hospital service.

"If there are any cases of leprosy
in Washington other than the case
just discovered by the district health
department, I know nothing about
it," said Dr. McGlennan, in charge
in the marine hospital service, in the
absence of Surgeon General Wyman.
